מסיחה עם דיוויד מק Mack - NEA - ב-15.1.

לבנון

1. מק התייחס די בחיוב להודעה ממשלת ישראל על שלבי הנסיגה ומכל מקום לא גילה כל הסתייגות מכך. העיר - שעדיף היה כמובן לעשות זאת במסגרת הסכם עם לבנון.
 2. יוניפי"ל. מק העלה מספר אספקטים הקשורים ליוניפי"ל: עדיין ניתן, אם כי בפחות וודאות, להגיע להסכם בנושא מאחר והלבנונים מעוניינים בהרחבת המנדט ובכניסה הכח לשטחים שישראל תפנה. הסכים עמי שהורדת צה"ל גם אם תעשה לא תהיה אפקטיבית בלשון המעטה. קשה להעריך מתי צה"ל יוכל לחפקד בצורה כלשהי. מק גם לא בטוח מה תהיה עמדת ישראל ובעיקר עמדת המדינות התורמות לכח לקראת חידוש המנדט ב-19.4.85. אין לשכוח הגורמים הנוספים הקשורים - טוריה ובריה"מ. קשה לשער מה תהיה עמדתם.

3. מק העלה אפשרות לשני תסריטים:

- א. לבנון פונה ב"שקט" למזכ"ל (דרך ארקהרט) בבקשה להורות ליוניפי"ל לפטרל בנקודות רגישות באזורים שישראל תפנה ולדווח מימצאיהם. ההליך הנ"ל בא לעקוף סיבוכים פרוצדורליים.
- ב. המשך שיחות בין ישראל לבנון (והאוי"ס) בנקורה או מחוצה לה על השגת הסכם, בהיקף כזה או אחר, לשילוב יוניפי"ל בשלבי הנסיגה.

טוריה

- 4. לשאלתי בדבר עמדת דמשק למכלול נאקורה, אמר שהטורים מלכתחילה היו בלתי ברוורים לגבי יוניפי"ל. אמרו לאמריקאים (מק היה במשלחות של מרפי) מסכימים, אך לא צפונה מהליטני ועל הגבול הבינ"ל, לשאלה "ומה באמצע" - התחמקו.
- 5. דמשק חשדה לאורך כל הדרך שישראל מוליכה אותה שולל:
 א. אינה מתכוונת לסגת באמת.

ב. חיטוג רק עם הישג פוליטי,
 שני הדברים הנ"ל אינם מקובלים על דמשק.

6. הסורים, עפ"י מק הגיעו למסקנה וכך אמרו למרפי בפעם האחרונה שהיה בדמשק, שישראל רואה את שיחות נקורה תחליף להסכם מאי ומושכת אותם למצב של B0g Down . בסופו של דבר ישראל תנפנף בהסכם כדי להוכיח בין אם הדבר נכון ובין אם לאו, שגררו את הסורים לויחורים.

הסורים, העריך בתשובה לשאלה, היו מעדיפים שישראל חיטוג במסגרת הסכם , משני טעמים:

Pay Itself

- א. להוכיח שעמידה נחרצת מול ישראל משלמה
- ב. לקבוע תקדים, לטווח ארוך, שסוריה שוחפה פעילה לכל הסכם / שיחות עם ישראל גם אם הדבר (דרום) כביכול אינו נוגע לה ישירות.
- לכן יש כמובן נגיעה לתביעה הסורית בחום הסכסוך שמשלחה משותפון תטפל בכל היבטי ההטור (גמדי"ע).

7. מק הדגיש שבטעה שהדרום בעדיפות ראשונה אצל הלבנונים, שניה (אחרי הנושא הכלכלי) אצל הישראלים, הרי הוא ה-5 במניין הספירה הסורית. הנושאים הקודמים לו:

- א. המצב הכלכלי בסוריה
- ב. נושא ההנהגה (כינוס הבעת' / ריפעת)
- ג. היחסים עם אש"פ והזירה הבינערבית (איראן, עיראק וכד')
- ד. מערכת היחסים עם ברה"מ.

