Editorials

NYP "No Mideast Pact is Better Than One of Capitulation" Murphy has a problem. Jordan told him that the "peace initiative" will go nowhere unless Palestinians are included. So Murphy wants to talk to a representative of the Palestinians, but who? The US won't talk to the PLO on the grounds that its a terrorist organization committed to the destruction of Israel. But there are no Palestinian leaders except those in sympathy or affiliated with the PLO. That's because the PLO assassinates any alternative leaders. But Muphy and the State Dept. do not want to lose this chance. Hanna Siniora, a Palestinian with PLO connections was deemed ok to talk with. Siniora endorsed a moratorium on terrorist attacks while talks are underway. What will he endorse when talks are over? Murphy should be told that no solution at all is better than one that legitimizes someone like this.

Press Reports

NYT-AP-Murphy met with Hussein after discussing a joint Palestinian-Palestinian plan for the Mideast with the Jordanian Prime Minister and Foreign Minister. The Jordanian press agency reported that they discussed the prospects for an international conference that would include the PLO. The US did not comment on the report as of yet. (see ND-UPI)

NYP-Flick-Larry Speaks said no decision on a joint delegation had been made and reiterated the White House position that the US would under no circumstances speak to the PLO until it recognizes Israel's right to exist. The White House statement was clearly designed to placate Israel, which has issued urgent appeals for the US not to meet with a joint delegation. The Israelis have argued that a US meeting with the delegation would mean de facto recognition of the PLO.

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Israeli Military to Try General in Arab Deaths

NYT-special-Brig. Gen. Yitzhak Mordechai will be tried before a military court on two counts of unjustified use of violence for participation in the beating deaths of two Arabs who hijacked an Israeli civilian bus. The procedure is milder than a court martial, which was what was recommended by an inquiry appointed by the Israeli Attorney General. (see DN-Meisels)

Medal of the Righteous Ceremony at Israeli Consulate in NY

ND-The Medal of the Righteous will be awarded to three women who risked their lives and the lives of their families to help save Jews during the Holocaust. The ceremony takes place today at the Israeli Consulate in NY. (see DN-Poster)

Nail Studded Beirut Car Bomb Kills 12

NYT-AP-A car packed with nail-studded TNT exploded outside an apartment complex in the Christian area of Beirut. At least 12 were killed and 120 wounded. No group took responsibility. Fighting continues along the Green Line. (see NYP)

Morocco Puts Up 1550 Mile Wall

NYT-p.1-Miller-Within 10 days, Morocco will finish building a huge wall of sand and electronic sensors that is revolutionizing antiguerrilla tactics, according to senior Moroccan officials. The wall was begun 5 years ago is designed to help Rabat in its war against Polisario Front rebels. The guerrillas are armed with Soviet equipment and Western diplomats are studying the Moroccans' use of the US and French radar and sensors that are employed.

WSJ-6/12-Mark J. O'Connor, the attorney for Nazi war criminal John Demjanjuk writes that a taxpayer funded agency, the US Office of International Affairs, are the official representatives of Israel in extradition proceedings. Israel's request is based upon statements of 5 of its citizens. The Soviets are interested in having him back. But there is no evidence to suggest that Demjanjuk was responsible for the murder of 1 million Jews. The US has a strange alliance with the monolithic Soviet justice system.

SEMAAN SEMAAN (NBS Lebanon): Do you have any reaction to the Israeli rejection of any US talks with the joint Palestinian-Jordanian delegation, by Mr. Peres today?

MR. REDMAN: (Laughs.) I wouldn't, in fact, care to agree with your statement that the Israelis have rejected it. Ambassador Murphy is in Israel today. He's having talks with Israeli authorities. The objective of those talks remains the same as when he went out there, which is to see how he can best help advance the peace process.

MR. SEMAAN: Are you still hopeful, then, in light of the recent statements made by Mr. Peres?

MR. REDMAN: I really have no comment there.

Q The Justice Department, months ago, put in a request to the Department of State for the extradition of an Iranian gunrunner by the name of Cyrus Hashemi (?), currently a fugitive in London. Hashemi is on the list of the top 10 gunrunners wanted by the US Customs Department. Can you respond to the charge that the State Department has been stalling on this, on processing this extradition request, for two apparent reasons? One would be the State Department, under the Carter administration years, involvement in covering up for the Khomeini apparatus in the United States? The second would be the apparent credit lines that were extended by Merrill-Lynch, formerly headed by Don Regan, to Hashemi's trading company in New York.

MR. REDMAN: Without any comment on the various assumptions and allegations contained in your question, I'll look into the substance, as it was originally posed.

WASH. POST-Claiborne-Opposing factions of Israel's national unity govt. are close to agreement on a compromise formula for handling the Taba land dispute with Egypt and avoiding a Cabinet confrontation that could force an early election. The "inner cabinet" of 10 senior ministers heard a proposal by Yitzhak Modai that Egypt and Israel meet to work out the terms of reference that would be discussed by an arbitrator or conciliator should the current deadlock be resolved over calling one in. Under Modai's proposal, Israeli and Egyptian differences would be discussed as soon as talks could be arranged.

General To Be Tried In Arabs' Deaths

WASH. POST-(Reuter)-The Israeli Army decided not to court-martial Gen. Yitzhak Mordechai in the beating deaths of two Arabs who hijacked a bus, but instead to bring him before a milder disciplinary court. The announcement came after Israel's chief rabbi said the Army would violate Jewish law if it took action against him. "Let not a hair on the head of a savior of Israel be harmed," Chief Rabbi Mordechai Eliahu declared.

Hussein Sees Murphy, Then Meets With Arafat

WASH. POST-(UPI)-Murphy conferred with Hussein and Hussein promptly met Arafat in sessions that may lead to an American meeting with a Jordanian-Palestinian peace delegation. Murphy is in Israel today.

US Envoy's Mideast Visit Highlights Israeli Divisions

CHRISTIAN SCI. MON.-Greenberg-Further movement toward Middle East peace talks may hasten the moment of truth for Israel's divided "national unity" govt. Peres could be faced with the choice of preserving his govt. and risking deadlock on Mideast issues, or making decisions unacceptable to his coalition partner which would likely dissolve the Cabinet. The deep differences are highlighted by Israel's response to the visit of Murphy. By staunchly opposing compromise on Taba and the proposed Murphy talks, Shamir seemed intent on proving he can regain the clout his party has lost in the coalition Cabinet.

Syria's Lebanon Plan Aims For Peace, But Results In Violence

CHRISTIAN SCI. MON.-Jim Muir-Lebanon's warring Muslims and Christians are looking to Syria for help to silence the guns and get the embattled factions talking. Observers in the region link the recent violence to Syria's renewed drive to press its quarrel - some Lebanese neighbors to reach a national accord on their country's future. Some see the recent escalation of violence as an attempt to disrupt intensified, Syrian efforts to revive dialogue between the Lebanese and bring about a settlement of the war.

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Syria Reported Training Palestinian Rebels

*** WASH. TIMES-Borowiec-Syria is reported to be throwing greater support to the Palestinian rebel faction headed by Col. Abu Musaa. The idea is to have a militant Palestinian force that would "make headlines," presumably using terrorism as its main weapon. Diplomats report that in recent weeks a number of Abu Musaa supporters have been transferred from eastern Lebanon to special training camps in Syria, dominated by East German and Bulgarian instructors. Frustrated by the unending Lebanese dilemma, the Syrians are said to be turning to the "Palestinian factor." They have been unable to unseat Arafat and impose Musaa as a successor. Now it looks as though Damascus might try to revive the "Palestinian struggle" on the only available battlefield - that of international terrorism.

Car Bomb Kills 12, Wounds 118 As Beirut Violence Intensifies

WASH. POST-Boustany-The explosion of a booby-trapped car killed at least 12 persons and wounded 118 others in a densely populated low-income Christian suburb. The bomb followed a new round of fighting across the demarcation between Christian east Beirut and the mountain ridge to the southwest.

US Pathology Team Ending Mengele Case

WASH. TIMES-Rogers- The US team that identified a skeleton exhumed from a cemetery in Brazil as that of Mengele will start drafting a detailed final report in Wilmington, Del today. The report will have to be typed, finalized and retyped, Dr. Hameli said. It will then be submitted to the Justice Dept. and presumably, will be submitted later to the govts. of Brazil, West Germany and Israel. "It is our opinion that this skelton is that of Mengele within a reasonable scientific certainty," the preliminary report said.

Judith Kipper-On the Mideast



SEMAAN SEMAAN (NBS Lebanon): What can you tell us about the delegation of Jordanians and Palestinians?

MR. REDMAN: Only that Ambassador Murphy did meet with King Hussein and other Jordanian officials today, and that that's all I have for you at this moment. Those meetings, as I understand it, may just have finished. But they've been going on during the day today.

Q Where does he go from there?

MR. REDMAN: I can't give you that, for security reasons.

Q Do you have any change in the way the US looks at the Palestinian list? There are reports in Amman that four have been approved. Has there been any change in that position, that no decision has been made?

MR. REDMAN: Not at all.

Q Let me ask you a parochial question. Yesterday when you were briefing you said that the United States maintains its policy of not having any substantive discussions or negotiation with the PLO or representatives of the PLO. Were you implying that we could have procedural discussions with Palestinians who are members of the PLO?

MR. REDMAN: The statement was in reference to the potential meeting or possible meeting between a joint Jordanian-Palestinian group. In response to that question, I said that our intention, our goal, is to move through a process which leads to negotiations between the parties in the region. It was in that context that I was saying the goal of our meeting with this group is not to have a dialogue with the PLO, per se.

Q No, I understand.

MR. REDMAN: But to move the process forward.

Q I understand.

MR. REDMAN: And I think that's the most you should read into it, John.

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Q No, no, but you said in answer to another question that the policy had not changed, of not having any "substantive discussions", I think were the words you used, with the PLO, before they accept 242, 338, and Israel's right to exist. What I'm curious about is since the background official here, a couple of days ago, put a good deal of emphasis on the need for procedural discussions to set up the meeting with the joint Falestinian-Jordanian delegation, whether your use of that phrase was intended to tell us that Mr. Murphy might be having some meetings with Palestinians who are members of the PLO, in the area, while he's out there, procedural discussions?

MR. REDMAN: No. I would refer you, again, to what the briefer said that day concerning the possibility of such meetings.

Q Well, is it American policy that we will have absolutely no meetings with Palestinians who are members of the PLO, procedural or substantive?

MR. REDMAN: Well, this goes back to our definition of what kind of Palestinians might be acceptable for participation in this Jordanian-Palestinian group; and there the quote that I'm sure you have that we've repeated several times is that of the Secretary of State, where he said he was sure there were Palestinians, I think he said perhaps members of the PNC who were men of goodwill, who were ready to pursue a dialogue, so that I think that clearly states that there are Palestinians with whom one can engage in this sort of step, toward negotiations.

Q But Charles, in response to -- I mean, Shamir's concern is that the US is backing off on their 1975 agreement. I mean, is there a change? Would the US talk to members of the PLO at this point?

MR. REDMAN: I reiterate it only to say that, as I said, I think very clearly yesterday, there has been no change in that 1975 position.

MR. SEMAAN: What is this 1975 -- what is it, an understanding, an agreement, verbal, or what is it, the '75 commitment, or what, from the United States?

MR. REDMAN: It's the United States policy.

MR. SEMAAN: It has become a "policy"?

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Q Presumably your guidance is reasonably thought out before you come in here and -- (laughter) -- and I guess I'm just coming back to -- I mean, should we be surprised if Mr. Murphy meets with some Palestinians on this trip who are members of the PLO?

MR. REDMAN: I would not encourage you in any way to believe that that guidance was crafted in such a way to lead to that result.

Q Chuck, you said King Hussein met with Murphy today. Did Hanna Sinura (?) or any Palestinian, without any -- if he is non-PLO or anything -- attended the meeting? There are reports that Hanna Sinura attended the meeting.

MR. REDMAN: Ambassador Murphy met with King Hussein and members of the Jordanian government.

Q And there is no Palestinian at all?

MR. REDMAN: That's the extent of the information.

Q Will Ambassador Murphy be meeting with any of the Palestinians proposed -- who are proposed members of the joint delegation?

MR. REDMAN: I would only go back to what the briefer told you, which was, among other things, that when Ambassador Murphy is in the area he sometimes, routinely even, meets with Palestinians of various sorts, that he would not completely rule out, on this trip, a meeting with Palestinians. But, as of now, we have no information on any meetings with Palestinians. And I realize there's a lot of speculation in the area, and I hesitate to give you any definitive answers, simply because I'm not there. But, to the best of my knowledge, the answer to that question is still no.

Q A followup on that, please. Somebody from the West Bank, who is on the list, happens to be in Amman now. Do you think -- I mean, can you tell us anything about any planned meeting or willingness on the part of Secretary Murphy to meet with that individual?

MR. REDMAN: I have nothing beyond the answers to the questions I've answered today already and what the backgrounder gave you.

Q The briefer that you mentioned earlier, and whose name was mentioned earlier, said that the -- that Murphy, when he is in the region, he meets with Palestinians, both in Amman and in Jerusalem. Now, some of those people from Jerusalem happen to have left yesterday for Amman. Are we to read anything into that?

MR. REDMAN: Those people, I assume, are free to be where they want. But I just would not encourage you to put two and two together and probably get five.

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Q When you say you're not out there, that sort of implies that Murphy hasn't gone out there with tight instructions, that he has considerable leeway as developments warrant, as his practiced eye assesses the situation, to meet or not meet with Palestinians, as he deems suitable. What would it matter if you're out there or not? I mean, either he has a guidance or he has considerable leeway. So, I don't follow it. I mean, what are you trying to say? Isn't it up to Murphy to decide whether it would be productive for him to meet with Palestinians, and that there is no order to him to meet or not meet with Palestinians, it's pretty much in his hands?

MR. REDMAN: That's right. Yes. I haven't said anything different from that today.

Q But when someone asks if they should be surprised whether Murphy meets with the PLO, it's not a matter of surprise; it's up to Murphy, isn't it?

MR. REDMAN: Well, that's up to your interpretation when one is surprised and when one is not.

Q I'm not asking you about -- I'm not asking about my interpretation. I'm asking --

MR. REDMAN: I'm saying simply that, as has been clear from the start, it's within the realm of possibility that such a meeting could take place. But beyond that, we have nothing else to add.

Q Then two things sit side by side. You've got a policy that says you can't meet with the PLO, that the United States does not meet with the PLO unless certain conditions are met. And you say that policy hasn't changed. Standing right alongside that, ... sitting right alongside that, you're saying that it's really up to Murphy to decide whether he meets with the PLO or not. So, what kind of policy is that?

MR. REDMAN: No, we're not saying that at all.

Q No?

MR. REDMAN: We're saying it's up to Ambassador Murphy whether there should be a meeting with the joint Palestinian-Jordanian group. The representation of the Palestinian people within that group is based on the kind of criteria that I cited earlier in referencing a statement by Secretary Shultz of some months ago.

Q Do you have any comment on reports that the meeting will take place in Jordan within 10 days?

MR. REDMAN: No, I don't.

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Q Okay. Did the United States issue a warning to Israel about not opposing the joint delegation talks because if they will oppose it it means that the promise by Arafat to accept all United Nation Security Council resolutions, 242 and 338, Israel's right to exist, will change if Israel will continue to oppose it? Do you have any comment to these reports?

MR. REDMAN: I have really no comment on those reports whatsoever except to say that with allies and friends among the world one does not issue warnings, in any case.

Q Has the United States delivered an apology to Mr. Shamir because of the remarks of the senior US official a couple of days ago?

MR. REDMAN: No comment on that.

Q Another subject?

MR. SEMAAN: Is his visit to Egypt related to the peace process or the Tabah issue, Mr. Murphy's visit to Egypt?

MR. REDMAN: Visit to Egypt?

MR. SEMAAN: Yes.

MR. REDMAN: I really wouldn't go beyond what was described to you as the purpose of his visit in the background briefing you got. Which is that when Ambassador Murphy goes to the region I think he's perfectly free to address a broad range of issues. Clearly high on his list was the peace process. But that does not mean that one excludes or includes, necessarily, any other subject.

