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


- Scholarly publishing is a multi-billion dollar enterprise




OA Fundamentals



Terminology

- Gold OA: journalbased OA
- Green OA: repositorybased OA (field or institution)
- gratis: access is free; no reuse / repurposing of material
- libre: access is free; some reuse / repurposing of material
- toll access: not OA, available for \$