בסיכום, מק טוען שהסורים טרם אמרו את מילתם האחרונה ועתה אחרי שישראל מתחילה לסגת יצטרכו להעריך המצב מחדש. תגובתם הראשונה המילולית להחלטת ממשלת ישראל תשמש אינדיקציה לאן פניהם.

8. מק שמע, אך אין תימוכין בידינו, שסוריה פועלת תחת אילוצי המשולש ירדן-אש"פ-מצרים.

סוריה פנים

9. אין להם תמונה מצב בסוריה לגבי מה שמתרחש בכינוס הבעת'. הדיונים מתרכזים בשני נושאים כלכלה ורענון המפלגה (והממשלה). אסד, למרבה הפלא נוכח בכל הדיונים הארוכים וחמייגעים אך שומר על שתיקה מוחלטת.

10. ריפעת. לא חזר למעמד הכח שהיה בידינו טרם צאתו לגלות. ממשיך לאבד גובה ואינו מורגש בוועידה למרות שמופיע בכל אירוע. סביר שפועל מאחורי הקלעים.

11. פרישת אסד ומינוי יורש. מק בדעה שכל האופציות פתוחות מבלי שיהיה לו מידע בנידון. לא מוציא מכלל אפשרות שאסד אמנם ימשיך, אך כבר בוועידה יצוץ שמו של המועמד מטעמו שיפעל לצידו ובהדרגה יתחלק איתו בעול. באותה מידה של סבירות, אם כי לא גבוהה, שאסד לא יעמיד עצמו לחקופה נשיאות נוספת.

ירדן-אש"פ-מצרים

12. בשעה שערפאת ממשיך ב- Dancing שלו וכלל לא ידוע לאן הללו יובילו אותו, הרי ירדן ומצרים פועלות ברצינות כדי להניח משהו על השולחן האמריקאי בעת ביקור מובראק בווינגטון.

הערכתו שהללו פועלים על בסיס 242 והסכם קמפ-דיוויד - מינוי נציגים פלשתינאים מהגדמ"ע ועזה לצד אלו מירדן, ובמסגרת האוטונומיה דהיינו דיון על ה- Final Status של השטחים.

13. למרות שמק היה ענייני והתחלק עמי במחשבותיו הוא לא נמנע מלהעיר שלישראל יש חלק בעקטנות הטורית - הכותרות בתקשורת טביב סידורי הבטחון הנדרשים מסוריה.

14. טען שאם אמנם חוטיין והפלשתינאים יביעו הסכמתם להכנס לשיחות ולדון בנושא "עמיד השטחים" קשה יהיה לארה"ב ל"ליקנות" את עמדת ישראל שהאוטונומיה נועדה לאנשים אך לא לאדמה מים וכ"י, הפעם, אמר, "זה יהיה קשה".

מתוך שיחה עם אריק אדלמן (המחלקה הסובייטית - מחמ"ד)