Q How long do you expect Murphy to stay in Amman? A couple of days or what?

MR. REDMAN: I have no prediction.

Q On the list of names, are we to expect an acceptance or rejection by the United States, or is it something we're not supposed to hear, an official acceptance or rejection, from the State Department or the US government about the list of names, submitted by Jordan?

MR. REDMAN: Well, I hope the answer to that question is clear to most others in the room, which is simply that no decision has yet been made, and that it's under consideration.

Q But when it is made we will know about it?

MR. REDMAN: If it is made, you will know about it.

Q And what is the hold? What's the waiting?

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MR. REDMAN: Because it is under consideration. What answer do you want to the question?

Q Well, four names were submitted about five weeks ago. I know the bureaucracy works slow but -- (laughs) --

MR. REDMAN: It's still under consideration.

Q Does the United States have any position about taking the Tabah conflict to international arbitration because it looks like there is taking the whole issue to arbitration between Egypt and Israel?

MR. REDMAN: No, I don't have anything on Tabah.

Q Can you look into that?

MR. REDMAN: I may have something.

Q Qadaffi has offered up to \$10 billion to Pakistan for the bombs?

MR. REDMAN: I'll look into that for you.

Q Can I come back to the PLO thing because, as I understand and you repeated today, the Secretary's criteria is that the US officials would be willing to meet with Palestinians who are PNC members, members who are also men of good will, I think something to that effect --

MR. REDMAN: -- and it went on, it was more elaborate than that. But we could get that text if you want it.

Q Just to be clear, does it make a difference whether the PNC members are also members of the PLO or not?

MR. REDMAN: I believe the way the Secretary phrased it is that he could imagine there were members of the PNC, who were also et cetera.

Q -- members of the PLO.

MR. REDMAN: I would have to look at the exact text. I think it's better to stick with the verbatim text rather than to try to paraphrase it and get it wrong.

Q Was the guidance you had yesterday about substantive discussions drafted for you or was that something that was impromptu?

MR. REDMAN: It was drafted for you.

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

WSJ-Pines "It's Syria That Counts in the Middle East" The PLO does not figure in the Arab-Israel conflict anymore, it is Syria that really counts. This goes against conventional wisdom of many US officials. The Syrian Gov't would unequivocally reject a PLO-Israeli settlement. So would Jordan who would be disappointed at losing the contest for the West Bank. Jordan would continue to compete for influence there, possibly through subversion. Even if a PLO-Israeli accord survived Syrian opposition, the Arab-Israeli conflict would continue. The Syrian military threat would remain as strong as ever. If Jordan was involved, Syria would harrass Jordan endlessly. If Syria and Israel signed a peace treaty, the conflict would be over. The PLO would disappear. Two features of Syrian foreign policy limit what the US can do to help bring about such a settlement. Assad has staked out a position as the foremost adversary of the US in the Mideast and the Soviet Union is its key ally. Assad, secondly, wishes to incorporate Israel into Syrian territory. The conflict with Israel helps Syrian leaders stay in power. Until a very different Gov't assumes power in Syria, the Arab-Israeli conflict will continue.

Dr-David Wilson "Israel Policy-Building: A Guide to the Lobby" Paul Findley of Illinois served 22 years in Congress. He was seen as a friend of the PLO and is certain that he was defeated in 1982 due to the Israeli lobby. Findley wrote a book, "They Dared to Speak Out" a thoroughly researched, frank polemical account of how the Israeli lobby has lashed out on many political figures. The awesome competence of AIPAC predisposes public figures sensibly to avoid taking positions on the Israeli-Arab conflict. Such abstinence effectively cedes the floor to Israel's allies and apologists.

Press Reports

Mormons in Israel

NYT-Freidman (photo of Orthodox Jews demonstrating against Mormons) The matter of the Mormons wish to build a new University Center in Jerusalem is threatening to turn into an international incident. Orthodox Jews insist that the Mormons have missionary activities in mind. The Mormons deny the charges. The Jews insist that Mayor Kollek was bribed into agreeing to the center by a \$1 million donation to the Jerusalem Foundation.

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Kellek dismisses these charges. The Mormons are counting on mainstream support but even moderate Israelis and US Jews who support keeping Jerusalem an open city have reservations about the Mormon activities and the size of their project.

Israel-South Africa

NYT-special-Black Chief Gatsha Buthelezi, the Zulu leader of a so-called homeland in South Africa urged Peres to influence Pretoria to reach a negotiated settlement with blacks. Peres repeated his opposition to apartheid and stated that he would express Israel's view to the South African Gov't. Israel has been criticized for its trade and military relations with South Africa. Israeli leaders defend their position by saying it was in the interest of South African Jews to maintain ties with the Gov't. Israel has not officially condemned South Africa's state of emergency decree.

*** The Nation-Cockburn 8/17-"Apartheid Alliance" B'nai B'rith's figures on economic ties between Israel and South Africa are wrong. According to B'nai B'rith, Israel's trade with South Africa accounts for only 1.5% of the total trade South Africa does, far less than trade with Arabs and other African nations. But B'nai B'rith figures do not take arms contributions and diamonds into the picture. The June issue of Israeli Foreign Affairs gives a truer picture. South Africa buys about one-third of the billion dollar worth of arms that Israel sold during 1983. Figures also exclude a great deal more. South Africa earns millions from the sale of diamonds to Israel. There are many technical advisors in South Africa who work on nuclear projects, intelligence, military ect...They send home money to Israel. Israel markets many South African produce abroad and they would not be bought directly from South Africa.

Koch & Jackson on Apartheid

DM-Rainie-Koch and Jackson got together during an anti-aprtheid rally in Washington. Jackson maintains that Israel should "be the light to the world" to which Koch responded, "Jews don't want to leap into the fire alone." Koch believes that all countries should cut economic ties with South Africa as opposed to singling out Israel.

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SAMIR KHARAM (Arab-American Media Service): You're hardening your position. In your earlier position you never said anything about indirect or prenegotiations. I think this is a new twist in your position. You didn't make this clear before, about indirect or prenegotiations.

MR. REDMAN: I think that's always been part of our position. I think that's been perfectly clear, that the two ways in which we have characterized our approach to this possible meeting with a joint group is that we have to have mutually acceptable and mutually agreeable conditions and modalities and, secondly, that this lead toward our goal of direct negotiations between the parties, and that, by implication, that is to say, that our goal in these meetings is not, if you will, a dialogue with the PLD, but rather, part of a process that has to move toward this goal of direct negotiations.

Q Was this conveyed in a letter from Shultz to the Israeli government just before Murphy left?

MR. REDMAN: I really have no comment on any diplomatic exchanges. But our position is as I have stated it. That's all I can say on that.

Q Yesterday the administration official who briefed here gave me the impression, at least, that Foreign Minister Shamir was not necessarily speaking for the entire Israeli government when he raised public objections to the US meeting, possible meeting, with the joint delegation. Can you clarify that? Do you believe, especially in light of Ambassador Rosenne's meeting with the Secretary yesterday afternoon, do you believe that the objections expressed by Foreign Minister Shamir accurately express the feelings of the Israeli government in general?

MR. REDMAN: I would limit my answer to saying as Foreign Minister Mr. Shamir is the spokesman for the policies adopted by the government of Israel. I would have nothing further to add as to their substance.

Q Well, have you received any -- in the wake of that briefing that we had yesterday have you received any indications from the Israeli government that this is so, that, in fact, Shamir is speaking for the Prime Minister as well as the rest of the Cabinet?

MR. REDMAN: I will stick by my statement which simply says that Mr. Shamir speaks for the government of Israel, as Foreign Minister.

SEMAAN SEMAAN (BBC): Is it your understanding that Mr. Shamir opposes the participation of PLD representatives when he speaks about a Palestinian-Jordanian delegation meeting with US officials?

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MR. REDMAN: I would really not care to characterize the Foreign Minister's position. He can speak for himself.

Q King Hassan of Morocco said in a press conference on Saturday that he will meet President Reagan to tell him about what happened in the summit. Do you have any idea when he is coming or when he is meeting with President Reagan?

MR. REDMAN: No. To the best of my knowledge we have, at this point, no further information on that proposed trip that was reported out of the summit.

MR. REDMAN: Anything else on the Middle East?

Q Well, actually, as long as we're on it, do you have anything on Congressman O'Brien's meeting with Assad?

MR. REDMAN: No, I don't. I have no details.

Q But you can confirm that it happened and they talked about the hostages?

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MR. REDMAN: In terms of the substance of the meeting, I have no comment. The fact that the meeting occurred, yes.

Q Let me ask one thing also. Is the meeting with the delegation still an option, the joint delegation, still an option?

MR. REDMAN: Oh, definitely. There's no change from what you were told yesterday. In fact, I think that question has been answered, and then some.

MR. SEMAAN: A last shot on Mr. Shamir's position. Do you sense any change in his position?

MR. REDMAN: (Laughs.) Again, that would be characterizing his position, as it evolves. I'm not going to do that. Sorry.

MR. KHARAM: Whom will Murphy be meeting tomorrow?

MR. REDMAN: I don't have that.

THE MEASURE OF MEIR KAHANE

BOSTON GLOBE In the last Israeli elections Rabbi Meir Kahane, the American Neo-fascist, received about 26,000 votes, or about one of every hundred. His party occupies one of the 120 Knesset seats, three fewer than the Communists. Kahane is antidemocratic, so his slowly growing popularity is important for Americans. Anything that threatens Israel threatens other democracies because Israel is the only democracy in the Middle East. The 208-year-old experiment in American democracy has outlived bigots and demagogues. The 37-year-old experiment in Israel democracy needs the support of all democracies.

ISRAEL AND SOUTH AFRICA

THE EVENING SUN Over the weekend Israel finally has joined the community of nations with the explicit condemnation of South Africa's policy of apartheid. Belated as it is, this is a welcomed step. The condemnation of south African apartheid will serve not merely to hold Israel to it's great heritage but also will serve as a warning that the evil system of making citizenship conditional upon race must not be allowed to arise in Israel - even under the figleaf of "security" or "occupation".

THE FOLLOWING IS A TRANSCRIPT OF A BACKGROUND BRIEFING.
ON AMBASSADOR MURPHY'S TRIP TO THE MIDDLE EAST.

SENIOR ADMINISTRATION OFFICIAL: I WON'T BORE YOU OR PUT
YOU TO SLEEP WITH ANY STATEMENTS SINCE I THINK YOU MIGHT
HAVE SOME QUESTIONS. SO WHY DON'T WE GO RIGHT TO
QUESTIONS.

Q. CAN YOU TELL US WHETHER A DECISION WILL BE MADE DURING
THE COURSE OF THIS TRIP TO MEET WITH THE
JORDANIAN-PALESTINIAN DELEGATION?

A. IT'S AN OPTION, BUT NO FINAL DECISION HAS BEEN MADE
REGARDING AMBASSADOR MURPHY'S PARTICIPATING IN SUCH A
MEETING.

Q. WHO WILL HE SEE OUT THERE?

A. WITHOUT GOING INTO THE ORDER OF STOPS FOR OBVIOUS
SECURITY REASONS, HE'LL BE VISITING ISRAEL, JORDAN AND

EGYPT. THAT'S THE PRESENT PLAN. IT'S POSSIBLE THAT THE
TRIP MIGHT BE EXPANDED, BUT NO DECISIONS HAVE BEEN MADE
ON ADDITIONAL STOPS YET.

Q. WHAT DO YOU MEAN BY "HE WILL VISIT SHORTLY," BECAUSE
YOU'VE BEEN SAYING THAT WORD FOR THE LAST MONTH? WHAT DO
YOU MEAN "SHORTLY?" IN THE COMING TWO DAYS, IN THE
COMING WEEK, OR WHAT?

A. HE WILL BE IN THE AREA IN THE NEXT SEVERAL DAYS.

Q. A COUPLE OF DAYS?

A. YES.

Q. HE HASN'T LEFT ALREADY?

A. HE HAS NOT LEFT.

Q. WHEN DOES HE LEAVE?

A. ONCE AGAIN, FOR SECURITY REASONS, I TRY NOT TO GET INTO THE DETAILS OF HIS TRAVEL PLANS IN ADVANCE.

Q. WILL HE BE GOING TO JORDAN FIRST AND THEN ISRAEL AND EGYPT, OR VICE VERSA?

A. ONCE AGAIN, THE PEOPLE IN SY ARE STANDING OUTSIDE WITH HANDCUFFS AND SAID IF I GET INTO THE DETAILS OF THE ITINERARY THEY'RE TAKING ME AWAY.

HE WILL BE VISITING ALL THREE, AND I'D SAY THAT IT'S OPEN THAT HE MIGHT BE MAKING OTHER STOPS BUT I CAN'T GET INTO THE DETAILS. I'M SORRY.

Q. WHAT IS THE STATUS OF THE U.S. CONSIDERATION OF THE PALESTINIAN LIST?

A. WE'VE MADE NO FINAL DECISION. IT'S OBVIOUSLY GOING TO BE A MAJOR TOPIC FOR DISCUSSION WHEN ASSISTANT SECRETARY MURPHY IS OUT THERE.

BUT AS WE SAID BEFORE, I THINK IT'S WRONG TO FOCUS ALL THE ATTENTION ON THE LIST. THE REALLY ESSENTIAL QUESTION ABOUT A MEETING WITH A JORDANIAN-PALESTINIAN DELEGATION IS, WE'RE PREPARED TO TAKE PART IF TWO THINGS HAPPEN: IF ARRANGEMENTS CAN BE MUTUALLY AGREED, AND IF THE MEETING CLEARLY LEADS TO OUR COMMON OBJECTIVE OF DIRECT NEGOTIATIONS BETWEEN THE PARTIES. THAT'S ONE OF THE KEY

ISSUES THAT AMBASSADOR MURPHY WILL BE DISCUSSING.

Q. WHAT'S THE OTHERS?

Q. WHAT IS THE OBSTACLE IN THE WAY OF MEETING WITH THE JORDANIAN-PALESTINIAN DELEGATION AT PRESENT? WHY A DECISION HAS NOT BEEN MADE YET?

Q. WHAT SEEMS TO BE THE PROBLEM?

A. WE'VE BEEN EXCHANGING CABLES AND MESSAGES FOR THE PAST COUPLE WEEKS AND FEEL THAT WE'VE REACHED A POINT; THE PROCESS HAS MOVED FAR ENOUGH ALONG. IT WOULD BE VERY USEFUL FOR AMBASSADOR MURPHY TO GO OUT AND HAVE SOME DIRECT DISCUSSIONS WITH OUR FRIENDS IN THE REGION.

OBVIOUSLY, ONE OF THE ISSUES THAT'S GOING TO BE DISCUSSED IS HOW DOES ANY MURPHY MEETING FIT INTO THE CONTEXT OF PROGRESS TOWARD DIRECT NEGOTIATIONS.

Q. COULD YOU JUST SAY WHAT SPECIFIC DEVELOPMENTS HAVE LED THE ADMINISTRATION TO CONCLUDE THAT THE TIME IS RIGHT NOW FOR MURPHY TO GO BACK TO THE MIDDLE EAST?

A. IT WAS ORIGINALLY PLANNED THAT AMBASSADOR MURPHY WOULD MAKE THIS TRIP BEFORE THE CASABLANCA SUMMIT. IN OTHER WORDS, THAT WAS THE ORIGINAL THINKING. THAT WAS DELAYED BECAUSE OF JUST CONVENIENCE OF SCHEDULING IN THE REGION.

I THINK WE'VE REACHED THE POINT THAT, SAY, WE'VE EXCHANGED A NUMBER OF MESSAGES WITH ALL THE LEADERS IN THE REGION AND FEEL THAT WE'VE MADE SOME PROGRESS IN THOSE EXCHANGE OF MESSAGES. BUT IN ORDER TO HELP THE PROCESS ALONG, IT WAS TIME FOR DICK TO GO OUT AND ENGAGE IN THE KIND OF DIRECT DISCUSSIONS THAT ARE ALWAYS HELPFUL IN THIS KIND OF VENTURE.

