### Jerusalem not invited

To the Editor:

Suppose a conference of the world's industrial countries is planned and when you look at the list of some 30 invited countries you will not find Japan. You may think it is a simple typist's error and you would not imagine that the organization committee could make such a mistake.

This is what one thinks when looking at the list of cities invited to the "World Conference of Historical Cities" and not finding Jerusalem. This conference, to be held this fall in Kyoto, is organized by the city of Kyoto and sponsored also by Japan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The conference is advertised by the organizers as a non-political international meeting the aim of which is to promote cultural exchange and good will.

Encyclopedia Britannica describes Jerusalem as "the holy city par excellence of Judaism and Christianity and (after Mecca and Medina) the chief shrine of Islam." So, this city that has a documented history of more than 3,000 years, the center

and goal of major religions, a city that played one of the most important roles as a birthplace of Western culture is left uninvited. Why?

It took us sometime in Kyoto City Hall to find an answer. It even could have been funny if it was not so sad. We were given several reasons why Jerusalem was excluded from the conference. The answers were anything between wrong to ridiculous, finally Mr. Inoue,

whom you quote in your article (Aug. 10), told us that the real reason was that the city is under political upheaval. Indeed, unfortunately, this is the faith of this remarkable city almost in its entire history but what has this to do with inviting its representatives, Jews and Arabs, to a non-political conference of historical cities? And why does Mr. Inoue deny political considerations when interviewed by you?

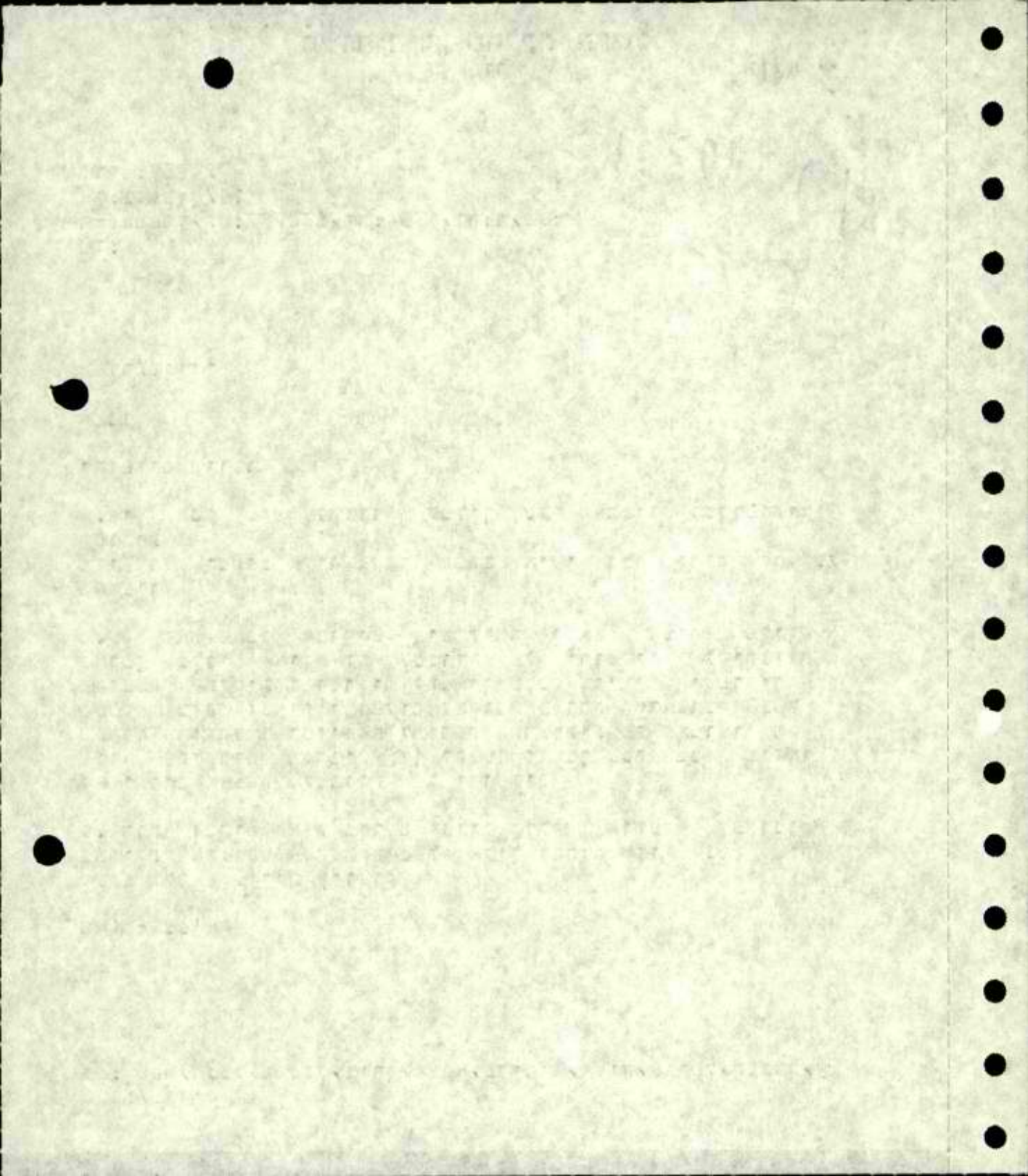
While visiting Kyoto we asked for a short meeting, anytime in the coming weeks, with the mayor of Kyoto, but were denied. There are many Japanese whose access to the mayor's office or to the sponsors in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs is easier. We hope that some of them will be willing to explain to the conference organizers that by succumbing to political pressure and holding it without Jerusalem they bring shame rather than fame to the conference.