1. מגעי ארה"ב - בריה"מ לגבי המזה"ת. איסקוב משגרירות בריה"מ בווינגטון בא ביום ו' 4.1.85 והודיע כי בריה"מ מוכנה לפגישות בדרג מורפי-פוליאקוב לגבי המזה"ת. הסובייטי הזמין את מורפי למוסקבה בחודש פברואר. הדיפלומט הסובייטי הקריא מנייר נקודות את עמדת בריה"מ תוך דגש על רצונה של זו בשלום ויציבות במזה"ת. נייר זה לא הוטאר בידי האמריקנים.
2. בדיונים פנימיים בתוך מחמ"ד נטו אנשי המחלקה הסובייטית במחמ"ד להענות להזמנת הסובייטים לקיים המפגש הראשון במוסקבה משום שהעריכו כי הדבר יאפשר להם גישה נוחה יותר לפקידים סובייטים (הערה - יצויין כי גישת אנשי שגרירות ארה"ב במוסקבה ושל אנשי המחלקה הסובייטית במחמ"ד מוגבלת מאד). אנשי NEA הביעו התנגדות לקיום הפגישה הראשונה בבריה"מ מתוך הערכה כי הדבר יתפרש שהישג סובייטי ויפגע במעמד וושינגטון בעולם הערבי.
3. אדלמן הוסיף כי בשיחות ג'נבה הזכיר שולץ כדרך אגב את הענות בריה"מ להצעת האמריקנים לדבר על משברים אזזריים ושיבח את הגישה הקונסטרוקטיבית הזו. גרומיקו לא הגיב על כך. אדלמן ציין כי הסובייטים התעלמו משאר אזזרי המשבר שצויינו בהצעת ארה"ב המקורית מסוף אביב 1984 (דרום אפריקה, המפרץ הפרסי) ובחרו להתייחס, אמנם באיחור רב, רק לאזור המזה"ת. אדלמן הדגיש כי אין כוונה להגיע לתאום מבצעי עם הסובייטים או לגיבוש נוסחה משותפת נוסח הודעת ארה"ב-בריה"מ מ-1.10.1977. עם זאת, מקווים כי השיחות ההיינה מועילות ותיעדרנה צביון של דו-קרב תעמולתי. לשאלתי הצביע אדלמן על מתכונת השיחות שניהל השגריר קנדי במוסקבה בסוף נובמבר 1984 עם עמיתו הסובייטים בהן נדונה באזירה נינוחה, נעדרת כל נימה אידיאולוגית, סוגיית הנשק הגרעיני וחפוצה גרעינית בעולם. כמו כן, ציין אדלמן כי לדעתו לא חשבו במחמ"ד עד הסוף מה בדיוק תכלית שיחות אלו.

4. אדלמן ציין כי בעקבות הפרסום בזכר אפשרות דיאלוג סובייטי-אמריקני בנושאי מזה"ח התבקשה מחלקתו להכין הודעה עבור דובר מחמ"ד שנועדה להרגיע הרוחות ולהצביע על כך שלא חל שינוי בעמדתה של ארה"ב לגבי חתהליך המדיני באיזור. כמו כן, יתודרכו שגרירי ארצות ערב על עצם המהלך בדומה לתדרוך פלמר בישראל. אדלמן ציין כי למיטב ידיעתו לא הודיע פלמר למצרים על הדיאלוג הנ"ל בין מעצמות העל.

5. עסקת נשק ירון בריה"מ. אדלמן לא ראה דברים ברורים בנידון, אולם התרשם כי הירדנים יקנו ציוד להגנה נגד מטוסים. ציין תוחחי ZSU 23/24 וטילי SA-14. מעריכים כי העסקה תהיה בסדר גודל של 200-300 מליון דולר בתנאים פיננסיים נוחים. עם זאת, בשארית הערכת מחמ"ד כי אין חוססין מעוניין ביחסי רכש משמעותיים עם בריה ..

QUESTION: Okay. And could I ask about the free trade zone for Israel? Has that been finalized yet?

MR. ROMBERG: Let me take a look into that and see where we are on that, following on last week's guidance.

QUESTION: Alan, on the Middle East again, have you made any contact with the Syrians regarding the Israeli plan for withdrawal from south Lebanon?

MR. ROMBERG: I'm not going to get into the specifics of the diplomatic dialogue we have had. Obviously, we have had both with Ambassador Murphy's extended trip up there and through our diplomatic missions, a lot of dialogue, with a lot of the parties who are involved. But I just am not going to get into the specifics.

QUESTION: I just mean after the last visit by Ambassador Murphy to Damascus?

MR. ROMBERG: I'm not going get --

QUESTION: Has there been any contact?

MR. ROMBERG: Well, obviously, we have had diplomatic contacts with Syria. I'm just not going to get into the question of with whom we speak about what and when. But clearly, Syria is one of the important players and we continue to talk with them about the general subject.

QUESTION: Is the United States concerned that the Israeli withdrawal now announced will produce the same sort of anarchy and chaos that the Israeli withdrawal to the Awali caused a year and a half ago?