Q. CAN WE CONSIDER THAT THE COMMUNIQUE ISSUED BY THE SUMMIT PUSE YOU TO HAVE THIS DECISION -- I MEAN, TO SEND MURPHY TO THE MIDDLE EAST? WAS IT ONE OF THE FACTORS?

A. NO. THE DECISION WAS MADE TO GO BEFORE THE SUMMIT MET.

Q. THEN, WHAT DO YOU THINK ABOUT THE COMMUNIQUE WHICH WAS ISSUED BY THE SUMMIT? YOU PUT A LOT OF EMPHASIS ON IT ON MONDAY, SO WHAT DO YOU THINK? DO YOU HAVE ANY EVALUATION OF IT?

A. I'M NOT GOING TO GET INTO A DETAILED ASSESSMENT OF WHAT WE THINK ABOUT THE SUMMIT COMMUNIQUE. THE SUMMIT COMMUNIQUE MAKES A NUMBER OF POINTS ON THE PEACE PROCESS AND OTHER ISSUES. ON EACH OF THOSE INDIVIDUAL POINTS, OUR POSITIONS AND POLICIES ARE WELL KNOWN. BUT WE DON'T THINK IT'S IN OUR INTEREST TO GET INTO A DETAILED EXEGESIS, AS WE SAY IN THE MIDDLE EAST BUREAU.

Q. CAN YOU JUST SAY WHETHER YOU WERE HAPPY WITH IT, DISAPPOINTED? DID IT FURTHER THE PEACE PROCESS, IN GENERAL?

A. NO, I'M NOT GOING TO CHARACTERIZE OUR POSITION.

Q. YOU SAID YOU ARE LOOKING FOR THE CONFERENCE TO RE-ENFORCE KING HUSSEIN'S INITIATIVE. DID IT ENFORCE IT OR NOT; A SIMPLE QUESTION?

A. I THINK YOUR READING OF THE COMMUNIQUE WOULD ANSWER THAT QUESTION.

Q. DID MR. WHITEHEAD REQUEST FROM KING HUSSEIN, WHEN HE WAS IN AMMAN, A NEW LIST OF PALESTINIANS IN THE JOINT JORDANIAN-PALESTINIAN DELEGATION? AND WHAT DO YOU COMMENT ON THE LIST AS IT WAS SUBMITTED TO YOU LAST MONTH?

A. I'M NOT GOING TO GET INTO THE DETAILS OF THE CONVERSATIONS THAT THE DEPUTY SECRETARY HAD. AND OBVIOUSLY ONE OF THE ISSUES THAT AMBASSADOR MURPHY WILL

BE DISCUSSING IS THE LIST AND OUR VIEWS ON THE LIST, AND I'M NOT GOING TO PREVIEW THAT NOW.

Q. I WANT TO BE SURE ABOUT IT. DID YOU REQUEST A NEW LIST OR NOT? THAT'S THE QUESTION. BECAUSE THERE HAVE BEEN REPORTS IN THE ARAB WORLD THAT YOU REQUESTED A NEW LIST FROM THE JORDANIANS -- THE PALESTINIANS?

A. WE HAVE NOT MADE A DECISION YET ON THE LIST.

Q. GIVEN THE LESS THAN HEARTY ENDORSEMENT BY THE CASABLANCA SUMMIT OF THE JORDANIAN-PALESTINIAN PROPOSAL, AND ISRAEL'S REJECTION OF THE PROCESS AS WE SEE IT, WHAT GIVES YOU GROUNDS FOR OPTIMISM AT THIS POINT?

A. HAVING DEALT WITH THE MIDDLE EAST FOR 13 YEARS, I WONDER WHAT GIVES ANYBODY GROUNDS FOR OPTIMISM AT ANY TIME. (LAUGHTER)

THAT ASIDE, A NUMBER OF THINGS HAVE HAPPENED RECENTLY WHICH INDICATE TO US THAT THE PROCESS DOES HAVE A CHANCE

OF WORKING. WE HAD KING HUSSEIN'S VISIT; HAD THE PUBLIC STATEMENTS HE MADE, ALL OF THEM WHICH WERE VERY SUPPORTIVE OF THE PROCESS. WE HAVE PRIME MINISTER PERES MAKING A VERY SUPPORTIVE SPEECH IN THE KNESSET ON JUNE 10, WHICH WAS ALSO SUPPORTIVE OF THE PROCESS.

PRIOR TO THAT, OF COURSE, WE HAD THE FEBRUARY 11 AGREEMENT WHICH WE THINK WAS A VERY HELPFUL STEP. WE THINK ALL THE PARTIES ARE SERIOUS ABOUT MOVING TO NEGOTIATIONS AND FINDING A PEACEFUL RESOLUTION TO THE CONFLICT, AND ALL THOSE ARE VERY POSITIVE THINGS.

WE, FROM THE BEGINNING, HAVE SAID THAT WE DON'T EXPECT PYROTECHNICS. WE DON'T EXPECT MAJOR UNEXPECTED BREAKTHROUGHS.

THE EIGHTH PART OF THE REPORT IS A SUMMARY OF THE WORK DONE DURING THE YEAR. IT IS DIVIDED INTO TWO MAIN PARTS, THE FIRST OF WHICH DEALS WITH THE GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF THE SUBJECT AND THE SECOND WITH THE RESULTS OF THE INVESTIGATION.

A. THERE ARE TWO ISSUES. ONE IS MUTUALLY-AGREED ARRANGEMENTS; AND SECOND IS, ALL PARTIES AGREE IT HAS TO LEAD TO A COMMON OBJECTIVE OF NEGOTIATIONS. IT'S MUCH MORE IMPORTANT THAN THE FIRST. THE SECOND IS THE ISSUE THAT AMBASSADOR MURPHY IS GOING TO BE EMPHASIZING DURING HIS DISCUSSIONS UP THERE.

Q. WHAT DO YOU MEAN BY "MUTUAL ARRANGEMENTS?" WHAT DOES THAT MEAN IN ENGLISH?

A. I THINK IT'S RE-ENFORCING MODALITIES.

IT INVOLVES ISSUES RANGING FROM WHO SITS DOWN AT THE TABLE TO OTHER THINGS THAT WE'RE ALL INTERESTED IN, LIKE PRESS CONVERGENCE, LIKE STATEMENTS, LIKE VENUE. JUST THE PARTICULARS OF HOW IT'S GOING TO BE ARRANGED.

Q. COULD YOU HELP US ON SOMETHING YOU JUST SAID. YOU SAID IN THE PAST SEVERAL WEEKS, AS I THOUGHT I HEARD IT, THERE HAS NOT BEEN ANY DRAMATIC -- THE SITUATION IS NOT DRAMATICALLY CHANGED. OF COURSE, THE WORD "DRAMATICALLY" IS OPERATIVE HERE. WE'VE HAD THE SHAMIR STATEMENT ON FRIDAY. WE HAD THE COMMUNIQUE FROM CASABLANCA. THESE ARE NOT IMPORTANT, NOT DRAMATIC? WHAT ARE THEY?

A. THEY'RE CERTAINLY IMPORTANT. WHAT I MEANT BY "DRAMATIC" IS THAT YOU DON'T -- WE COULD ALL ENVISION DRAMATIC STEPS. A SADAT VISIT TO JERUSALEM, I'D ASSUME, YOU WOULD CALL DRAMATIC. I'M SAYING THE PROCESS CONTINUES, THAT THERE HAS BEEN MOVEMENT. WE DON'T THINK THE CASABLANCA COMMUNIQUE LEADS TO ANY DRAMATIC DEPARTURES IN THE PEACE PROCESS.

THE FOREIGN MINISTER'S STATEMENT REFLECTS HIS VIEWS. ONCE AGAIN, I DON'T THINK THAT LEADS TO A DRAMATIC DEPARTURE IN WHAT WE'RE TRYING TO ACHIEVE.

Q. HE IS NOT GOING TO SAUDI ARABIA. ARE YOU WRITING SAUDI ARABIA OUT OF THE PEACE PROCESS?

A. WE SAID RIGHT NOW HE PLANS ON THREE STOPS, AND OTHERS MIGHT WELL BE ADDED.

Q. WHAT IS THE CURRENT AMERICAN ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE LIST OF PALESTINIANS THAT WE'VE BEEN GIVEN -- THE SEVEN? AS FAR AS I RECALL, A COUPLE OF DAYS AGO WE WERE STILL CONSIDERING THE LIST.

A. THAT'S RIGHT. AND WE HAVEN'T MADE ANY FINAL DECISIONS ON THE LIST OF NAMES.

ONE THING I MENTIONED EARLIER, THOUGH, IS, WHEN LOOKING AT THE MURPHY MEETING, I THINK -- AND WE'VE DONE IT AS WELL -- WE ALL TEND TO FOCUS ON THE SPECIFIC NAMES, THIS ONE CAN BE CHECKED YES AND THAT ONE CAN BE CHECKED NO. WHAT WE HAVE TO DO, AND WE ARE DOING, IS REALIZING THAT WHEN YOU TALK ABOUT A MURPHY MEETING, YOU TALK ABOUT

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A. I THINK IT'S ...

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PROCESS , NAMES ARE ONLY ONE ELEMENT IN THAT MEETING.
IT'S AN IMPORTANT ELEMENT BUT IT'S ONLY A DISCREET
ELEMENT.

THE MUCH BROADER QUESTION IS, HOW THE MEETING LEADS TO
WHERE WE ALL WANT TO GO.

Q. AM I CORRECT IN ASSUMING THAT THE UNITED STATES WOULD
BE WILLING TO MEET WITH DIFFERENT PALESTINIANS THAN MIGHT
ACTUALLY SIT DOWN IN A JORDANIAN-PALESTINIAN NEGOTIATION?

A. WE'RE NOT PREJUDGING WHERE AND WHO MIGHT EVENTUALLY BE
ENGAGED IN NEGOTIATIONS -- I MEAN A JORDANIAN AND ISRAELI
NEGOTIATION.

Q. IS IT CONCEIVABLE THAT MURPHY MAY MEET WITH SOME OF
THE PALESTINIANS ON THAT LIST ON THIS TRIP?

A. WE KNOW THAT MOST OF THE TIME DICK HAS BEEN IN THE
AREA HE'S MET WITH PALESTINIANS, BOTH IN JERUSALEM AND
AMMAN. WHAT IS VERY IMPORTANT IS, IF HE HAS ANY KIND OF
A MEETING LIKE THAT, THAT IT ISN'T A SUBSTITUTE IN ANY
WAY FOR THE MURPHY MEETING WITH THE JOINT
JORDANIAN/PALESTINIAN DELEGATION. BUT I DON'T WANT TO
MISLEAD YOU: IT'S CERTAINLY POSSIBLE THAT DICK WILL BE
MEETING WITH SOME PALESTINIANS, BUT THEY WILL BE IN THE
SAME CATEGORY OF PALESTINIANS THAT HE'S ALWAYS MET WITH.

Q. I UNDERSTAND THAT, SIR. BUT INCLUDING PALESTINIANS ON
THAT LIST OF SEVEN?

A. I'M NOT GOING TO GET INTO SPECIFICALLY WHOM HE MIGHT
MEET WITH. THERE ARE NO PLANS FOR THAT KIND OF MEETING.

Q. DO YOU AGREE OR DISAGREE WITH PERES, FOR EXAMPLE, HE
PICKED TWO ON THE LIST? DO YOU AGREE WITH HIM OR
DISAGREE ON THE TWO HE PICKED FROM THE LIST?

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A. I THINK ONCE WE MAKE UP OUR MIND ON THE LIST, WE'LL LET EVERYONE KNOW.

Q. NO, BUT WHAT ABOUT THESE TWO? I MEAN, WHICH --

A. I'M NOT GOING TO GET INTO WHETHER OR NOT WE FIND THOSE TWO ACCEPTABLE.

Q. DO YOU THINK AS A RESULT OF THIS VISIT OF MR. MURPHY, AS THE RESULT OF THESE CONVERSATIONS THAT HE WILL BE CONDUCTING, HE WILL COME BACK WITH APPROVAL OR DISAPPROVAL OF THE LIST OR A NEW LIST, OR WHAT WILL HAPPEN?

A. OUR ASSUMPTION AND HOPE IS THAT HE'LL COME BACK SHOWING SOME PROGRESS IN THE PROCESS; BUT AS TO WHAT THAT WOULD SPECIFICALLY MEAN, WE'LL HAVE TO SEE HOW HIS TALKS GO.

Q. CAN I GET BACK TO THE QUESTION THAT WAS ASKED, AND YOU SAID, "THAT'S AN OPTION," I WANT TO MAKE SURE I UNDERSTAND -- THAT IT IS AN OPTION THAT THE WHOLE THING COULD BE WORKED OUT WHILE HE IS OVER THERE AND HE COULD ACTUALLY SIT DOWN ON THIS TRIP, WITH THE JOINT DELEGATION, AND HOLD THE MEETING? THAT'S AN OPTION?

A. IT'S AN OPTION.

Q. HOW LIVE AN OPTION? WOULD YOU GIVE US AN ASSESSMENT OF HOW REALISTIC YOU THINK THAT REALLY IS? AND HOW LONG IS HE PLANNING TO BE IN THE REGION?

A. I WAS THE SAME GUY THAT, WHEN THE SHAH WAS OVERTHROWN, AND I'D SERVED IN IRAN FOR FIVE YEARS, SIX MONTHS BEFORE, I WAS ASKED, "WHAT ARE THE CHANCES OF THE SHAH BEING OVERTHROWN?"

I SAID, "I KNOW THIS COUNTRY WELL, AND THERE'S NOT A CHANCE IN THE WORLD HE'S GOING TO BE OVERTHROWN." SO I'M A LITTLE BIT HESITANT TO MAKE ANY KIND OF PREDICTIONS AS TO WHAT IS GOING TO WORK OR WHAT ISN'T GOING TO WORK.

Q. WHAT ABOUT OPTIONS YOU ARE TALKING? YOU SAID ONE OPTION THAT HE WILL MEET WITH THEM. WHAT OTHER OPTIONS DO YOU HAVE, TO COME BACK WITHOUT ANY MEETING? WHAT OTHER OPTIONS, CAN YOU TELL US?

A. THAT'S ANOTHER OPTION.

Q. AND WHAT OTHER? I MEAN WHAT OTHER? THAT MEANS A FAILURE, DOESN'T IT?

A. HMM?

Q. IT WILL BE A FAILURE AT THAT TIME, THEN?

A. IT DEPENDS ON WHAT COMES OUT OF THE TALKS.

Q. WHAT OTHER OPTIONS BESIDES THESE TWO OPTIONS?

A. I'M NOT GOING TO GET INTO THE DETAILS OF WHAT KIND OF PLANS WE MIGHT HAVE OR MIGHT NOT HAVE.

Q. ARE THE JORDANIANS STILL DEMANDING THAT THIS MEETING TO BE A FIRST STEP IN THE DIRECT STEP OF U.S. RECOGNITION OF THE PLO?

A. AS FAR AS I KNOW, THAT'S STILL THE KING'S VIEW. WE'VE TOLD THE KING, WE'VE SAID PUBLICLY THAT WE DON'T SEE THAT AS THE PROPER, THE BEST WAY TO PROCEED.

Q. AS YOU KNOW KING HUSSEIN HAD SAID HE HOPED THAT THERE WOULD BE DIRECT NEGOTIATIONS BEFORE THE END OF THIS YEAR. DO WE STILL CONSIDER THAT A REALISTIC POSSIBILITY?

A. STILL A HOPEFUL POSSIBILITY.

Q. WHAT HAPPENED TO THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE IDEA? WHERE IS THAT RIGHT NOW? ARE WE STILL TRYING TO DISSUADE THE KING FROM PUSHING THAT LINE?