**Kyoto's blunder**

SOME days a big city mayor can't do anything right. And even when he does do the right thing, there's always someone around to question whether it was for the wrong reason.

Mayor Ray Flynn did the right thing when he refused to have Boston participate in a Japanese exposition of "historic cities" that had quite pointedly excluded the city of Jerusalem. The planned expo has indeed come in for criticism from any number of quarters for bowing to Arab pressure to exclude the Israeli capital, but include Damascus, Syria.

The snub of Jerusalem was narrow-minded and it was intentional. That being the case, Flynn ought to

be applauded for his savvy in refusing Kyoto's invitation.

Now, however, along comes his political rival Joe Tierney, charging that Flynn is avoiding the expo simply because it would subject him to criticism for political junketing. Well, poils will be poils, we suppose.

Of course, Flynn may yet be able to disprove Tierney's theory, if a compromise proposal now being discussed is finalized. Under that proposal Jerusalem would be given half of Boston's expo space, and Kyoto's officials would have to live with the egg left on their faces by their initial misstep. It's a grand idea, and one which would do credit to the Flynn administration.

We were disappointed to learn of your response to our request for State Department assistance in approaching Japan concerning the exclusion of Jerusalem from the Kyoto Conference on World Historical Cities.

We are aware of, though we do not agree with, the government's policy on Jerusalem. But this policy should not preclude the Department from speaking out on this matter which, in its horrendous distortion of historical reality, amounts to anti-Israel bias.

By taking action, the State Department could demonstrate that distinctions must be made. It would not be a statement as to the future of Jerusalem, but that politics should not be allowed to create a new history of the world wherein Jerusalem, clearly one of the most significant of historical cities, is now a non-city.

The failure to make such distinctions highlights the insidious effect of twenty years of U.S. refusal to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital. It plays into the hands of those who would like to see no Israeli control over the holiest city of the Jewish people.

We regret your decision to take no action. We hope you will reconsider.


In Dr. Sigur's absence I am responding to your letter of July 24, concerning Kyoto's Conference on World Historical Cities.

I, of course, agree that Jerusalem occupies a unique position in world history. However, I regret that we can not approach the Japanese to ask that they include Jerusalem in the Conference. Since June 1967 the U.S. Government has not agreed with unilateral actions by Israel in East Jerusalem that tend to create basic changes in the administration and nature of the city or to prejudge its final status. We believe the final status of Jerusalem must be determined in the context of a just and lasting Middle East peace settlement and must be based upon agreement of all the parties concerned. For the U.S. Government to approach the Japanese on this issue would be inconsistent with these considerations.

As you are aware, on many occasions the Department of State has encouraged the Japanese to broaden their relations with Israel. We believe this is in the interests of both Israel and Japan, and we will continue to work actively toward this end.

# Hub snubs invitation to Japan 'sister city'

BOSTON'S SISTER city of Kyoto, Japan, is feeling anything but sibling love for the Flynn administration, claiming Boston is snubbing its invitation to an exposition in Kyoto.

The invitation dispute has wounded the pride of expo organizers and Kyoto officials, who say they are befuddled by Flynn's refusal to send a delegation.

"They're very hurt. They don't understand why," said Toshio Sasaki,

a Kyoto businessman who was sent by the expo organizers to make a last-minute appeal to Flynn.

Boston and Philadelphia were the only two U.S. cities to get invitations to appear at the first annual World Exposition of Historical Cities, and Boston was the only city out of 55 around the world not to accept.

Sasaki said he couldn't understand why the city is giving such a chilly reception to Kyoto, which has been Boston's sister city for more than 20 years.

Sasaki said organizers

were told by city officials Boston declined to go because the expo organizers chose Damascus, Syria, and not Jerusalem, Israel, to participate in the event.