MR. ROMBERG: Well, I don't have a judgment to offer on that. I think that, as I say, we think that perhaps this will stimulate further conversation about the arrangements. I think Mr. Labrani (?) had a piece as well as the Cabinet announcement yesterday which indicated that the Israelis would look to continuing discussions about political arrangements. So I'm not going to try to speculate on that.



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QUESTION: Alan, I don't know if someone asked this question, because I arrived late. Are Senator Percy, former Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and Mr. Cisco briefing or giving a report to the administration about their tour of the Middle East in the last few days?

MR. ROMBERG: I don't know the answers to whether they will give some sort of formal report or briefing. I'm sure there has — although they are both traveling in a private capacity — I'm sure that there is contact with them. So I think in substantive terms, I'm sure we will have their views and so forth. But I don't know if they're planning to submit formal reports. They say they are traveling privately.

QUESTION: Can you check if they will be briefing?

MR. ROMBERG: No, I don't think that would be up to us to comment on. But I think again substantively there is no problem with the idea that we would be probably talk with them.

QUESTION: Did you have any specific message or were you trying to draw a distinction when you said, "He support U.N.-sponsored efforts for full withdrawal" apart from the announced Israeli plan, especially the third part that said to maintain a strip of land under its control?

MR. ROMBERG: Well, I said I'm not going to get into the specifics nor do I necessarily accept your interpretation of what the Israeli Cabinet decision was. But the talks in Naqura were pulled together under U.N. auspices as it were and we have said that that was a good forum for trying to work out arrangements to resolve the problems of south Lebanon and we continue to believe that's the case.

QUESTION: It was announced that Mr. Rabin will be visiting Washington to meet with Secretaries Shultz and Weinberger. Do you anticipate a visit by Shimon Peres after that — any summit meetings in the near future?

MR. ROMBERG: I don't have anything on a visit by the Prime Minister. I guess, again, that would something that, in any case, would be addressed by the White House and I also don't have anything on Mr. Rabin's visit, but that again I think would be something that the Pentagon would address.

תדרוך דובר מחסייד ליום ג' 15.1.85

QUESTION: How does the Department assess the Israeli Cabinet decision to withdraw from Southern Lebanon?

MR. ROMBERG: The United States welcomes Israel's decision to withdraw its forces from Lebanon. We have consistently supported withdrawal of all foreign forces from Lebanon. (Pause.) (Laughter.)

QUESTION: How!

MR. ROMBERG: Well, if you have any further question, I might respond.

QUESTION: Alan, do you also consistently support a negotiated withdrawal? This is a unilateral one. So how do you feel about that?

MR. ROMBERG: Well, we continue to support the U.N.-sponsored talks at Naqura as a means of achieving arrangements necessary for a resolution of the security problems in south Lebanon and we believe the Israeli decision could provide a new impetus for progress at Naqura toward arrangements that would be in the interest of all parties involved.

QUESTION: How about -- (inaudible)?

MR. ROMBERG: I think that the Israeli Prime Minister may have talked to -- or the Defense Minister -- I can't remember which one -- may have talked to that a little bit, but I think we'll leave that as I just stated.

QUESTION: Here you consulted before this decision was taken by the Israeli government?

MR. ROMBERG: Well, this was an Israeli government decision.

QUESTION: Well, that I understand.

MR. ROMBERG: I don't think we'll get into the question of diplomatic dialogue, but this certainly was an Israeli government decision, not ours. Our thoughts about it, I will leave you with in terms of what I said before.

QUESTION: What about beforehand?

QUESTION: Alan, yesterday the Islamic Jihad claimed responsibility for the killing of the two French people, but of more concern to CNN, they also they are going to try Jerry Levin (?) and the other Americans who have been kidnapped. Does the State Department have a reaction?

MR. ROMBERG: Yes. Although we cannot confirm that the individual making of the statement has any connection with the Islamic Jihad, we nevertheless take this as a grave and serious threat. These innocent people have been held captive for extended periods of time -- in some cases, approaching a year -- and allowed no contact with their families. Their treatment violates the norms of civilized behavior and is contrary to the very religious tenets the caller in Beirut claims to defend. There is, of course, no foundation to the charges that these individuals, quote, "used journalism, education and religion as a cover," closed quote, for, quote, "subversive activities," closed quote. And that is patently absurd.