A. ONE OF THE MAJOR STEPS FORWARD, I THINK, IN THIS PEACE PROCESS OVER THE PAST NINE MONTHS, IN MY VIEW, HAS BEEN

THAT FOR THE FIRST TIME, EVERYBODY WHO IS INVOLVED IS TALKING ABOUT PROCESS -- ISN'T TALKING ABOUT GUARANTEED OUTCOMES. AS YOU KNOW, FOR THE LAST 18 YEARS, THE ARAB SIDE HAS GENERALLY SAID THEY'RE NOT GOING TO SIT DOWN AND

NEGOTIATE TIL THEY KNOW WHAT IS GOING TO HAPPEN, AND WE'VE BEEN VERY "AMERICAN" ABOUT IT, SAYING, "THAT ISN'T THE WAY YOU DO THINGS. YOU'VE GOT TO NEGOTIATE; YOU'VE GOT TO TALK ABOUT PROCESS."

WELL, KING HUSSEIN NOW IS, IN A WAY, SPEAKING "AMERICAN." HE'S SAYING THAT, "O.K. LET'S TALK ABOUT

PROCESS. LET'S NOT TALK ABOUT GUARANTEED OUTCOME."

THAT'S BEEN A MAJOR^P STEP^P FORWARD.

IT SO HAPPENS THAT WE DISAGREE ON THE STEPS OF THAT PROCESS THAT ARE GOING TO LEAD TO NEGOTIATIONS, BUT I WOULD MUCH RATHER HAVE DISCUSSIONS WITH THE KING--THE PROCESS WHERE WE AGREE AND DISAGREE--THAN BE BACK WHERE WE WERE A YEAR AGO, WHICH IS TRYING TO DIFFERENTIATE BETWEEN A GUARANTEED OUTCOME AND A PROCESS.

THERE ARE AT LEAST TWO ISSUES THAT HAVE TO BE ADDRESSED IN ANY PROCESS: ONE IS, THE KING HAS TALKED ABOUT AN INTERNATIONAL CONTEXT FOR THE NEGOTIATIONS; SECOND IS THE OBVIOUS ISSUE OF REPRESENTATION OF THE PALESTINIAN PEOPLE. WE DON'T HAVE ANSWERS YET ON THOSE TWO ISSUES. WE'VE GOT SOME IDEAS, AND WE'LL BE TALKING ABOUT THOSE KINDS OF IDEAS. BUT THE FACT IS, THAT'S HOW NEGOTIATIONS WORK; AND SO THOSE ARE TWO OF THE ISSUES IN THE PROCESS WE'RE GOING TO BE FOCUSING ON.

Q. YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE. HOW SIGNIFICANT ARE THE OVERTURES THAT HAVE BEEN GOING ON BETWEEN ISRAEL AND THE SOVIET UNION?

A. IT'S REALLY -- IT'S HARD TO JUDGE.

WE'VE ALWAYS SAID THE SOVIETS HAD IMPORTANT INTERESTS IN THE AREA. WE HAVEN'T DENIED THAT. WE'VE ALSO SAID THAT WE DON'T SEE THE SOVIETS PLAYING A HELPFUL ROLE IN THE PROCESS NOW BECAUSE THEY DON'T SUPPORT THE KIND OF PROCESS THAT ALL THE PARTIES WANT TO SEE WORK IN THE REGION. ANY KIND OF ASSESSMENT OF THESE REPORTED CONTACTS BETWEEN THE SOVIET UNION AND ISRAEL IS DIFFICULT TO MAKE. AS I SAY, WE DON'T KNOW THE CONTENT OF THE CONTACTS.

MY OWN ASSUMPTION IS THAT THE SOVIET UNION, WE KNOW, IS VERY INTERESTED IN WHAT IS GOING ON IN THE PEACE PROCESS, FOR INSTANCE, WHAT'S GOING ON IN THE MIDDLE EAST; AND I THINK THEY ARE LOOKING AT THEIR OWN OPTIONS AND TRYING TO KEEP SOME DOORS OPEN, BUT I CAN'T GO FURTHER THAN THAT.

Q. WHAT IS THE POSSIBILITY OF SEEKING SOME KIND OF A SECURITY COUNCIL UMBRELLA FOR THIS PEACE EFFORT THIS FALL? IS THAT A POSSIBILITY?

A. IT IS ONE POSSIBILITY THE JORDANIANS HAVE MENTIONED.

Q. HOW DO WE FEEL ABOUT IT?

A. IT'S ONE OF THE ISSUES THAT WILL UNDOUBTEDLY BE DISCUSSED WHEN AMBASSADOR MURPHY IS IN THE AREA.

WE KEEP GOING BACK TO OUR CRITERIA OF WHAT IS GOING TO MAKE IT WORK, AND WE HAVE TO ASK OURSELVES, "DOES SECURITY COUNCIL INVOLVEMENT" -- WHICH MEANS IMPLICITLY THE NEED FOR SOVIET ACQUIESCENCE, IF NOT SUPPORT, FOR WHAT WE'RE DOING -- "WHETHER THAT IS GOING TO HELP THE

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PROCESS WORK OR NOT?" WE'RE SKEPTICAL ABOUT THAT, AND WE REMAIN S&EPTICAL. CERTAINLY, WE'D LIKE TO BE CONVINCED OTHERWISE, BUT RIGHT NOW, WE HAVE REAL QUESTIONS ABOUT THE VIABILITY OF THAT OPTION.

Q. WHEN YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT THE REPRESENTATION OF THE PALESTINIAN PEOPLE, WHAT ARE WE TALKING ABOUT, THE PEOPLE WHO LIVE AND INHABIT THE WEST BANK AND GAZA, OR ARE WE TALKING OF GOLAN, OR WHATEVER, OR ARE WE TALKING ABOUT SOMETHING MORE WIDESPREAD THAN THAT, INCLUDING PALESTINIANS IN JORDAN, IN LEBANON, IN SAUDI ARABIA, KUWAIT, WHATEVER?

A. WELL, WE'VE ALWAYS FELT THAT ANY SETTLEMENT TO THE MIDDLE EAST PROBLEM, FIRST, MUST TAKE ACCOUNT OF THE PEOPLE IN THE AREAS CONCERNED -- THE PALESTINIANS LIVING IN THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES. WE'VE ALSO SAID THAT THE PALESTINIANS IN THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES HAVE TO HAVE A FULL SAY IN THEIR OWN GOVERNANCE.

AS TO WHO BEST CAN REPRESENT THE PALESTINIAN PEOPLE IN A NEGOTIATION, THAT'S ONE THING THAT KING HUSSEIN IS SEIZED WITH, AND YOU GET INTO THE QUESTION OF WHAT INDIVIDUALS MIGHT REPRESENT THE PALESTINIANS IN A NEGOTIATION.

IN TERMS OF THE MURPHY MEETING, THAT'S OBVIOUSLY ONE OF THE ISSUES THAT HE'S GOING TO BE DISCUSSING. IF YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT THE FINAL, OR THE PEACE NEGOTIATIONS THEMSELVES, IT'S AN ISSUE TO WHICH WE JUST DON'T HAVE AN ANSWER YET. IT'S A QUESTION THAT WE'VE GOT TO ADDRESS.

Q. ARE YOU SAYING THAT THE SHAMIR STATEMENTS ON FRIDAY DO NOT REPRESENT THE VIEW OF THE ISRAELI GOVERNMENT?

A. I DIDN'T SAY THAT. I SAID IT WAS THE FOREIGN MINISTER SPEAKING, AND CERTAINLY WE TAKE ACCOUNT OF THOSE VIEWS. I DID SAY THAT THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL, THE GOVERNMENT OF JORDAN, AND OURSELVES HAVE ALL SAID THAT THE PURPOSE

THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF STATE HAS THE HONOR TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE RECEIPT OF YOUR LETTER OF THE 15TH INSTANT AND TO INFORM YOU THAT THE MATTER IS BEING CONSIDERED BY THE APPROPRIATE AGENCIES.

YOUR REQUEST FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING THE MATTER IS BEING HANDLED BY THE OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AND THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE. YOU WILL BE KEPT ADVISED OF ANY DEVELOPMENTS.

PLEASE BE ADVISED THAT THE MATTER IS BEING HANDLED AS A MATTER OF COURTESY AND IS NOT BEING TREATED AS A MATTER OF PRIORITY.

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OF A MURPHY MEETING IS TO EXPEDITE THE PROCESS LEADING TO NEGOTIATIONS. AND THAT'S THE WAY WE ALL VIEW THE MEETING.

Q. THAT WAS IN JUNE. HERE IT IS THE -- THE STATEMENT MADE ON AUGUST 9 BY THE FOREIGN MINISTER OF THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL -- ISN'T THAT WHAT IS NOW THE PREVAILING POSITION OF THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL? ISN'T THAT NORMAL WHEN A FOREIGN MINISTER SPEAKS OUT LIKE THAT THAT IT IS ASSUMED, AT LEAST, THAT HE IS SPEAKING FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL?

A. WE CERTAINLY MAKE THAT ASSUMPTION. I WOULD GO BACK, THOUGH, TO THE POINT THAT ALSO THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL SAID NUMEROUS TIMES -- AND THE FOREIGN MINISTER HAS AGREED WITH THIS -- THAT WHATEVER CAN BE DONE TO MOVE THE PROCESS FORWARD LEADING TO DIRECT NEGOTIATIONS, THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL SUPPORTS THAT.

UNTIL WE MAKE SOME DECISIONS ABOUT LISTS, ABOUT WHETHER OR NOT TO HAVE A MEETING, ABOUT WHAT IS GOING TO COME OUT OF A MEETING, I WOULD REALLY RATHER NOT GET INTO CONJECTURE ABOUT WHETHER OR NOT IT WOULD MEET THE CONCERNS THAT FOREIGN MINISTER SHAMIR EXPRESSED.

Q. WOULD MR. MURPHY, HOPEFULL, BE ABLE TO TALK WITH THE FOREIGN MINISTER ON THIS VISIT?

A. I'M PRETTY SURE THAT HE'LL HAVE AN APPOINTMENT, YES.

Q. I'VE BEEN AWAY FOR THE PAST MONTH IN PLACES WHERE PEOPLE HAVEN'T BEEN PAYING MUCH ATTENTION TO THE MIDDLE EAST, BUT IT WAS MY IMPRESSION BEFORE I LEFT, THAT DESPITE WHAT YOU HAVE SAID CHARACTERIZING THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL'S POSITION, MY IMPRESSION BEFORE WAS THAT THE ISRAELI GOVERNMENT ALSO HAD THE POSITION THAT IT CATEGORICALLY OPPOSED A MEETING BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND A DELEGATION -- A PALESTINIAN/JORDANIAN DELEGATION TO WHICH ISRAEL WOULD NOT BE A PARTY. AM I INCORRECT, OR HAS THERE BEEN A CHANGE?

A. I THINK THERE HAVE BEEN VARIOUS STATEMENTS OUT OF ISRAEL OVER THE PAST MONTH-AND-A-HALF, TWO MONTHS, THE MOST RECENT ONE BEING THE STATEMENT OF THE FOREIGN MINISTER --

Q. -- WHICH WOULD SEEM TO REINFORCE WHAT I'VE JUST SAID.

A. LET'S SEE. ISRAEL AND JORDAN HAVE BOTH SAID THAT THE DECISION ON A MEETING IS OBVIOUSLY AN AMERICAN DECISION. BOTH PARTIES HAVE SAID, "WE DON'T HAVE A VETO AND WOULDN'T WANT A VETO OVER THAT AMERICAN DECISION."

IN RETURN, WE'VE SAID THAT WE'RE NOT GOING TO GO AHEAD WITH THE MEETING UNTIL WE HAVE TALKED, CONSULTED FULLY, WITH BOTH PARTIES, AND UNTIL WE FEEL CONFIDENT THAT IT

IS THE GOAL THAT WE'VE ALL ESTABLISHED, WHICH IS MOVING THE PROCESS FORWARD. BEYOND THAT, I'M NOT GOING TO GO.

Q. I KNOW YOU WON'T DIVULGE THE ASSISTANT SECRETARY'S TRAVEL PLANS, BUT WOULD IT BE HELPFUL AT THIS POINT IN TIME TO HAVE A MEETING WITH PRESIDENT ASSAD? AND HAS PRESIDENT ASSAD CHANGED HIS POSITION IN ANY WAY WITH REGARD TO OUR EFFORTS WITH THE PEACE PROCESS?

A. THE SYRIAN POSITION IS BEST STATED BY THE SYRIAN GOVERNMENT. WE SAID THERE IS AN OPTION TO ADD ADDITIONAL STOPS ONTO THE VISIT, DEPENDING UPON HOW THE VISIT GOES. WE REALLY HAVE NOT MADE ANY DECISIONS YET AS TO WHETHER HE'S GOING TO GO TO ADDITIONAL CAPITALS.

Q. BUT WOULD IT BE HELPFUL AT THIS POINT TO TALK WITH PRESIDENT ASSAD? IS HE A KEY PLAYER AS FAR AS WE SEE IT NOW WITH REGARD TO THIS PROCESS MOVING FORWARD?

A. WE'VE ALWAYS SAID THEY HAVE A MAJOR INTEREST IN THE PROCESS. WE'RE IN VERY CLOSE TOUCH WITH THEM. OUR AMBASSADOR SEES THE FOREIGN MINISTER, SEES THE PRESIDENT ON A REGULAR BASIS. WE EXCHANGE A LOT OF COMMUNICATIONS.

AS YOU KNOW, AMBASSADOR MURPHY, WHEN HE GOES TO THE AREA, OFTEN VISITS DAMASCUS, AND IT'S STILL -- IT DOES REMAIN AN OPTION.

Q. HOW DO YOU ASSESS REPORTS THAT AN IMPROVEMENT ON THE USSR RELATIONS WITH ISRAEL AND THE RESTORATION OF DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WILL GIVE ISRAEL THE OPPORTUNITY TO MOVE FORWARD IN THIS PEACE PROCESS AND POSSIBLY WATER DOWN ITS OBJECTION TO ANY MOVEMENT IN THE AREA?

A. REALLY, IT'S HIGHLY SPECULATIVE. WE'VE ALWAYS BEEN IN FAVOR OF ISRAEL'S BEING ABLE TO ESTABLISH DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH AS MANY COUNTRIES AS POSSIBLE.

WE'VE LOOKED ON THAT WITH FAVOR. AS TO HOW THAT AFFECTS THE PEACE PROCESS AND HOW IT WILL AFFECT ISRAELI

A. WE'VE SEEN AN EGYPTIAN-ISRAELI TREATY WITHOUT USSR PARTICIPATION; WE'VE SEEN DISENGAGEMENT AGREEMENTS IN THE SINAI; WE'VE SEEN THEM IN THE GOLAN. THERE ARE AMPLE PRECEDENTS.

Q. HAVE WE ANY IDEA HOW LONG MR. MURPHY WILL BE AWAY -- THE TIME FRAME, YOU KNOW, A WEEK, TWO WEEKS?

A. I THINK IT'S GOING TO BE A --

Editorials

NYP "Middleast Peace Initiative Would Only Backfire on US" The Arab League endorsed nothing in Casablanca. By issuing a communique so veiled, the Arab League hopes the US will be enticed into taking the Amman accord so seriously that it will talk to the PLO. There is little prospect that the accord will lead anywhere as long as Syria has the attitude it does. There cannot be a peace accord without Syria. There cannot be an accord that includes Syria because Israel would oppose it. The diplomatic process is now stalled and it is not in the US power to get it started again. US intervention can amount only to over-eager recognition of the PLO in violation of our pledge to Israel, and a further increase in our reputation for diplomatic failure.

ND "A Dearth of Arab Peacemakers" 16 so-called moderate countries attended the Arab League meeting. They hardly demonstrated their independence from the hard-liners. Arafat has apparently accepted the idea of a Palestinian state federated with Jordan instead of an independent Palsetinian state--and has agreed on a joint strategy with Hussein that purports to seek peace with Israel by demanding talks with the US. Washington is wisely cautious. Casablanca should not change this attitude. If Hussien wants to pursue his initiative he should talk to Israel.


Book Review



MR. REDMAN: Ladies and gentlemen, as promised, a background briefing concerning Assistant Secretary Murphy's upcoming trip to the Middle East. Your briefer will be -----(title, name)----.

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Thanks, Chuck. I won't bore you or put you to sleep with any statement, since I think you might have some questions. So, why don't we go right to questions?