He said he has offered to let Boston give half its display space at the expo to Jerusalem, but the city has not responded to his offer.

A delegation of Boston officials, including Flynn, visited Kyoto last year to promote the city for potential business.

Flynn received criticism for the trip from people who said it was nothing but a junket.

Sasaki said he was told by one businessman who tried to negotiate with the city that Flynn, up for reelection this year, would not send a delegation because of "political reasons."

The expo is designed to let the cities show slides and other presentations illustrating their history, and Kyoto had especially asked Boston to display memorabilia from the Kennedy Library and the Boston Marathon.




It has come to my attention that Kyoto is hosting the World Conference of Historical Cities in November 1987.

Although I have rejected requests by individuals and organizations around the world to raise the issue with the organizers of the conference, I do find it difficult to imagine discussions about cities that have had a major impact on the history of mankind without Jerusalem, the focus of the heritage of Judaism, Christianity and Islam, heading the list.

Obviously Jerusalem does not need the Conference's recognition of its place among the world's most historically important cities, but not inviting Jerusalem to participate in this conference has, surely, diminished the value and meaning of this event. As your own newspaper "The Shinbon" stated, the conference is "meaningless without Jerusalem's participation." And since not including Jerusalem in this conference cannot be justified historically, such action by the organizers can only be explained by their succumbing to political blackmail. This is not only unbecoming to a city such as Kyoto with its rich cultural and historical roots but, more seriously, a cause of great concern when local conflicts in any part of the world affect participation in international gatherings which should contribute to furthering understanding through the exchange of ideas and the sharing of values.

During the past 20 years, Jerusalem's experience in combining historical preservation and restoration with planning for a modern urban area has become a symbol of achievement recognized throughout the world and it would have been appropriate to have shared this experience with the other participants in the conference.

New York, NY, July 23....The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith today protested the exclusion of the city of Jerusalem from the forthcoming World Conference of Historical Cities to be hosted by the city of Kyoto.

In a July 23 letter to Japanese ambassador Nobuo Matsunaga, ADL national director Abraham H. Foxman said that barring Jerusalem, which is "rich in cultural and religious history, serves the interests of those who seek the political delegitimization of Israel's capital."

The conference, which is scheduled in November, will be attended by 35 cities. The Kyoto City Council voted not to extend an invitation to Jerusalem.

The League first raised the matter of Jerusalem's exclusion with the Japanese embassy in Washington last May. But the embassy has informed the League that the decision still stands.

Expressing "disappointment and dismay," Mr. Foxman said that barring Jerusalem "contradicts several of the conference's stated aims, including those of promoting 'international friendship' and contributing to world peace."

Kyoto's decision, he went on, "is not an isolated instance of Japanese political bias against Israel." Mr. Foxman cited Tokyo's support of the Arab economic boycott against Israel and Japan's refusal to engage in scientific exchanges with Israel and promote cultural ties.

"We believe that the inclusion of Jerusalem in the Kyoto conference would be an important step in bettering Japanese-Israeli ties and we urge the (Kyoto) council to reconsider its exclusionary decision," Mr. Foxman said.

We have read with great disappointment and dismay Mr. Koichi Haraguchi's letter of July 16 indicating that Jerusalem will not be invited to attend the November 1987 World Conference of Historical Cities hosted by the city of Kyoto.

In our view, the Kyoto City Council's decision contradicts several of the conference's stated aims, including those of promoting "international friendship" and contributing to world peace. Instead, the Council's exclusion of Jerusalem, a city centuries-rich in cultural and religious history, serves the interests of those who seek the political delegitimization of Israel's capital.

Unfortunately, Jerusalem's exclusion from the Kyoto conference is not an isolated instance of Japanese political bias against Israel. Your government's open support for the Arab boycott, its refusal to engage in scientific exchanges and to promote cultural ties with Israel have contributed to the coolness that has characterized the two countries' relations for more than a decade. We believe that the inclusion of Jerusalem in the Kyoto conference would be an important step in bettering Japanese-Israeli ties and we urge the Council to reconsider its exclusionary decision.

We look forward to hearing from you and to further discussion on this highly important matter.

I am writing in response to your letter of May 13, 1987 on the Ambassador's behalf.

When we received your letter, we immediately sent a copy to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan and made an inquiry about the reason for which the City of Jerusalem was not selected to participate in the World Conference of Historical Cities hosted by the City of Kyoto. The Ministry contacted the City of Kyoto, and the City of Kyoto informed the Ministry that regrettably the City of Jerusalem was not invited to the Conference for the following reason:

The participating cities were selected by the City of Kyoto on the basis of recommendations made by the Planning Committee for the Conference, which consists of advisors to the City of Kyoto and who deliberated independently of the city. During the above deliberations, it was decided that cities such as Jerusalem, which may be said to be the subject of political controversies as reflected in the debate at the United Nations concerning the status of the City of Jerusalem, would not be invited to participate in the Conference, irrespective of their long history and tradition.