QUESTION: On the welcoming of the Israeli decision, does the welcome extend or cover the Israeli plan itself, the three stage plan?

MR. ROMBERG: I don't have a detailed reaction to give you on the plan as announced. I think I'm going to stick to the words I've already given to you.

QUESTION: Going back to the Middle East. Regarding the Israeli announcement about Lebanon, what is the U.S. role going to be now? You say this may give new impetus to the talks. What is the U.S. going to do in this situation?

MR. ROMBERG: I don't think anything in principle that's any different, Don, from what we have been doing, which is to be as helpful as we can be in a manner that we can be. But that does not change the nature of our involvement. If you're asking, are we going to get into mediation, I have no indication at this moment that we're going to get into mediation per se. As I say, we continue to support the U.N.-sponsored talks at Naqura as a means of achieving agreements and arrangements on southern Lebanon.

QUESTION: Will the United States support them by sending Mr. Murphy or somebody else out there to see if it can get this impetus you're hoping for?

MR. ROMBERG: At the moment, I don't know of any specific plans by Ambassador Murphy to travel to the region, but I don't rule out the possibility of another trip. It would be foolish for me to do that.

He is a democrat and worked on the Sharon case under a random system of picking judges for cases.

NYT-Kifner-An anonymous caller claiming to represent Islamic Holy War said that the 5 kidnapped Americans would be put on trial as spies. The caller also took responsibility for the death of the deputy commander of French troops in Lebanon. (see ND-Reuters; DN-AP)

D'Amato on Nazi

DN-Rainie-Sen. D'Amato claimed he was deceived into writing a letter to Shultz last Sept. arguing against deportation of a Nazi war criminal, Karl Linas. He says an emigre group concealed the fact that Linas commanded a concentration camp.

NYT-Reuters-Iran said its warplanes shot down an Iraqi jet over the Gulf, and Iraq said its jets hit another "naval target" near Kharg



1. Following a thorough analysis of the effects of the package deal, and in the wake of comprehensive preliminary deliberations with the two 'partners' to the deal (Labor and Management), it has become apparent that the implementation of the program -- as presented by Finance Minister Modai and Director General Sharon -- would require unilateral imposition by the government; would drive inflation up by over 20% during the first month of implementation; and would likely result in socio-economic dislocations that could render the program unsustainable.
2. Consequently, and based on the dominant consideration of the need to sustain newly acquired public confidence as a pre-requisite for success, we have introduced certain modifications to the original plan. While preserving its comprehensiveness, they reflect the determination to implement the plan by consensus -- rather than through imposition -- as well as the psycho-economic need to sustain a one-digit monthly inflation rate while protecting foreign currency reserves.
3. Consequently, representatives of Government, Management and Labor gathered for intensive negotiations with the aim of reaching an agreement prior to the expiration of the 'package deal'. The need to avoid a period of uncertainty produced a decision to cut subsidies even as we were still negotiating.
4. These negotiations produced a plan for stabilizing the economy, including an eight-month agreement (to be re-negotiated upon request as of the end of five months) that includes the following measures:

- a. Immediate termination of all subsidies for fuel
 - a savings of \$480 million.
- b. A cut by half of subsidies for water (requires an act by the Knesset)
 - a savings of \$ 60 million.
- c. An immediate cut by half of the subsidy for electricity
 - a savings of \$100 million.
- d. A decision to cut the other half of the subsidy for electricity within six weeks
 - a savings of \$100 million.
- e. A 25% increase in the price of subsidized foodstuffs
 - a savings of \$ 75 million.
- f. Two equal subsequent increases of 13% each in the prices of foodstuffs
 - a savings of \$ 75 million.
- g. An increase of 55% in the price of public transportation (to be implemented in ten days)
 - a savings of \$ 40 million.

An agreement has also been reached on procedure for a further drastic reduction in the subsidy for public transportation within a few months.