JIM ANDERSON (UPI): Can you tell us whether the decision will be made during the course of this trip to meet with the Jordanian-Palestinian delegation?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: It's an option but no final decision has been made regarding Ambassador Murphy's participation in such a meeting.

MR. ANDERSON: Who will he see out there?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Without going into the order of stops, for obvious security reasons, he'll be visiting Israel, Jordan, and Egypt. That's the present plan. It's possible that the trip might be expanded. But no decisions have been made on additional stops

Q What do you mean by "he will visit shortly"? Because you've been saying that word for the last months. What do you mean "shortly"? I mean, in the coming two days? In the coming week, or what?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: He will be in the area in the next several days.

Q A couple of days?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Yes.

Q He hasn't left already?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: He has not left.

Q When will he leave?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Once again, for security reasons, I'd like not to get into the details of his travel plans in advance.

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JOE POLAKOFF (Jewish Newspapers): Will he be going to Jordan first and then Israel and Egypt, or vice-versa?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: (Facetiously.) Once again, the people in SY are standing outside with handcuffs and said if I get into the details of the itinerary they're taking me away.

He will be visiting all three, and I say that it's open that he might be making other stops. But I can't get into the details. Sorry.

Q What's the status of the US consideration of the Palestinian list?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: We've made no final decision. It's obviously going to be a major topic for discussion once Secretary Murphy's out there. He'll be -- but as we said before, I think it's wrong to focus all the attention on the list. The really essential question about a meeting with a Jordanian-Palestinian delegation is we're prepared to take part if two things can happen, if arrangements can be mutually agreed and if the meeting clearly leads toward the common objective of direct negotiations between the parties. And that's one of the key issues that Ambassador Murphy will be discussing.

SEMAAN SEMAAN (BBC): What is the offer going to be in the way of meeting with the Jordanian-Palestinian delegation, at present? Why has a decision not been made yet? What seems to be the problem?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: We've been exchanging cables and messages for the last couple of weeks and feel that we've reached a point, the process has moved far enough along, and it would be very useful for Ambassador Murphy to go out and have some direct discussions with our friends in the region and, obviously, one of the issues that's going to be discussed is how does any Murphy meeting fit into the context of progress toward direct negotiations.

Q Could you just say what specific developments have led the administration to conclude that the time is right now for Murphy to go back to the Middle East?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: It was originally planned that Ambassador Murphy would make his trip before the Casablanca summit. In other words, that was the original thinking. That was delayed because of just convenience of scheduling in the region. I think we reached the point that, as I say, we've exchanged a number of messages with all of the leaders in the region and feel that we've made some progress in those exchange of messages. But in order to help the process along it was time for Dick to go out and engage in the kind of direct discussions that are always helpful in this kind of effort.

Q Could I follow up on that? Can we consider that the communique issued by the summit pushed you to have this decision, I mean, to send Murphy to the Middle East? Was it one of the factors?

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STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: No. The decision was made to go before the summit met.

Q Then what do you think of the communique which was issued by the summit? You put a lot of emphasis on it on Monday. So what do you think? Do you have any evaluation of it?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: I'm not going to get into a detailed assessment of what we think about the summit communique. The summit communique make a number of points on the peace process and other issues. On each of those individual points, our position and policy is well-known, but we don't think it's in our interest to get into a detailed exegesis, as we say, in the Middle East bureau.

Q If you won't go into a detailed --

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: -- exegesis --

Q -- thank you -- can you just say whether you were happy with it, disappointed? Did it further the peace process in general?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: No, I'm not going to characterize our position.

Q You said you are looking for the conference to reinforce King Hussein's initiative. Did it reinforce it or not? I mean, it's a simple question.

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Well, I think a reading of the communique would answer that question.

Q Did Mr. Whitehead's requested from King Hussein, when he was in Amman, a new list of Palestinian in the joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegation? And would you comment on the list, as it was submitted to you last month?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: I'm not going to get into the details of the conversations that the Deputy Secretary had, and obviously one of the issues that Ambassador Murphy will be discussing is the list and our views on the list, and I'm not going to preview that now.

Q Well, I want to be sure about this. Did you request a new list or not? That is the question. Because this has been reported on the Arab world, that you requested a new list from the Jordanians, of Palestinians.

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: We have not made a decision yet on a list.

Q Given the less than hearty endorsement by the Casablanca summit of the Jordanian-Palestinian proposal, and Israel's rejection of the process, as we see it, what gives you grounds for optimism at this point?

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STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Having dealt with the Middle East for 18 years, I wonder what gives anybody grounds for optimism at any time. (Laughter.) That aside, a number of things have happened recently which indicate to us that the process does have a chance of working. We've had King Hussein's visit, had the public statements that were made, all of them which were very supportive of the process. We've had Prime Minister Peres making a very supportive speech in the Knesset on June 10th, which was also supportive of the process. We've had, prior to that, of course, we've had the February 11th agreement, which I think was a very helpful step. We think all the parties are serious about moving to negotiations and finding a peaceful resolution of the conflict. All those are very positive things.

We, from the beginning, have said, and Bernie said it from the podium many times, that we don't expect pyrotechnics. We don't expect major, unexpected, breakthroughs. The one thing we've learned in the Middle East is that things take time. We think the process is moving in the right direction, and one reason he's going out to the region right now is because we believe that the movement continues, and it's time to engage directly with the parties to discuss the next steps.

So, in the Middle East context, we remain optimistic. (Laughter.)

MR. SEMAAN: Are the differing interpretations, by the PLO and the United States, on the first meeting, one of the obstacles, or is because of delaying or taking a decision to meet with the joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegation?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: When talking about the meeting there are two things that Ambassador Murphy will be discussing. One is the arrangements of the meeting, which you've just addressed, and second is how does it lead to our common objectives. That's one of the things that Ambassador Murphy will be talking about.

MR. ANDERSON: In an interview on Friday, Foreign Minister Shamir said that a meeting by the United States with a delegation, Jordanian-Palestinian delegation, quote, "Would hurt the war against terrorism, it would hurt peace and stability in the Middle East, it would hurt the fabric of relations between ourselves and the United States." Would you comment on this?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: Well, it's obviously the Foreign Minister's view. It's the position which we understand is the official position of the government of Israel, as well as the government of Jordan, is that the reason to go ahead with a meeting is if we believe it's going to lead to negotiations between the parties. If it's going to be harmful to the process, then we don't believe it's useful going ahead with a meeting.

But, obviously, that's one of the issues that Ambassador Murphy has to discuss in the region.

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Q Are there any issues that are going to be coming up on this that do not involve the possibility of Jordanian-Palestinian-Israeli negotiations? Is there anything else that's hanging around?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: No major -- obviously, when Dick's in the various capitals he'll discuss other bilateral issues. It's a target of opportunity. But the main purpose of the trip is the peace process.

Q In the original timetable, such as there was an original timetable, wasn't he supposed to be going there about now, to Amman, to meet, to have a preliminary meeting with the delegation?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: We never had a fixed date. There was, obviously, a lot of speculation about when it would happen. But there was never any date certain when a meeting would be held.

Q I mean when you say things are a little behind where, at least the State Department, hoped they would be?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: I think we always hope things move faster. It's a standard malady in the building.

I think that we view Dick's trip as an indication that we are still making progress and can have some useful conversations. As to whether or not we would have liked to be farther along in the process than we are now, sure. Are we satisfied with where we are in the process? Yes, we are.

Q You enumerated three or four factors which are the factors that you are going to the area, which are the same factors you said earlier, about a month ago. Were there any other factors which are added? Was the acceptance by Mr. Peres of two Palestinians from the list of seven another factor added to the factors which are encouraging you to go now to the Middle East and search for it?

STATE DEPT. OFFICIAL: No, the reason we're going is we just, as I mentioned, we think it's the right time for Dick to go out and have those conversations. It's not that the situation has dramatically changed in the last couple of weeks.

Q You just said that you are satisfied that the peace process is moving forward. Do I understand correctly?

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SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: That's correct.

Q What do you mean by the fact the meeting will happen if arrangements can be mutually agreed? Do you want to tell us after three months of negotiation, you haven't achieved mutually agreed -- you can agree on an arrangement until now?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: There are two issues. One is mutually agreed arrangements and second is all parties agree it has to lead to a common objective of negotiations and that is really -- the second is much more important than the first, and the second is the issue that Ambassador Murphy is going to be emphasizing during his discussions out there.

Q What do you mean by "mutual arrangements?" I mean, what does that mean in English?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: I think it's reinforcing modalities. (Laughter.) It involves issues ranging from who sits down at the table to other things that we're all interested in like press coverage, like statements, like venue, just the particulars of how it's going to be arranged.

Q Can you help us with something? You said in the past several weeks, as I thought I heard it, there's not been any dramatic -- the situation has not dramatically changed. Of course, the word "dramatically" is operative here, but we've had the Shamir statement on Friday, we had a communique from Casablanca. These are not important? Not dramatic? What are they?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: Well, they're certainly important. What I meant by "dramatic" is that you don't -- we could all envision dramatic steps -- a Sadat visit to Jerusalem, I assume we'd call "dramatic". What I'm saying is that the process continues, that there has been movement. We don't think -- the Casablanca communique, I don't think was a dramatic -- leads to any dramatic departures in the peace process. The foreign minister's statement reflects his views. Once again, I don't think that leads to a dramatic departure in what we're trying to achieve.

Q -- Saudi Arabia. Are you writing Saudi Arabia out of the peace process?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: We said right now he plans on three stops and others might well be added.

Q I'm sure you said this before I arrived, but maybe you could just repeat it. What is the current American attitude towards the list of Palestinians that we have been given? As of a couple of days ago, we were still considering the list.

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Q Can I get back to the question about an option? I want to make sure I understand. It is an option that the whole thing could be worked out while he's over there and he could actually sit down on this trip with a joint delegation and hold "the" — (emphasizing) -- meeting? That is an option?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: It's an option.

Q How alive an option? Can you give us an assessment of how realistic you think that really is and how long is he planning to be in the region.

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: Um -- I was same guy that when the Shah was overthrown and I'd served in Iran for five years -- six months before I was asked, "What are the chances of the Shah being overthrown," and I said, "I know this country well and there's not a chance in the world he's going to be overthrown." (Laughter.) So I'm a little bit hesitant to make any kind of predictions as to what's going to work or what isn't going to work.

Q What options are you talking? You said what option that he will meet with them? What other option you have? To come back without any meeting? What other options? Can you tell us?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: That's another option. (Laughter.)

Q I mean, what other? That will be a failure, isn't it?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: Hmm?

Q It will be a failure at that time then?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: It depends what comes out of the talks.

Q What other option besides these two options?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: I'm not going to get into the details, what kind of plans we might have and might not have.

Q Are the Jordanians still demanding that this meeting be a first step in the direction of US recognition of the PLO?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: As far as I know, that's still the King's view. We've told the King, we've said publicly, that we don't see that as the proper way, as the best way to proceed.

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Q As you know, King Hussein has said that he hoped that there would be direct negotiations before the end of this year. Do we still consider that a realistic possibility?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: Still a hopeful possibility.

Q What happened to the international conference idea? Where is that right now? Are we still trying to dissuade the King from pushing that line?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: One of the major steps forward, I think, in this peace process over the past nine months, has been that for the first time everybody who's involved is talking about process, isn't talking about guaranteed outcomes. You know for the last 18 years, the Arab side has generally said they're not going to sit down and negotiate until they know what's going to happen and we've been very American about it in saying, "That isn't the way you do things; you've got to negotiate, you've got to talk about process." Well, King Hussein now is, in a way speaking American. He's saying, "Okay. Let's talk about process. Let's not talk about guaranteed outcome." That's been a major step forward. It so happens that we disagree on the steps of that process that are going to lead to negotiations. But I'd much rather have discussions with the King on the process and where we agree and disagree than be back where we were a year ago which is trying to differentiate between a guaranteed outcome and a process.

There are at least two issues that have to be addressed in any process. One is the King has talked about international context for the negotiations. Second, is the obvious issue of representation of the Palestinian people. We don't have answers yet on those two issues. We've got some ideas and we'll be talking about those kind of ideas. But the fact is that's how negotiations work and so those are two of the issues in the process that we're going to be focusing on.

Q In talking about an international conference, how significant are the overtures that have been going on between Israel and the Soviet Union?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: It's really -- it's hard to judge. We've always said that the Soviets have an important interest in the area. We haven't denied that. We've also said that we don't see the Soviets playing a helpful role in the process now because they don't support the kind of process that all the parties want to see work in the region.

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: I think there were various statements out of Israel over the past month and half, two months, the most recent one being the statement of the Foreign Minister.

Q Which would seem to reinforce what I've just said.

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: All the parties have said -- Israeli has said -- both Israel and Jordan have both said -- that the decision on a meeting is obviously an American decision. Both parties have said, "We don't have a veto and wouldn't want a veto over that American decision." In return, we've said that we're not going to go ahead with the meeting until we've talked, consulted fully, with both parties and until we feel confident that it meets the goal that we've all established, which is moving the process forward. Beyond that, I'm not going to go.

Q Just one more question. I know you won't divulge the Assistant Secretary's travel plans, but would it be helpful at this point in time to have a meeting with President Assad and has President Assad changed his position in any way with regard to our efforts with the peace process?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: The Syrian position is best stated by the Syrian government. There is an option to add additional steps onto the visit, depending upon how the visit goes. But we really have not made any decisions yet as to whether he's going to additional capitals.

Q But would it be helpful at this point to talk with President Assad? Is he a key player as far as we see it now with regard to this process moving forward?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: We've always said they have a major interest in the process. We're in very close touch with them. Our Ambassador sees the Foreign Minister, sees the President on a regular basis. We exchange diplomatic communications. As you know, Ambassador Murphy when he goes to the area often visits Damascus and it does remain an option.

Q How do you assess reports that an improvement in the UOOR relations with Israel and the restoration of diplomatic relations will give Israel the opportunity to move forward in this peace process and possibly water down its objection to any movement in the area?

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Q How much baggage is he taking with him? (Laughter.)

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: You mean other than the people traveling with him? (Laughter.) Right now our estimate is it will be a shorter trip rather than a longer trip, as we say in diplomacy.

Q Do you see any connection between the Murphy and the current visit of Mr. Whitehead?

SR. ADMIN. OFFICIAL: No.

MR. REDMAN: Ladies and gentlemen, I have one short announcement. At the request of the President and Secretary Shultz, Assistant Secretary Murphy will leave shortly for the Middle East to consult further on how best to move the peace process forward. No final decision has yet been made regarding Ambassador Murphy's participation in a meeting with Jordanians and Palestinians. As we have consistently said, we are prepared to take part in such a meeting, if arrangements can be mutually agreed and if the meeting clearly leads to our objective of direct negotiations between the parties.

It remains our conviction that only through a negotiated settlement can a just and lasting peace between Israel and all its neighbors be achieved.

There will be a background briefing on that subject by a senior administration official, in this room, approximately 20 minutes after the end of this briefing.

JIM ANDERSON (UPI): Nevertheless, since we're on the record, is a decision to be made during the course of this trip on whether, in fact, there will be a meeting between that Jordanian-Palestinian delegation and an American group?

MR. REDMAN: Given the fact that there will be a background briefing, I prefer to go no further than what I've said, which said no final decision has yet been made.

MR. ANDERSON: Yeah, just for the record, though, I'm asking will a decision be made during the course of this trip?

MR. REDMAN: I can't answer that.

Q Do you have any comment on the Arab League summit which ended on Friday, especially after you had some good statements on Monday on this summit, you were having high expectations of it?

MR. REDMAN: Once again, I would refer you to the background briefing, when I think --

Q He will talk about the Arab Summit?

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MR. REDMAN: -- I think he would talk about that. It will probably be more relevant than anything I could say at this point.

O Okay. But nothing on the record?

MR. REDMAN: I can give you just a few very brief remarks. We have been carefully studying the communique issued by the summit. I'm not going to get into a detailed analysis of that communique. Our positions on the issues addressed are well known, and any steps taken to advance the search for peace are, obviously, welcome.

Insofar as the communique enhances the prospects for negotiation and a peaceful resolution of differences, it obviously has our support. But, beyond that, I would not go into any fine too:h analysis.