The City of Kyoto, however, wishes to make it clear that the City resolutely opposes, and has consistently opposed any kind of racism, racial discrimination, or racial or religious prejudice, and that there was no racial or religious bias involved in selecting the cities for the Conference.

The City of Kyoto also wishes to make it clear that it does not intend to invite any further cities. Some cities such as Fez, Baghdad, Tunis, Quebec, and Cuzco have later expressed their desire to participate in the Conference, but the City of Kyoto has consistently declined to accommodate their requests.

The sponsorship by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan does not imply anything other than to acknowledge in general terms that international exchanges by local authorities, such as the conference in question, contribute to the promotion of international friendship and mutual understanding, and that the Ministry encourages them in their efforts. The Ministry does not support them in financial terms, or participate in any of the events thereof.

We should like to also point out that it is the established policy of the Ministry not to interfere with the decision-making of a host organization for an event which the Ministry sponsors. Therefore, the selection of the participating cities to the Conference in question is left solely to the discretion of the City of Kyoto.

I hope that this letter clarifies the situation regarding the selection of cities invited to the Conference.

# Schwinden proclaims Jerusalem Day

Gov. Ted Schwinden has proclaimed today as Jerusalem Day to honor the 20th anniversary of the reunification of Jerusalem.

In a proclamation signed Tuesday, Schwinden said that "a united, peaceful city of Jerusalem" allowing free access to each religion's holy places can preserve and enhance the hopes for lasting peace in the Middle East.

Great Falls Mayor Roger Anderson drew criticism for issuing a similar proclamation earlier in the month without realizing it dealt with a potentially controversial subject internationally.

Don Clark, a Montana State University faculty member reached then by the Tribune, suggested Anderson "kind of got conned into signing something that looked very innocent" but actually involves "a very touchy subject."

Anderson admitted he had not

been aware of the proclamation's political ramifications but he did not retract the proclamation.

Clark, director of international education at MSU, said the reunification of Jerusalem under Israeli control is controversial in many parts of the world because it came when Israel captured East Jerusalem during the Six Day War of 1967 and because Israel has sought to make the city — considered holy by Christians and Moslems as well as Jews — its political capital.

Clark said that neither the United Nations, which had hoped to place Jerusalem under international control, nor the United States recognize Israel's permanent sovereignty over the city.

He said "most scholars" believe that rival claims to Jerusalem must be resolved, probably by placing it under international control, before a Middle East peace treaty can be reached.

**BUT TOM BERGER**, the president of the Great Falls Hebrew Association, one of the groups that urged both the governor and the mayor to issue the proclamations, said he feels vindicated by Schwinden's proclama-

tion.

"The fact the governor is now issuing a proclamation, fully aware that this is a controversial issue, shows that it is the ethically correct position to take," Berger said.

Berger as well as Jim Petersen, president of the Great Falls Church Association, have stressed that Israel has done a good job of allowing pilgrims of all faiths full access to their holy places in Jerusalem.

While only two Central American countries now recognize Jerusalem as the capital of Israel, Berger said that 13 did before Saudi Arabia threatened to cut off their oil shipments in 1980.

Jerusalem is so important to Jews that Israel is not about to give up control of it, Berger said.

Neither Schwinden nor the aides who helped him evaluate the proclamation request could be reached for comment Tuesday.

# The Old City of Jerusalem and Its Walls, *Jordan/Israel*

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From the hubbub of business-as-usual emerge the sounds of a city at prayer. Cries of thanksgiving, murmured pleas, the cadence of bells and chants: The children of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam each go about the business of their Father. Cemeteries clustered side by side on surrounding slopes and valley floors tell the story of the faithful: They came to the House of the Lord in Jerusalem—and stayed.

From a distance Jerusalem's modern skyline contrasts with the exalted image sacred to Jews, Christians, and Muslims everywhere—a third of the world's population. Beyond the sprawl of concrete housing blocks and high-rise hotels, beyond museums and theaters, beyond McDavid's hamburger restaurants with their orange arches, the sacred image sharpens into focus.

Sequestered in the heart of the city, behind 16th-century walls built by Süleymen the Magnificent, stands Old Jerusalem. Here ancient alleys and footpaths wind around stone dwellings and shops that span the centuries. Everywhere the sights, sounds, and smells of many nations mingle.

Beneath medieval arches, vendors hawk wares in Arabic, Yiddish, Hebrew, Armenian, Polish, English. Almost anything can be had: aromatic spices and teas, hand-tooled leather, hard bread, sweet cakes, poultry dead or alive, tourist souvenirs. On hot days, turbaned peddlers dispense cool fruit drinks from ornate brass urns. And on streets too narrow for cars or trucks, porters carry heavy loads the old-fashioned way—on their backs. Residents still use the red metal letterboxes bearing the insignia of George V, a legacy of the British Mandate from 1917 to 1948. Except for the letterboxes, television antennas on rooftops, and the mix-match of Eastern and Western dress, the century might be anyone's guess—a city even King David might recognize.

David, the second ruler of Israel, left his mark on Jerusalem about 1000 B.C. Capturing the fortress town from the Canaanites,

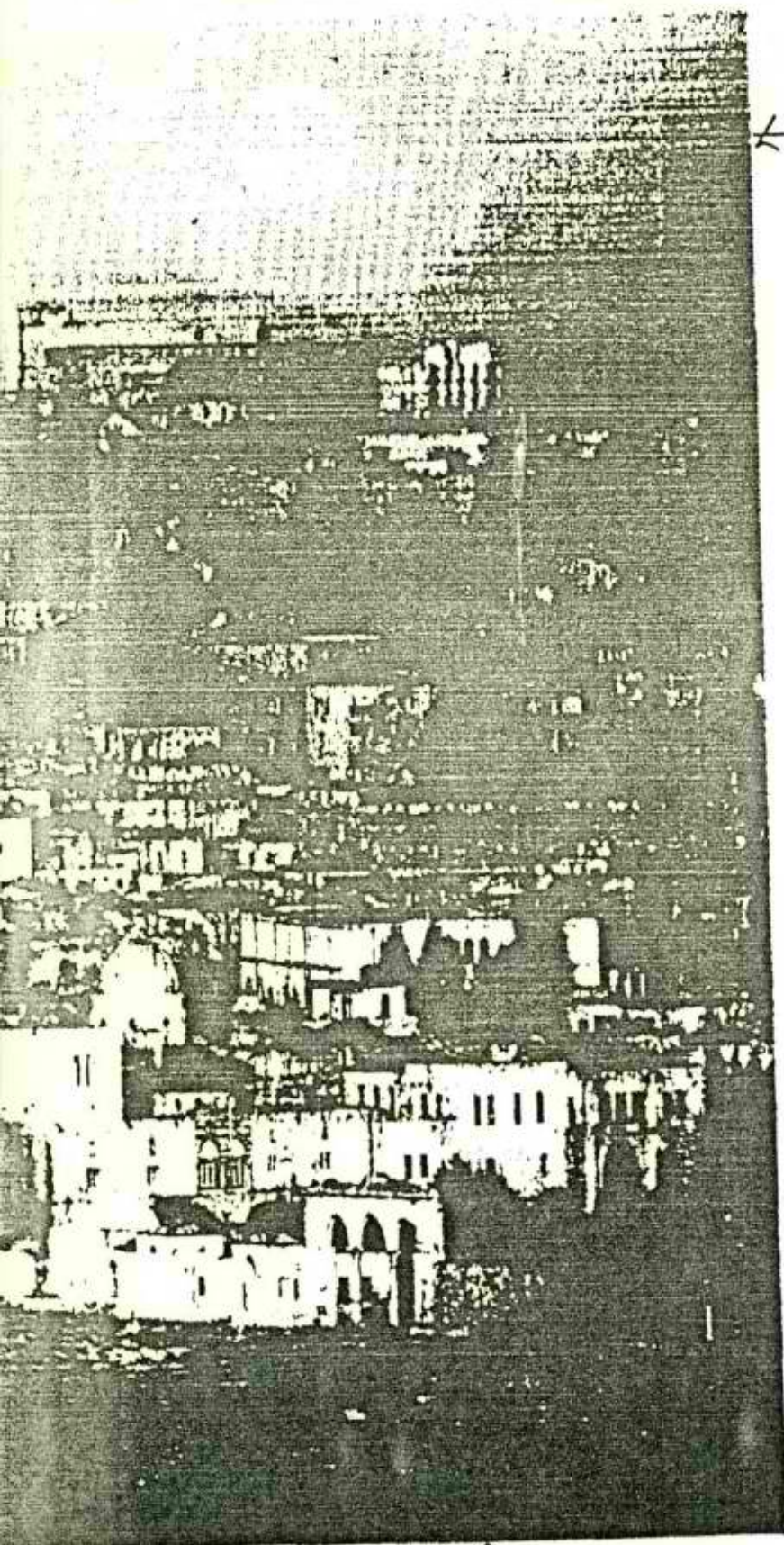

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he proclaimed it the site for the Lord's Temple. The city built on a rock in the Judaeen hills has ever since been a focus of division—and survival. The Prophet Isaiah described Jerusalem as "a quiet habitation," but it has endured a host of conquerors: Byzantines, Arabs, Crusaders, Mamluks, Turks, British. Burned, plundered, and razed, Jerusalem has survived to build and rebuild. Roman columns turned 20th-century streetlights reveal the spirit and tenacity of its citizens.