DEAR MR. SECRETARY,

THANK YOU FOR YOUR KIND LETTER OF 3 AUGUST 1985. MEANWHILE, I HAD THE PLEASURE OF MEETING JOHN WHITEHEAD. WE HAD A WIDE-RANGING AND PLEASANT CONVERSATION IN WHICH WE CONVEYED OUR ASSESSMENT OF THE CURRENT POLITICAL SITUATION, IN PARTICULAR WITH REGARD TO THE PEACE PROCESS.

IN THE COURSE OF THE CONVERSATION, WE ALSO TOUCHED UPON THE ECONOMY. I REITERATED TO SECRETARY WHITEHEAD OUR DETERMINATION TO CARRY THROUGH THE ECONOMIC PLAN IN SPITE OF THE DIFFICULTIES WE ARE ENCOUNTERING ALONG THE WAY.

IN THAT CONTEXT, I DREW MR. WHITEHEAD'S ATTENTION TO A PARTICULARLY TROUBLING AND URGENT PROBLEM IN THE FIELD OF TRADE AND OUR FREE TRADE AREA AGREEMENT. I AM REFERRING TO THE ISSUE OF TEXTILE EXPORTS TO THE UNITED STATES. VERY RECENTLY, OUR TEXTILE INDUSTRY INVESTED A CONSIDERABLE EFFORT IN GEARING ITS PRODUCTION TO MEET THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE AMERICAN MARKET, AND IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ENTRY INTO FORCE OF THE FTA AGREEMENT. THE IMPENDING MEASURES AND IMPORT RESTRICTIONS ON TEXTILES BY THE UNITED STATES WILL DEAL A SEVERE BLOW TO OUR INDUSTRY AT THIS CRUCIAL JUNCTURE. THUS, CONTRARY TO OUR HOPES AND EXPECTATIONS, OUR SITUATION WILL TAKE A TURN FOR THE WORSE WITH THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE FTA AGREEMENT.

IN ADDITION, I WISH TO DRAW YOUR ATTENTION TO THE FACT THAT OUR TEXTILE INDUSTRY IS LOCATED IN WHAT ARE KNOWN AS DEVELOPMENT TOWNSHIPS, WHICH ARE ALREADY SUFFERING FROM A RELATIVELY HIGH RATE OF UNEMPLOYMENT. THE CLOSURE OF THE U.S. MARKET TO THEIR PRODUCTS WOULD BE LIKELY TO PRECIPITATE A CRISIS AND CAUSE ANOTHER WAVE OF UNEMPLOYMENT IN SENSITIVE AREAS OF OUR COUNTRY.

NYT-8/11-Irving Kristol "America's Doomed Mideast Policy" The US peace process is heading towards a fiasco but it may collapse before it goes to far, hopefully. Israel will not sit with PLO members. Jordan cannot sit without them. Jordan wants the Soviet Union involved but their participation is utterly unacceptable to the US and Israel for it would open the door for mischief. The bottom line is that Israel will trade territory for peace but that is an anachronism. First problem is Jerusalem. No Israeli Gov't will give up any part of it. No Jordanian or Palestinian body will ever accept it as a Jewish city. There is no room for compromise here. Jordan cannot accept anything less than the whole of the West Bank returned. If they did they would be viewed as a traitor to the Arab cause. Israel cannot give back the whole West Bank firstly for military reasons. The so-called settlements are really newly constructed suburbs. They were constructed where few Arabs live and are pleasant communities. They encompass 10-15% of the West Bank and no political faction or party in Israel will waste their breath on negotiating their status. The land is already annexed. The truth is that there is no peace making role for the State Dept. No turning point is at hand.

West Bank Arabs Feel Cornered

NYT-Freidman 8/11-Week in Review-The Israeli-Palestinian conflict has entered a new phase. This phase is frightening to Israelis and difficult to cope with. A new mood of despair among Arabs is growing, especially among the young. West Bank Arabs are dismayed by the destruction of the PLO in Lebanon and their failure to develop an effective political initiative and by Israel's refusal to negotiate with credible Palestinian leaders. Conflicts between Jews and Arabs are now between individuals not armies. Elias Freij believes that the Arabs and Jews are behaving like tribes. Young Palestinians, he says, have nothing to look forward to. Israeli forces have found it difficult to deal with youths, who decide on the spur of the moment to murder. There is a feeling in Israel that the Gov't is partly to blame. Yediot is looking into allegations that "top political figures" have illegally taken over hundreds of acres of private Arab-owned land so that settlements could be built. al-Hanishmar reported that Jewish settlers

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beat up an 11 year old boy who was selling gum outside an Arab shrine. Benvenisti says that Israeli leaders cannot explain the causes of "this terrorism" because to do so would admit that there is a political community in despair. If they accept that, he reasons, they have to accept that there are political reasons for the despair and that the solutions might be political as well.

West Bank Settler Stabbed

NYT-Freidman 8/11-In what appeared to be the latest in a series of individual attacks on Jews and Arabs, an Israeli settler was stabbed as he walked past the Arab market in Hebron. Kiryat Arba's settlement head blamed Rabin for the attack for "failing to ensure order" in the West Bank and for releasing terrorists last May. Settlers gathered to protest the stabbing. (see DN-UPI "Ex-New Yorker Stabbed on W. Bank")

Arab Leaders Fail to Endorse Jordan-PLO Pact

NYT-Miller-8/10-A special meeting of the Arab League that was attended by moderate Arab countries "noted" the Jordanian-Palestinian accord outlining joint efforts to negotiate with Israel, but it did not endorse it. The communique was a compromise between those who wanted a stronger endorsement and those who did not want it mentioned at all. It was the Fez plan that was called to be heeded. The US is sure to be disappointed. (Photo of Hassan and Arafat- NYT & DN)

NYT-AP-8/11-King Hassan said that the Arab League delegates had approved cooperation between Jordan and the PLO in seeking peace in the Mideast, but not necessarily in the plan that the two countries had offered.

NYT-Reuters-8/11-A senior Lebanese official accused the Arab League of having evaded their responsibilities to fight the Israeli occupation of southern Lebanon.

New Fighting in Lebanon

NYT-8/11-special-At least 6 people were killed as new fighting, the most intense in several weeks, flared overnight between Christian and Moslem militias in Beirut and its suburbs.

The bill authorizes \$12.7 billion in each of the next two years, and awards the largest amounts to Israel and Egypt.



THIS NEW INTEREST GROUP HAS BROUGHT TOGETHER AMERICAN FRIENDS OF ISRAEL WHOSE MAJOR CONCERNS ARE THAT AMERICA'S COMMITMENT TO A STRONG ISRAEL WITHSTANDS THE TEST OF PRESENT ECONOMIC PRESSURES AND ANY FUTURE ENERGY CRISES; AND THAT THE DOMESTIC ENERGY INDUSTRY REMAINS INDEPENDENT BELIEVING THAT UNPERTURBED DOMESTIC ENERGY PRODUCTION IS ESSENTIAL TO ASSURE THAT AMERICA'S SECURITY AND ECONOMIC FUTURE WILL NOT BE HELD HOSTAGE TO FOREIGN OIL.

To achieve these educational goals, the Council holds press interviews and conferences, generates literature and publishes articles on these issues. In addition, the Council sponsors trips to independent energy production and refining facilities for legislators and businessmen from consumer states for on-site study of the technical difficulties and investment risks associated with independent exploration. In addition, the Council sponsors trips to Israel for independent producers and legislators from producing states.

The Council believes that both a strong Israel and a strong independent energy industry are essential components for a secure America. Contributions to the Council for a Secure America are tax deductible.



New Council for a Secure America:

Jewish leaders join together with independent oil producers

One of the nation's newest and most unexpected political alliances—bringing together the Jewish community and the independent oil and gas industry—will be officially inaugurated at the end of this month, when the newly created Council for a Secure America opens an office in Washington.

According to Malcolm Hoenlein, executive director of the Jewish Community Relations Council, the Council for a Secure America will have several full time staffers, representing both the Jewish community and the oil producers, who will engage in "educational efforts to drive home to Congress and the nation the critical importance of creating an energy-independent America."

Sigmund Zises of Integrated Resources, Inc., co-chairman of the council together with Mack Wallace, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, said that the council will have a first year budget of about \$250,000, contributed equally by the Jewish groups and oil producers.

Hoenlein said that the independent oil producers, who are based largely in Texas and Oklahoma, and whose oil and gas production is almost exclusively carried out within the United States, "will work to educate legislators and the public from their part of the country that Israel represents an invaluable strategic asset for the U.S. in the Middle East."

"Jewish leaders active in the coalition will educate our own community as well as legislators from this part of the country that the domestic independent oil producers have very different interests from the large international oil companies known as the 'Seven Sisters,' which are heavily committed in Saudi Arabia and other OPEC countries," Hoenlein added, "The independents are natural allies for the Jewish community in creating an America that is no longer susceptible to Arab oil blackmail."

Rep. Coelho was Matchmaker

Hoenlein said that the matchmaker who brought together the new alliance was Rep. Tony Coelho (D-CA), the influential chairman of the Democratic Campaign Committee. According to Hoenlein, "In late 1983 Tony met with both groups to point out to them that we have a shared agenda in terms of pushing for domestic energy production. Tony made people on both sides understand that what appeared at first glance to be an unnatural alliance was in fact the most natural of alliances."

According to Hoenlein, a wide assortment of Jewish leaders representing a number of key organizations and constituencies met with Coelho and leaders of the independent oil producers and later became involved in efforts to cement the alliance.

Among those mentioned by Hoenlein were New York businessmen Sandy Eisenstadt; Sig and Jay Zises; George Klein; Richard Ravitch; Laurence Tisch; Joseph Elmaleh; Kenneth Bialkin, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations; Morris Abram, president of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry; Tom Dine, executive director of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC); Peggy Tishman, president of the New York Jewish Community Relations Council; Howard Squadron, past president of the American Jewish Congress; and Jacob Brackman, of the Fort Worth United Jewish Appeal, whose personal contacts with many of the independent oilmen proved invaluable in cementing the contacts.

Among the oil producers, a leading role in augmenting the alliance was undertaken by L. Frank Pitts, president of the Dallas-based Pitts Oil Co. Also playing a key role is Wallace, whose powerful Texas Railroad Commission is the body responsible for energy regulation in the oil rich state.

Alliance Forged Last Year

The alliance was forged at a JCRC breakfast early in 1984 in which an assortment of Jewish leaders and seven Texas oilmen participated, and at a glatt kosher dinner at Coelho's Washington home which followed an intensive three-hour discussion on legislative concerns.

The two groups held their first public meeting last month at a JCRC-sponsored energy conference in New York at which Secretary of Energy Donald Hodel warned that passage into law of Treasury Secretary Donald Regan's proposal to eliminate most tax deductions and write-offs could hamper goals of U.S. energy independence. Hodel, who was proposed last week by President Reagan to become Secretary of Interior, stressed at the conference, "We need to remove disincentives to exploration and investment" and expressed concern that the Regan tax plan would lead to exactly the opposite result. (See *Jewish World*, December 21-27, 1984.)

Jewish leaders were able to arrange for leaders of the oil producers to meet the editorial boards of the *New York Times* and *New York Post* and to take leaders of the group on missions to Israel. According to Hoenlein, plans are afoot to take groups of northeastern Congresspeople to Texas "to give them a chance to see the state of the oil and gas industry." Hoenlein said that the Council for a Secure America will continue to engage in "educational efforts" to sensitize the two constituencies on issues that each faces. Hoenlein said that as a symbol of support for Israel by the oil and gas producers, the group plans to sponsor a float in the 1985 Salute to Israel parade.

According to Hoenlein, the two groups were able to give each other some important help during the last session of Congress. Hoenlein said that the oil producers had interceded with southwestern Congresspeople to encourage them to support the Free Trade Area agreement, which eventually passed both houses of Congress overwhelmingly, and to oppose the sale of Stinger missiles to Jordan.

Intercede With New York Congresspeople

Hoenlein explained that the Jewish community interceded with members of the New York Congressional delegation to explain how a legislative effort to reimpose some price controls on domestically produced oil and gas could negatively impact the northeast. The bill, which was bitterly opposed by the independent oil producers, eventually died after being bottled up in the House of Representatives Rules Committee.

Hoenlein said he expects that Jewish members of the council will engage in educational efforts within the Jewish community and with northeastern Congresspeople to oppose the Regan 'flat tax' proposal. "This legislation," he said, would be absolutely devastating in terms of destroying any incentive to domestic oil and gas production."

Hoenlein said he believes that there has been an unfortunate "downplaying" in recent years of the drive for the U.S. to reach energy independence. "Right now there is no immediate threat and we are comfortable, but unless we strengthen domestic oil production, we could easily fall back into a situation where the Arabs could employ the oil boycott weapon again," he warned. "We must strengthen incentives to domestic production, build our strategic petroleum reserve, and help the American people to understand that the days of gas lines could recur unless we are careful."

Hoenlein indicated he believes that the independent oil producers are an important political counterweight to the enormous power and influence of the 'Seven Sisters.' "The fact is that the traditional interests of the Seven Sisters do not coincide with our own. That is not to say that they are all hostile to Israel, because they are not, but many have common interests with Saudi Arabia and other OPEC countries."

Independent Producers' Powerful Constituency

In comments to the *Jewish World*, Pitts stressed that the independent oil and gas producers represent a powerful constituency that can be useful to Israel and American Jewry. According to Pitts, "We represent 11,000 to 12,000 independent oil and gas producers centered in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana, but also extending to New Mexico, Colorado and California, and extending through the Midwest and Appalachians to Pennsylvania and upstate New York."

Pitts stated, "It is important to understand that there is a major difference between the major oil companies and the independents. We are smaller and do not deal with the refining and marketing end of the oil business. We sell our oil directly from the wellhead and drill 82 to 84 percent of all the wells drilled in this country."

Pitts said that the major political priority is to kill Regan's flat tax proposal, of which he said, "If enacted into law, it will critically damage the independent oil and gas industry. It would reduce drilling by 30 to 40 percent."

Pitts said that until the formation of the new alliance, traditional supporters of Israel tended to be suspicious of oil and gas interests. "Those who support Israel need to understand what they do not now understand—that it is in Israel's interest to have a strong domestic oil and gas industry. We hope that this council will be able to move friends of Israel to a more enlightened point of view."

Pitts added, "It is also true that southwestern oil producers have not tended to be well-informed enough on Israel. We need more information on the needs of Israel to make its case effectively. We do understand the basic situation—that Israel is the only U.S. ally in the Middle East theatre with a strong army and is therefore an invaluable asset to the United States."

According to Pitts, "We expect to be called on by friends of Israel for help [in getting legislation passed], and we stand ready to do everything we can. We see this as a symbiotic relationship. You scratch my back, and I'll scratch yours."

Potential Reserves in Untested Areas

Turning to the issue of increasing domestic oil and gas production, Pitts dismissed as "completely wrong" the notion that there is not much more oil or natural gas to be found within the borders of the U.S. "Ninety eight percent of the land and offshore waters in this country have not yet been tested for oil and natural gas sediments," he said. "There are great potential reserves in untested areas."

Pitts was asked if northern liberal Congresspeople were not likely not to be concerned that throwing vast areas of land and offshore waters for oil exploration might not pose environmental risks. He responded, "In fact there have been very few offshore oil spills. The great majority of spills have come from tankers. I fished in the Gulf of Mexico around the oil wells in the 1940s, '50s and '70s, and caught many more fish in the '70s than 30 years before. We haven't hurt the fishing."

Pitts said there has hardly been any drilling along the entire east coast of the U.S., despite the strong possibility that areas like the Georges Bank, with its vital fishing industry, might contain significant oil deposits. According to Pitts, "You cannot find oil unless you drill the holes." He said there is a "lot of misinformation" in the northeast about the likely affects of offshore drilling off the east coast.

Pitts said that the flat tax bill would "require the independents to have a lot of liquid capital... we may have capital, but it is in oil and natural gas that is still in the ground." Stressing that the independents put 108 to 112 percent of their cash back into drilling costs, Pitts estimated that a flat tax law would put 4,000 of the independent producers out of the business of drilling new wells.

According to Pitts, "The less drilling that is done here the more dependent we become on Persian Gulf oil. How intelligent is it to beef up our defense and to build more airplanes, ships and tanks without secure sources of oil to run them?" He added, "What it comes down to is that, if passed, the so-called simplified tax plan will increase dependence on foreign oil, increase the trade deficit and reduce tax revenues. It all comes down to the unmistakable fact that the whole production process depends on the drilling of holes and there must be incentives for doing that."

Two Legislative Priorities

Reached by the *Jewish World*, Sig Zises confirmed that the two main legislative priorities for the council will be to turn back any tax simplification bill which damages the independent oil producers and to push for the foreign aid package for Israel requested by the Israeli government.

On the tax-simplification proposal, Zises said, "This proposal is fraught with terrible dangers, not only in the energy area, but in other strategic industries as well. Only the most naive individuals or group of Administration officials could begin to defend such a proposal."

Zises said that he is hopeful that the announcement this week that Regan would become White House Chief of Staff and that James Baker would become the new Treasury Secretary means that "hopefully the proposal that will come through from the Administration will be changed dramatically. It is hard for me to believe that the proposal could survive in Congress in its present form."

Zises was asked whether the fact that the council had been begun by Coelho, a powerful Democrat, and that it is vociferously opposing the Administration's tax reform proposal, might not lead Administration officials to suspect that it is a pro-Democratic group. (Wallace, the only elected official in the group, is a Democrat.) According to Zises, "This is now a bipartisan group. We have people like Dick Rosenbaum, former chairman of the Republican Party in New York, as well as a group of Texas Republicans who are participating on the energy side."

Zises said of Coelho, "Tony deserves all of the credit for putting this group together. Of course, this will not hurt him politically, but I am convinced he did this because he cares deeply about Israel and about U.S. energy independence. He is a very sensitive, bright and caring individual."

According to Squadron, "The concern on both sides is that...this country is rapidly slipping back into a relaxed posture on the issue of energy independence. We must work together to convince the Administration and Congress to encourage domestic oil production."

Squadron was asked if liberal Congresspeople who have traditionally been close to the Jewish community might not have trouble supporting aspects of the independent producers' wish list, including various tax breaks and relaxation of environmental constraints.

Squadron responded, "I do not think that the entire program that the oil producers would recommend is something that all of the Jewish participants in the group would support. But there are a number of their ideas that are clearly supportable—for example, they would be in favor of a tax on imported oil. Some say that it would hurt the poor by driving up the price at the gas pump, but it would either cause producers of oil in the Gulf states to reduce their price...or would lead to a more economical result for independent oil and gas exploration in this country."

According to Squadron, "One of the great problems we have to face is how to get the Seven Sisters to invest in the United States instead of the Gulf, and to deal with that we have to look at the tax laws that give them benefits for royalties paid [abroad]. I do not think that benefit is valid any longer. They should now be encouraged to the development here."

"Ironically, that would help the independents. If the big companies came here it would change domestic market substantially, and the independents would profit from it

because it would expand the market and give them more openings in which to operate."

Reached by the *Jewish World*, Coelho said that bringing together the Jewish community with the independent oil producers "is something I have dreamed about for a long time. As a long-time friend of Israel and supporter of the oil and gas industry in my district in central California, I felt that an opportunity was being missed. Many people who support the oil and gas industry don't support Israel, and many supporters of Israel don't support the industry. It's obvious they ought to be working together."

Terming himself a 'marriage broker', Coelho said he believes it is still premature to talk about joint legislative efforts. However, the Congressman noted, "Israel needs economic assistance and it is important to educate Congress about this...and as to why it is important to strengthen Israel as a strong strategic ally of the U.S., because a strong Israel is an investment in the U.S. strategic interests by the American taxpayer."

He added, "The gas and oil industry is facing tax challenges—both industry and the Jewish community should appreciate the need for tax incentives to increase investments in the industry."

Asked whether the fact that the new group was brought into existence by a leading Democrat might not lead some to conclude that it has a partisan, anti-Administration bent, Coelho commented, "Not really. It's not a Democratic effort. I'm not involved with either group as chairman of the House Campaign Committee. Both parties have friends of Israel and of the oil and gas industry. There is no intention of a partisan effort."

He added, "This is a natural marriage of interests that should be pursued. If it benefits the Democratic Party, that is only a by-product." □

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

FOURTH DISTRICT

The major textile producing area in the United States is a strip of land along Interstate 85 in North and South Carolina. Two of the biggest textile centers here are Greenville and Spartanburg, South Carolina—the two cities that, with the counties that surround them, make up South Carolina's 4th congressional district. It will probably come as a surprise to many readers that this is one of the most industrialized and most blue collar parts of the nation; the fact surprises even tourists who drive through the South Carolina Piedmont on their way south. For the mills are not concentrated in a few big factories, like giant steel plants, in the inner part of grimy cities. They are all over, in small towns and suburbs, at interchanges on the Interstate as well as in Greenville and Spartanburg themselves. Few blacks live here—only 19% districtwide, the lowest percentage in South Carolina. And there are even fewer union members: South Carolina has just about the least unionized work force of any state in the nation, and a major reason is the intransigent opposition of the mill owners to unionization. These conditions—low wages, no unions, large work force—have helped South Car-

olina attract new industry, and many Greenville installations not far from Interstate 85. It

Politically Greenville and Spartanburg are premier Republican cities; there are lots of establishments of considerable distinction, including nominee Clement Haynsworth and former now a federal judge. Israelis Order Expulsion of Arab

NYT-Freidman-The Israeli Army announced that it ordered the deportation of HALLI Abu Ziad who is said to have participated in "subversive activities." Ziad is appealing the expulsion order. This is the first expulsion since 1983 and signals the Government's new tough policy towards residents of the West Bank. The US disagrees with such a policy but Israel appears to have no intention of being dissuaded in its attempt to thwart Palestinian violence. As part of the same policy, Israeli jets struck Palestinian camps deep inside Lebanon. Police Chief Haim Bar-Lev declared that Jordan had been warned via private and public channels that it must prevent Palestinian guerrillas from using its territory as a base for infiltrating men, money or arms into Israel. Ziad has served 10 years in Israeli prison for terrorist activities. Ziad is able to take his case to the Israeli Military Court and then the Israeli Supreme Court. (see ND-DN-combined)

Arab League Summit

NYT-AP-Arab leaders extended their summit in Casablanca in an effort to seek ways to gain support for the Jordanian-Palestinian peace talks with Israel without further alienating hard-line nations that boycotted the meeting. Sources at the conference said participants felt a unified Arab position on the Palestinian question must be reached before the US-Soviet summit in November. (see ND-combined)

Tougher Administration Trade Policy Looms

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 — The Reagan Administration is moving toward a more aggressive international trade policy to try to forestall passage of far-reaching protectionist legislation in Congress, Administration officials and Congressional aides reported today.

The first indication of the tougher policy is expected to come Friday with a decision by the President to protect the domestic shoe industry

against imports that have captured nearly 80 percent of the American market.

A faction of so-called political realists within the Cabinet has recommended that the Government itself initiate unfair-trade cases to give bite to the tougher policy. That idea is opposed by a faction of free trade advocates.

Congress is watching closely. "Unless they can show that the trade laws work and are credible, you're going to see a real protectionist binge in Congress," said a Senate aide specializing in trade issues. "One industry after the other will demand that we rewrite the laws."

Legislators have introduced more than 300 bills to protect everything from textiles to waterbeds. A Democratic bill to impose a 25 percent tax on all imports from Japan, South Korea, Taiwan and Brazil is given a good chance of passage in the House when Congress reconvenes in September.

"A harder line is inevitable," one Congressional aide said. "Either they do it, or we will do it."

It is still an open question whether

the Administration will succeed in its strategy toward the Congressional trade debate. "It really depends on what they end up doing or are perceived to be doing," another Congressional analyst said.

The President underscored the new emphasis on trade in his opening remarks at Monday's news conference, saying the issue would get "special attention."

The Cabinet-level Economic Policy Council, which advises the President on major economic issues, is preparing a trade policy paper that would articulate the more activist approach, Administration officials reported.

"They are trying to figure out some way to pre-empt Congress, but they

don't have a clear view yet," said one official familiar with the internal debate. "I would guess that when they finish thinking about it we'll have a more aggressive policy."

The initiative to harden the line has been taken by the "political realists," who are led by the United States trade representative, Clayton K. Yeutter, and the Secretary of Commerce, Malcolm Baldrige. The chairman of the Economic Policy Council is Treasury Secretary James A. Baker 3d, also one of the realists.

"The Administration is clearly vulnerable on trade issues, particularly at the Congressional level," said Prof. Charles S. Pearson, a trade expert at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. "It's difficult to know how it will play out."

The reason for the vulnerability is that Government fiscal policies are widely seen to have contributed to the strength of the dollar, which in turn has hurt exports and made imports cheaper, driving the trade deficit toward a record of perhaps \$150 billion this year.

John M. Albertine, former chief economist for the Joint Economic Committee of Congress and now president of a coalition of growth companies called the American Business Conference, said the Democrats view the trade issue as driving a wedge between the Administration and its traditional supporters in the business community.

"The manufacturing community, which normally supports Reagan, is off the wall on this issue," he commented. The protectionist pressures

in Congress are coming chiefly from manufacturing interests.

The Cabinet's political realists are meeting some resistance from ideological free traders in toughening the policy. These free traders include Beryl W. Sprinkel, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, and George P. Shultz, the Secretary of State. In addition, Mr. Shultz opposes dramatizing arguments with other countries.

Mr. Yeutter has told legislators that the Administration recognizes the high level of concern in Congress over trade issues.

"I share this concern as does the President," he recently said at a Senate Finance Committee hearing. "We intend to move forward quickly and aggressively to develop a sound strategy to address these trade problems."

One of the issues now being debated by the Economic Policy Council is what specific actions the United States should take against countries that refuse to dismantle trade barriers against American products.

Some Requirements of Bill

A little-noticed provision of a trade bill the President signed into law last year requires the Administration to catalogue all foreign barriers by October, estimate what American exporters are losing and report what the Government intends to do to correct the situation.

One solution that has the support of the Cabinet's political realists is for the Government itself to initiate unfair-trade cases.

Now the Government processes trade complaints filed by companies or industries that are suffering from imports. In some cases it encourages the filing of complaints. But it does not initiate the action itself, which represents a much higher level of involvement.

The recommendation is to initiate cases charging unfair foreign trade practices brought under Section 301 of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended last year. The office of the United States trade representatives processes complaints filed under this law and makes a recommendation to the President, who has broad discretionary power in making a final determination.

REAGAN SIGNS AID BILL, OBJECTS TO RESTRICTIONS (1530)
(Text; President's statement on signing foreign aid bill)

Following is the text of President Reagan's statement*
(begin text)

Today I am signing into law S. 960, the International Security and Development Cooperation Act of 1985. This Act authorizes appropriations for security and development assistance programs and related activities and makes certain substantive changes in the statutory requirements governing these programs.

S. 960 is the first foreign assistance authorization bill since 1981 to be passed by both Houses of the Congress and presented to me for signature. I am pleased that the authorization process on foreign aid is back on track.

Enactment of foreign assistance legislation is never easy, and I appreciate the tough decisions members made in their support of it. In helping our allies and friends meet their security, development, and humanitarian needs, we directly support U.S. interests and objectives. Our foreign assistance programs, despite any perceptions to the contrary, are manifestly in our own national interest.

S. 960 authorizes appropriations for both fiscal year 1986 and 1987. I understand the desire of the Congress to enact a two-year authorization, and I support it. I will, of course, assess the requirements for foreign aid programs in preparing the fiscal year 1987 budget and will transmit to the Congress any additional authorizations that are required to support our national interests.

I am concerned about the sizeable reductions made in S. 960 to my fiscal year 1986 requests for security assistance programs. Security assistance enables us to help our friends deter aggression, deepen bilateral ties, build forces which are more compatible with our own, and develop the confidence necessary for advancing peace and stability. These reductions, coupled with legislated earmarkings of numerous programs for individual countries and international organizations, will necessitate severe cuts in other programs that are critical to U.S. security interests. I will review the impact of these reductions and determine whether additional funding in fiscal year 1986 will be required in support of these interests.

Security assistance is, quite simply, the most effective instrument we have for helping to shape a more secure international environment. And, yet, since the decades of the fifties and sixties, the resources committed to these programs have shrunk drastically in real terms. I invite the Congress to work with us to see how we might best go about reinvigorating this important area. We need to strengthen our security assistance partners so as to give them the confidence and the capability to better defend our common interests. Foreign assistance resources are essential to a successful foreign policy. One of our highest national security priorities in the years ahead must be to reinvigorate our foreign assistance program. At a time of defense reductions, we must pay particular attention to our most compelling international security needs.

I am pleased that S. 960 contains many of the substantive legislative provisions that I proposed over the past two years, in particular the main policy recommendations of the National Bipartisan

Commission on Central America. Although it has required extensive debate and compromise on all sides, I believe that this bill sets forth a viable policy framework for Central America which enjoys strong bipartisan support; it will guide our assistance programs as we seek the goals of peace, democracy, and development in that region of such great importance to the United States. The reductions in security assistance levels, however, will inhibit our ability to achieve these goals in fiscal years 1986 and 1987.

Equally important, S. 960 authorizes vital humanitarian assistance for the democratic resistance in Nicaragua. This aid is an important element in our overall efforts to assist neighboring countries in their defense against Nicaraguan attack and subversion. Unfortunately, the provision unduly and unnecessarily restricts efficient management and administration of the program. Nevertheless, I will continue to work with the Congress to carry out the program as effectively as possible and take care that the law be faithfully executed.

I am gratified by the assistance authorized in this bill for the Afghan people and the non-communist opposition in Cambodia who are resisting foreign aggression and occupation groups. The repeal of the Clark amendment relating to Angola is also welcome, eliminating a symbol of unnecessary and inappropriate restrictions in the conduct of U.S. foreign policy.

On the other hand, I do have serious reservations about sections 717 and 1302 of S. 960. In spirit, both sections are consistent with my foreign policy. Section 717 directs the secretary of state to enter into negotiations with the government of Mexico over certain trade issues. I am deeply committed to efforts to facilitate international commerce and welcome congressional attention to this matter. Similarly, Section 1302(a) correctly describes U.S. policy not to recognize or negotiate with the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) so long as the PLO does not recognize Israel's right to exist and does not accept United Nations Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338. This administration reaffirms that policy and welcomes congressional support for it.

I am compelled, however, as a matter of principle to reiterate my refusal to accept any congressional effort to impose legislative restrictions or directions with respect to the conduct of international negotiations which, under Article II of the Constitution, is a function reserved exclusively to the president. I will, therefore, consider sections 717(b) and 1302(b) as constituting only nonbinding expressions of congressional views on these issues.

I also wish to mention the new certification requirement relating to arms sales to Jordan. I believe that this requirement is unnecessary and inappropriate in light of King Hussein's recent public statements confirming Jordan's commitment to the recognition of Israel and to negotiate promptly and directly with Israel under the basic tenets of United Nations Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338. Furthermore, the king has made and is continuing to make significant and courageous efforts in putting these principles into practice by moving Jordan toward direct negotiations with Israel.

Finally, I would note that the bill contains a number of other restrictions and requirements that the administration must meet in carrying out its foreign affairs programs. For example, tying security assistance for Greece and Turkey to an arithmetic formula ignores the changing conditions in the region and unnecessarily limits our flexibility to respond. None of these restrictions, by itself, is unacceptably onerous, but in the aggregate, they seriously constrain my ability to carry out foreign policy, particularly in rapidly changing situations. I believe that rigid, detailed, prescriptive provisions of law can also frustrate the desires of the Congress. Thus, I plan to work with the Congress to minimize such constraints in the future.

The programs authorized by S. 960 are central to attaining U.S. foreign policy objectives and to promoting international security and stability by helping our allies and friends to achieve economic growth, to deal with problems requiring humanitarian assistance, and to deter and defend against military threats. It is therefore imperative that we join in a mutual effort with Congress to assure the success of these programs during the years ahead.