In the old city's half square mile, descendants of the past live in four distinct quarters—Armenian, Jewish, Muslim, Christian—that hold dozens of nationalities, each with its sacred shrines.

Armenians revere the Cathedral of St. James, built by the Crusaders in the 12th century to honor the first bishop of Jerusalem. Jews have fought and died by the millions for the right to worship at the Western Wall, the last remnant of the Lord's Temple. Christians follow Christ's lead along the Via Dolorosa, the Way of the Cross. At its end stands the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, site of the Crucifixion and the entombment. From the tops of minarets, muezzins call Muslims to the Dome of the Rock, a site that unites the traditions of the three great faiths. This mosque encloses the boulder where the Patriarch Abraham bound his son for sacrifice and from which, centuries later, Muhammad ascended to the throne of Allah.

In 1967 history repeated itself. On a June day Israeli paratroopers seized the walled city from Jordanian infantry in bloody combat. Soldiers pulled down the concrete and barbed-wire barriers. For the first time since the reign of Solomon, the son of David, Jerusalem was united under Israel's rule.

Today, armed patrols and the occasional burst of gunfire recall the bloodshed of the past. Perhaps peace can only be found in the prophecies. When God returns to the city faith built, then "there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away."

Comments on "The Old City of Jerusalem and Its Walls"

In general, the piece is well written and colorfully portrays the many facets of Jerusalem's Old City. The Old City's vibrancy and pluralism are well depicted, as is the manner in which old and new coexist side by side.

It is our view that the following corrections would add to the accuracy of the article, thus making a good piece even better.

1. Jordan should not be mentioned in the title. Equating Jordan with Israel is a distortion of Jerusalem's 3000 year history and flies in the face of the situation prevailing since 1967.

Jordan ruled Jerusalem for only 19 years, following its attack on Israel in 1948, and even that rule was unrecognized by all but two countries, Britain and Pakistan.

On the other hand, not only have the Jewish people's links with Jerusalem existed throughout the ages, ever since Jerusalem was made the capital of David's kingdom, but throughout the city's history no other people has attached the paramount importance to Jerusalem set for it by the Jewish people. While Jerusalem is holy to all three monotheistic faiths, it was only the Jewish people that looked upon Jerusalem as the heart and soul of its national-religious aspirations. Indeed, even throughout centuries of exile, there were always Jews who lived in Jerusalem, where, since the mid-19th century, they have constituted a majority of the city's population.

While under Jordanian occupation the Old City of Jerusalem was left largely in neglect and was relegated to marginal importance, Jerusalem was declared Israel's capital following Israel's establishment in 1948, and, in 1967, the Old and New City were reunited. Since 1967, Jerusalem's Old City has undergone a process of unprecedented development leading to highly improved living standards, beautification, and a well-organized infrastructure of services. The starkly contrasting approaches of Israel and Jordan to Jerusalem's welfare are a tangible expression of the importance attached by each country to that city.

Moreover, to be completely realistic, a reference to Jerusalem as part of Jordan today ignores present political realities, namely, that Jerusalem is Israel's capital, while Jordan's capital is Amman; that Jerusalem has been under Israel's sovereignty for a period longer than it was under Jordan's occupation; and that Israel has no intention of giving up its sovereignty over Jerusalem, even while guaranteeing the rights of all faiths in the holy city.

2. At the beginning of page two, the article notes that David proclaimed Israel to be the site for the Lord's Temple. More accurately, King David proclaimed Jerusalem to be the capital of his kingdom, and, upon bringing the Holy Ark to Jerusalem, made the city also the center of Jewish worship. However, the declaration of Jerusalem as the site of the Temple and the building of the Temple itself was left to his son, Solomon.

3. In the next to the last paragraph, reference should be made to the fact that Israel took the Old City from Jordanian control following Jordan's initiation of hostilities in 1967 when Jordanian troops seized the UN headquarters and began bombarding the Jewish neighborhoods in Jerusalem. Otherwise, as it stands, the paragraph leaves the false impression that Israel arbitrarily went to war against Jordan "one June day."

4. The final paragraph talks about armed patrols and occasional bursts of gunfire recalling the bloodshed of the past, while adding that perhaps peace can only be found in the prophecies. This paragraph is misleading. While from time to time, Israel continues to contend with acts of terrorism and violence, under the last twenty years of Israeli sovereignty Jerusalem has seen more peaceful cooperation and coexistence than it has seen in ages. The bustling Arab marketplace, the crowds of worshippers at the sites holy to Judaism, Christianity, and Islam, the millions of tourists each and every year attest to the fact that in many ways Jerusalem has already found a not-to-be-belittled sense of peace. Symbolizing this is Mayor Teddy Kollek, a very popular figure among all Jerusalemites and Israelis (at one time he was even proposed as a potential candidate for the Nobel Peace Prize). While problems do exist, and tensions arise anew from time to time, peace in Jerusalem is no longer merely a prophetic dream. Therefore, we would recommend that your concluding paragraph take this reality into account.





It is indeed remarkable that in these past twenty years there has been a great revival in Jerusalem, and all of that has been accomplished by protecting the rights of persons regardless of religion, with the followers of each free to function under autonomous control.

While tragically conflict remains in the Middle East, I hope and pray that the leaders of all the countries in your region are able to look to Jerusalem not only as a symbol, but as a prototype for what will occur when there is peace.

I wish you well in your deserved celebration and look forward to the time when I can again visit with you.

# Proclamation more controversial than most

Great Falls mayors issue innocuous proclamations with such frequency that they seldom are noticed by anybody except the groups who request them.

But more attention is being paid to Mayor Roger Anderson's proclamation celebrating the 20th anniversary on May 27 of the reunification of Jerusalem under Israel's control.

For one thing, the Great Falls He-

brew Association, one of two groups that asked Anderson to issue the proclamation, ran a paid advertisement in Sunday's Tribune reprinting the proclamation, as well as another one by Gov. Ted Schwinden proclaiming a week to remember the victims of the Nazi Holocaust.

Schwinden also has been asked by both the Great Falls Jewish group and the interdenominational Great Falls Church Association to issue a proclamation about Jerusalem's reunification, but has not made a decision yet, according to Terry Cohea, his executive assistant. She said the governor receives numerous requests for proclamations — he issued 159 last year alone — and normally considers only requests by Montanans.

The reunification proclamation — unlike other recent ones proclaiming Arbor Day, Public Library Week and Red Cross Month — placed the mayor on the record on one side of a politically touchy issue.

The resolution might not sound controversial to people who don't keenly follow Middle East problems. It celebrates the 20th anniversary of

the "reunification of the city of Jerusalem" and notes that for the first time "the holy places of all religions ... function freely under their own autonomous control."

But part of the controversy is that the 20-year anniversary dates back to the time, during the Six-Day War, that Israel captured East Jerusalem — including the Old City, the site of many holy places — and much of the territory on the West Bank of the Jordan River, from the country of Jordan. Israel has made Jerusalem, which is considered holy by the Christian, Moslem and Jewish religions, its political capital.

Jews have considered Jerusalem their political and religious center since biblical times, according to the World Book Encyclopedia, while Christians consider it holy as the site of Jesus' crucifixion. Moslems revere the city as the site from which Muhammad, the founder of their religion, rose to heaven.

In separate interviews, Tom Berger, president of the Great Falls Hebrew Association, and the Rev. Jim Petersen, president of the Great Falls Church Association, defended

the proclamation as an accurate portrayal of the religious freedom — with pilgrims of all faiths allowed access to their holy places — that has taken place under Israel's control.

Berger went further, maintaining that Israel "has the best historical claim to the city, has a right to have its capital there and will never, ever give the city up."

But Israel's claims to the entire city is "clearly in dispute" internationally "on legal and religious grounds," said Don Clark, the director of international education at Montana State University, whose views were sought by the Tribune.

Clark said the United Nations, which had hoped to place Jerusalem under international control, does not recognize Israel's permanent sovereignty over the city. He said "very few, (if any) countries have recognized Jerusalem as Israel's capital by placing their embassies there."

A State Department spokesman confirmed that only two countries — Costa Rica and Honduras — have embassies in Jerusalem, although other countries, including the United States, have consulates to transact

business with the Israeli government.

Spokesman William Pierce said the State Department is on record as opposing efforts to move the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem because it "would undermine the role of the United States as the principal intermediary" in the Arab-Israeli conflict. Another policy statement said, "We do not recognize the sovereignty of any state in any part of Jerusalem," and that "the ultimate status of Jerusalem must be determined through negotiation."

Clark said "most scholars" believe the rival claims to Jerusalem must be resolved, probably by placing it under international control, before a peace treaty can be reached in the region.

He also questioned whether Moslems from Arab states Israel are allowed to visit their holy places in Jerusalem. But Berger and Petersen said they personally have witnessed the free access. And a U.S. government source said Israel tries "assiduously" to allow Arabs to make pilgrimages, but that security measures

# PSC chairman blasts Driscoll over ma

HELENA — A simmering feud boiled over again at the state Public Service Commission Thursday as Chairman Clyde Jarvis accused Commissioner John Driscoll of illegally mailing material at state expense.