***WASH. TIMES-8/8-"Anti-Semitism On The Rebound" Has anybody noticed the recent resurgence of anti-Semitism? Jew baiting is an integral part of the Third World foreign policy. The UN General Assembly scarcely bothers to veil its energizing anti-Semitism anymore. In Europe, subterranean anti-Semitism is resurfacing. In this country, anti-Semitism seemed to be on the decline, but suddenly we have Farrakhan bringing huge crowds to their feet with Hitleresque phrases. Less puzzling but more dangerous is the recent growth of Aryan neo-Nazi groups. Nearly every day, newspapers and magazines around the country receive in the mail "fresh evidence" that the Holocaust never happened and "compelling proof" that the media are controlled by a "Jewish conspiracy." Accusations of "racism," "homophobia," and "anti-Semitism" are on the rage, to be sure. To ignore anti-Semitism is worse than to see it everywhere. It is seeping back into mainstream America, and debasing us all.

THE EVENING SUN-Augustus Norton-Wash. is searching for a US policy toward Islamic fundamentalism. The fact is that it is a rather familiar kind of political phenomenon, less difficult to grasp than we assume. Although it is widely varied and often a product of particular domestic political circumstances, there are certain common traits shared by many of the Islamic movements. The most important of these is a deeply felt sense of disfranchisement. Islam has not been rediscovered; it was never "lost." It was reappropriated for a new purpose. For many Moslems, it has a renewed appeal as a familiar and culturally authentic idiom of protest and political action. Such organizations need an enemy in order to mobilize support: It is easier to blame America than to take responsibility oneself. Many Moslems object to some aspects of US policy in the Middle East. But objecting to policy and agitating violently against it are two very different things and small cells of fanatical terrorists who have forced their way to our attention in recent years are hardly representative. Fundamentalism is an important new political movement to come to terms with.

THE PRESS REPORTS

Israeli Security Zone Tensions Grow Into Full Guerrilla War

CHRISTIAN SCI. MON.-Greenberg-Israeli debate over policy toward its northern neighbor has been heightened in the wake of the first Israeli combat deaths in

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south Lebanon since April. Israeli officials and Army officers concede that the three to 12 mile security strip Israel has established just north of the border is anything but secure. Reports from the security zone area indicate that it has become the arena of a full-scale guerrilla war. Israeli intelligence officials say that Syria is behind many of these attacks. Attempts to reach an understanding with Amal on policing the border area have foundered on intra-Amal rivalries and the group's fears that any agreement with Israel will brand it a traitor in the eyes of other Lebanese factions.

Falashas Recognized As Jews

WASH. TIMES-(Wires)-Israel's newly immigrated Ethiopians have been recognized by the country's two chief rabbis as Jews in every way, Peres said after meeting leaders of the Ethiopian immigrants Monday. The chief rabbis have made a concession after the Ethiopian Jews protested undergoing a collective symbolic conversion.

Partial Arab Summit Convenes

WASH. POST-Dickey-A summit meeting of about half of the leaders of the Arab world convened amid persistent confusion and declining expectations about what it might achieve. King Hassan called for conciliation with those nations that did not attend. But Arafat, took the floor in what appeared to be an unexpected power play and insisted on denouncing Syrian-backed attacks against Palestinians in Lebanon.

Palestinians Arrested In Israeli Army Bombing

THE SUN-(Wires)-Israeli security forces in the West Bank yesterday arrested several Palestinians suspected of throwing firebombs at Israeli troops. Rabin said Israel would use all necessary means, including expulsion and administrative detention, to maintain order in the occupied territory.

Qaddafi Threatens To Expel Egyptians

WASH. TIMES-(UPI)-Qaddafi angered by Egypt's efforts to secure peace with Israel, threatened to expel about 100,000 Egyptians working in Libya. "If the Egyptians working in Libya support the Egyptian regime with their hard currency remittances, this means they are helping Israel indirectly," Qaddafi said.

Gemayel, Assad Agree To A Summit

WASH. TIMES-(Wires)-Fighting erupted between Christian and Moslem militias in Beirut yesterday, and Gemayel and Assad agreed to hold a summit in Damascus, probably to discuss Lebanon's future. News of the planned Gemayel-Assad summit came amid reports that Christian leaders were working on their own list of peace proposals one day after some 45 pro-Syrian factions in Lebanon formed a mostly Moslem alliance.

The investigation did reveal that there was enough evidence to charge the commander of the operation and several officers with inappropriate behavior and the use of force.

Lebanese Opposition Group Calls for Closer Ties to Syria

NYT-Reuters-About 100 Druse, Moslem and moderate Christian leaders announced that they were forming a National Unity Front, calling for closer ties with Syria. They called for tough anti-Israeli action in the south. The meeting was lead by Amal.

Professor Who Sold Hebrew Books Dismissed

NYT-Reif-Alexander Guttman, a professor at Hebrew Union College in Ohio, was dismissed for consigning and selling manuscripts and books that he did not own. In the same case, the NY State Supreme Court postponed a final decision on a settlement reached last month involving the materials sold at Sotheby's.

POST-Boustany-Pro-Syrian Moslem and Druze opposition leaders and Greek Orthodox figures met in Shtawrah to proclaim a National Unity Front and to demand changes in Lebanon's system of political representation, which now favors the Maronite Christians. The new alliance, made up of 15 political parties and 30 independent politicians, issued a statement calling for a "democratic and secular" Lebanon, with wide-ranging constitutional and electoral reforms. In the statement proclaiming the National Unity Front, the signatories also called for the trial of "agents" dealing with Israel and of officials accused of "crimes against the population."

Sunni Suicide Bomber Uses Mule

WASH. POST-(AP)-A suicide bomber riding a mule detonated saddle baskets full of explosives near a southern Lebanese building that Israel says is used by the SLA. Israel's military command said one Lebanese civilian was wounded, and the blast shattered windows.

Syria Said To Be Releasing US Hostages In Lebanon

WASH. TIMES-(AP)-A Kuwaiti newspaper yesterday quoted a Western diplomat as saying that most of the Americans being held hostage in Lebanon would be released today to steal the thunder from the opening of an Arab summit conference, according to a State Dept. monitoring service. The diplomat was quoted as saying that Syria "wants to create a large-scale international propaganda festival to steal the limelight from the Arab summit conference."

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אש"פ אמר זאת בגלוי: אין אש"פ מעוניין במר"מ עם ישראל, אין אש"פ רוצה ומעוניין בשלום עם ישראל, מה שאש"פ רוצה להשיג באמצעות המפגש עם מורפי זה סכרת ארה"ב באש"פ. לשידור זה יחשב להישג גדול והם גם מחוייבים לרעיון הסובייטי של ועידה בינלאומית, זו גם הסיבה בגללה תושך חוסיין ברעיון הועידה הבינלאומית. הוא מחוייב לאש"פ, קיים פער גדול בין יעוד המפגש כמעטייר ע"י ארה"ב בשמביא למר"מ ישיר לבין הצטיירותו בעיני אש"פ: להוליק להכרה אמריקאית באש"פ, הדבר גורם לנו דאגה רבה, דאגה זו מתחזקת לאור העובדה שאש"פ עודנו ארגון טרור העוסק בטרור טעשה טבידס יום, שה"ח הזכיר מאמרו של תאלד אל חסאן הקורא להמשך הטאנק המזניין, באמצעי טרור, נו ישראל.

מיפגש עם אנשי אש"פ יקנה לגיטמציה לטרור הבינלאומי ויהיה לו אימפקט עצום על מעמד נציגיו. שה"ח הוסיף שיתכן וחוסין רוצה להשיג יציבות בירדן באפשרו נוכחות אשפ"ת מוגברת בירדן. אפשר וחוסין מאמין שהוא שולט באש"פ אך עם אנשי אש"פ בירדן לעולם אינך יכול לדעת כיצד הדבר ייגמר, שה"ח העיר כי אין אנו יודעים עמדתה הסופית של ארה"ב לגבי קיום המפגש, ברם אנו מודאג ממה שעלול לקרות לתהליך השלום, אש"פ מהווה סכנה לשלום, בלי אש"פ, בלי טרור קל היה יותר להגיע לשלום, אש"פ מהווה מיכשול לשלום.

וידעתה הגיב שהחלטה קשה על ארה"ב, ארה"ב קיבלה הבטחה מחוסין שאם המפגש עם המשלחת הירדנית פלשתינאית יתקיים יחדל אש"פ מהעיסוק בטרור, יכיר בישראל ויקבל החלטות מעב"ט 242 ו-338, ואם הבטחה זו תופסת כי אז המפגש המוצע סולל הדרך למר"מ ישיר. לענת חוסין אם ארה"ב תמאן להפגש עם המשלחת או תידחה קיומו לזמן ניכר כי אז תיפגע בתהליך שהוא מאמין ובטוח בו, מאידך אם ארה"ב תבוא למפגש ואש"פ לא יעמוד בהתחייבותיו מה תהיינה התוצאות? ככלכלך האמוץ על סקר ועמדות הסיכונים סבור וידעתה שהסכנות אינן כה חמורות, כיוון שאם אש"פ לא יעמוד בהתחייבותיו תימצא ארה"ב כמו שנתנה לו הזדמנות, עשתה כל שביכולה, חוסין יכיר באכזבתו, ישראל לא תהיה מעורבת והם ונשלם בלי שתיגרם מבוכה רבתי, ומאידך טמון פוטנציאל גדול בסיכוי אש"פ חוסין ישיג את מה שהוא מבטיח לארה"ב שבכוחו לחלץ מאש"פ, ארה"ב עדיין מתמודדת עם רשימת המועמדים שהיא מאכזבת, מצאנו שני שמות כשירים (מברק טוען שיש שם שלישי כשיר, של אחד השותפים במצרים ולו דעות עמצאיות). טכל מקום ארה"ב איננה רוצה לעשות דבר מה שיפגע לרעה ועל כן החלטה כה קשה עליה.

שה"ח אמר כי זה נשמע כחלום - לראות אש"פ משתלב בתהליך השלום, ומסכים לשלום עם ישראל, שה"ח אמר שאם אש"פ מוכן למה שהוא לוחש על אזני חוסין, מדוע מנהיגיו אומרים היפוכם של דברים מדי יום, היינו שלא יחדלו מטרור ואף יתמידו בו, שלא יקבלו החלטות מעב"ט ולא יסכימו למר"מ ישיר, אם כה אז רצונם לשכנע ארה"ב להיוועד עמם עליהם לוטר כדברים האלה בפוטבני, הם אינם יודעים זאת והסה"כ שזו עוד לגנדה ערבית. וידעתה אמר שארה"ב יודעת שחוסין מסתכן משהו בטענתו שיש לו הסכם עם אש"פ והבטחה ברורה זו, ברם לסלק הבטחותיו הצידה ולהתריס כלפיו שאין מאמינים לו, זה מעט קשה. שה"ח אמר כי אנו לא נוכל להשיא עצה לארה"ב ברם אנו בטוחים שכאשר ארה"ב מבטיחה שהיא לא תיפגש עם אש"פ היא תעמוד בהבטחתה.

JOHN C. WHITEHEAD

Mr. Whitehead was born in Evanston, Illinois on April 2, 1922. He graduated from Haverford College in 1943 with a B.A. degree in Economics. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

After the war, Mr. Whitehead attended the Harvard Business School, receiving his MBA degree with distinction in 1947. He later received honorary doctorate degrees from Haverford College and Pace University.

Mr. Whitehead joined the firm of Goldman, Sachs, and Co., in 1947 as a junior statistician and has worked there ever since. He became a partner in 1956 and a senior partner and co-chairman in 1976. During that period Goldman Sachs developed into one of the world's foremost investment banking and brokerage firms. Mr. Whitehead stepped down as co-chairman and general partner of Goldman Sachs on November 30, 1984, but continued as a limited partner and chairman of the firm's international advisory board. Since that time he has devoted most of his time to activities in the non-profit sector.

Mr. Whitehead has served on the Boards of Directors of numerous companies. He has long been active in a variety of educational, civic, and charitable activities. He was formerly President of the International Rescue Committee, in which capacity he traveled widely around the world in the cause of political refugees. He remains a member of the Conference Board and the Council on Foreign Relations.

For many years, Mr. Whitehead has been active in Republic party political affairs. He is former co-chairman of the Republican National Finance Committee and has been an active fund raiser for local, state, and national candidates.

Mr. Whitehead was sworn in as Deputy Secretary of State on July 9, 1985.

Ambassador Egan now serves as Executive Assistant to the Deputy Secretary.

MR. DAVID A. WEISS

Mr. Weiss was born in 1953 in Washington, D.C. He received his B.A. degree from Hamilton College in 1975 and an M.S. from Georgetown University in 1978. From 1979-80 he was Special Assistant to the Director of the Peace Corps. Since joining the State Department in 1980 he has served in Port-au-Prince and in Washington.

Mr. Weiss is currently Special Assistant to the Deputy Secretary.

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White Travels

Mr. Whitehead "should do well as Deputy Secretary of State, although there'll necessarily be certain on-the-job training," said George W. Ball, who held the No. 3 post at the State Department for six years in the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations.

In dealing with international business matters, and in pursuit of his outside interests, Mr. Whitehead has traveled around the world. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the Trilateral Commission. He is also president of the International Rescue Committee, a major organization to promote the welfare of refugees, for which he has traveled to Hungary, Pakistan, the Sudan, Cambodia, Thailand and Vietnam. On Monday, he returned from visiting Vietnamese refugees in Hong Kong.

'I've Got a Lot to Learn'

Nevertheless, Mr. Whitehead acknowledged in an interview yesterday that much studying lies ahead for him. He declined to discuss foreign policy issues, saying: "I have a huge amount of reading to do, and I'll be spending as much time as I can in the next few weeks being briefed. I've got a lot to learn."

In the financial world, Mr. Whitehead has been among the most respected leaders. Until he stepped down in November, he had been co-chairman of Goldman, Sachs with John L. Weinberg. The two guided the firm to enormous profitability.

While hardly a maverick, Mr. Whitehead has been one of Wall Street's most outspoken leaders.

When he announced his retirement plans last August, he denied that he would take an Administration post if Mr. Reagan were re-elected. Yesterday, Mr. Whitehead said that Mr. Shultz called two weeks ago, and "when they came and twisted my arm, I guess I couldn't say no." He said he and the Secretary of State have "been acquainted with each other for quite a long time but never been close friends."

Mr. Whitehead, who has thick white hair, blue eyes and a trim build, has been among the most easygoing and approachable of Wall Street's executives, and in 1972 and 1973 he served as chairman of the Securities Industry Association. The post involves acting as the industry's spokesman before Congress and various Washington agencies.

Mr. Whitehead has been an avid supporter and fundraiser for President Reagan. In an article written for The New York Times last October, he gave a glimpse of his feelings for foreign affairs.

"It begins to appear," he wrote, "that the tide of Soviet power, the principal threat to stability in the world for many years, has begun to ebb. Beset by aging, unstable leadership, serious internal economic problems, an embarrassingly unsuccessful war in Afghanistan, and recurring rebellion within its own orbit, Russia has lost its appeal to third world nations and may now be slipping backward. Over time, these developments may permit some moderation in the increase of defense expenditures and lead to a more easily balanced budget."

Began as Statistician

John Cunningham Whitehead was born on April 2, 1923, in Evanston, Ill., and grew up in Montclair, N.J., the son of an electrical engineer for the Bell System.

After graduating from Haverford College in 1943 he entered the Navy, and after World War II he earned a master's degree from Harvard Business School. Scrapping plans to become an economics professor, he joined Goldman, Sachs as a statistician in 1947. He became a partner in 1966 and co-chairman in 1978.

The father of three children, ages 14, 30 and 32, he and his second wife, the former Jean W. Chartener, live in Manhattan and Essex Fells, N.J.

Mr. Whitehead, widely believed to be a multimillionaire, said he was not sure what financial arrangements he would have to make to take his new post, although he said he would resign from the numerous corporate boards on which he serves.

"That's mostly for legal reasons," he said, "but I expect there won't be time for outside activities."