Jarvis said Driscoll has mailed material that promotes a nuclear waste dumping site in Montana, and calculated that the mailings cost taxpayers \$152 in photocopying, postage and a secretary's time.

Driscoll's promotion of a nuclear waste repository for Montana does not constitute PSC business and should not be paid for by taxpayers.

he learned what Driscoll had done and sought the accounting. The PSC chairman said he will seek a meeting of the full five-member commission next week to stop similar activities by Driscoll in the future.

"How in the hell do we handle anyone that runs wild at state expense?" Jarvis, of Helena, asked in an interview.

Driscoll responded in a separate interview that his actions were not illegal. The disposal of nuclear wastes is an important issue in the electric industry nationally and thus "is clearly within the bounds of what I deal with" as a PSC member, he said.

Anderson agreed, to a point. He said he thought the proclamation was "innocent" and had "not realized it had any political ramifications." Anderson said he usually issues proclamations he considers appropriate. But the mayor said he would not retract the proclamation, and is reviewing information provided by Berger.

Berger said he thinks most people are aware "the status of Jerusalem is in some dispute," and that he did not try to fool the mayor.

"He's a politician, so I felt he should know what he wants to do politically," Berger said.

But the Great Falls heart surgeon said he pushed for the proclamation precisely because he wanted the city and state to take stands on the controversial subject.

Berger quickly added that he thinks Israel's claim to the city is su-

perior, with Jews having lived there for thousands of years. "We lost it only through conquest," he said, adding that Jews "have yearned for centuries" to regain the city as their capital. Jews have been the biggest single religious group in the city since the 1840s, so it is definitely "not an Arab city," Berger added.

Jews were not allowed to visit their holy places in East Jerusalem when it was controlled until 1967 by Arabs, he said, charging that some Jewish holy places and tombstones were desecrated. In contrast, Berger said, Israel has "meticulously protected" other religions' holy places since gaining control of the city.

Berger contended that countries, including the United States, which refuse to move their embassies to Jerusalem are "insulting Israel" and "kowtowing to the power of Arab oil." He charged that the State Department is "continuing an anti-Israeli bias" it first displayed when it used immigration rules to block European Jews trying to flee Nazi Germany from entering the United States.

# Jerusalem

## Whose city—whose "holy city" is it?

**W**e hear much about Jerusalem being one of the holy cities of the Moslem Arabs—the third most holy after Mecca and Medina. And also that solution of the "Middle East Problem" will not be possible until Israeli Jews relinquish their "occupation" and restore the holy city—or, at the very minimum, its eastern part—to its "rightful owners", the Moslem Arabs.

### What are the facts?

■ The startling reality is that before the end of the 1967 Six-Day War, during which the Israeli Defense Forces reconquered Jerusalem from the Jordanians, claims to Jerusalem being a Moslem holy city were rarely, if every, asserted. Jerusalem had always been a city in which many religions and nationalities lived side by side. It was only after the old city, the part that contains the holy places of Christianity, and the place most holy to the Jewish religion, was back in Jewish hands that the Moslem Arabs declared their willingness to wage "jihad" (holy war) to bring the city back into Arab possession.

■ The notion to call Jerusalem an Islamic holy city has only come about in modern times and now has gained currency by dint of constant repetition. The basis for the claim is that Jerusalem does indeed contain an Islamic holy site, namely the Al Aksa Mosque. It's the place from which Mohammed is believed to have ascended to heaven. What is the origin of that legend? Mohammed never in his lifetime set foot in Jerusalem. But aware that it was the holy city of Christians and Jews, and wishing to convert them to his new religion, he commanded his followers to build a mosque in Jerusalem. In recognition of the city's holiness to Jews, Moslems designated the Temple Mount as the place from which Mohammed ascended and built the Al Aksa Mosque to commemorate the event. But never in Moslem or Arab history did this mosque compare in significance to the Moslem holy cities of Mecca and Medina—cities that no "infidel" may visit.

Jerusalem has been the motivation of Jews, its only major holy city and its guiding light for over 3000 years. Over the centuries and through all tribulations, Jews never forgot Jerusalem and prayed daily for being able to return to it. Jews are not the usurpers in Jerusalem. They have been living there, virtually without interruption since the Biblical era, have been the majority population for much of the time and since the 19th Century. Jews have holy sites—synagogues and temples—in most cities of the world. But do they claim sovereignty over those cities because of it? Of course not! It would be preposterous. And the Moslem Arab claim to Jerusalem, based on the Al Aksa Mosque on the Temple Mount, is just as untenable. Jerusalem has been the center of Jewish life, of Jewish yearning, and of Jewish thinking for over 3000 years. That is the reason that the State of Israel has rededicated the Jewish holy city to be its indivisible capital.