- h. During the months February-March 1985, subsidies will be cut by an additional \$200 million per month.
5. The total annual sum of immediate cuts in subsidies: \$780 million.
The eventual total annual sum of cuts in subsidies: \$1.15-1.20 billion.
6. The need to avoid a drastic -- if temporary -- increase in prices rules out a simultaneous substantial devaluation of the Shekel. Consequently, for the time being, we have not reduced foreign currency insurance for exports.

7. The Bank of Israel is not party to these measures and is independent in its decisions on monetary policy. Its intentions are, however:
 - a. to sustain an adequate foreign currency exchange rate based on trends of the index wholesale prices and expectations;
 - b. to establish a credit volume that is compatible with the government's policy of restraint.

8. The contribution of each of the parties to the agreement and to subsequent measures as described below, is as follows:
 - a. Labor:

Agreed to a first -- and most significant -- violation of the historical principle of automatic index compensation. This is translated into an agreement to forgo 30% of the otherwise mandatory wage increases. This amounts to a reduction of 7-7.5% in compensatory wage increases.

Concurrently, out of concern for the less well-to-do, all employees will receive a flat \$9.5 (nine and one half U.S. dollars) during the first month, and a flat \$2.0 (two U.S. dollars) during each of the following two months.
 - b. Management:

Agreed to absorb some 15% added costs by limiting price rises to an average of 5%. This is particularly significant in light of the fact that management had already absorbed added cost of some 30-35% accrued during the previous three-month freeze.
 - c. Government:

Agreed to grant employees who earn under \$720 a month, a 5% income tax cut for the months of June and July.

Total cost: about \$9 million per month.

9. Concurrently, all government services and taxes are not subject to this agreement. Thus, for example, a 300% increase in the cost of postal services and a 400% increase in telephone rates are being contemplated.

10. Also, the implementation of earlier agreed upon cuts amounting to \$1.1 billion in government operational expenditures is in progress.

11. Additional measures currently under discussion include:
 - a. A five-day work week in the public sector.
 - projected savings of \$200-250 million.
 - b. A wealth tax, with a projected yield of \$300-400 million.





QUESTION: BERNIE, YESTERDAY THERE WAS MENTION ON THE CBS EVENING NEWS ABOUT THE POSSIBLE STATEMENT YOU MAY HAVE ABOUT THE RESUMPTION OF SOME KIND OF A MEDIATION EFFORT PERHAPS IN THE MIDDLE EAST. IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO CLARIFY THAT.

MR. KALB: ACTUALLY, I DO HAVE SOMETHING ON THAT. I AM NOT GOING TO GET INTO THE SPECIFICS OF OUR DIPLOMATIC EXCHANGES. HOWEVER, I WOULD REFER YOU BACK TO THE PRESIDENT'S SEPTEMBER, 1984 ADDRESS AT THE U.N. GENERAL ASSEMBLY IN WHICH HE NOTED OUR INTEREST IN POLICY LEVEL DISCUSSIONS ABOUT REGIONAL PROBLEMS WITH THE SOVIETS. WE WOULD INCLUDE THE MIDDLE EAST AS A POSSIBLE AREA OF DISCUSSION. AS THE PRESIDENT SAID, THE OBJECTIVES OF SUCH A POLITICAL DIALOGUE ARE TO HELP AVOID MISCALCULATION, REDUCE THE POTENTIAL RISK OF U.S.-SOVIET CONFRONTATIONS AND HELP THE PEOPLE IN AREAS OF CONFLICT TO FIND PEACEFUL SOLUTIONS. WE HAVE CONTINUALLY URGED THE SOVIETS TO TAKE A CONSTRUCTIVE APPROACH TOWARD THE EFFORTS TO FIND PEACEFUL SOLUTIONS TO REGIONAL PROBLEMS. IN THIS CONNECTION, WE CONTINUE TO BELIEVE THAT SUCH AN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE IS NOT A PRODUCTIVE APPROACH TO THE SEARCH FOR PEACE. MR. KALB: YES, YOU CAN HAVE COPIES OF THAT.

QUESTION: THEN, BERNIE, WE HAVE NOT DISCUSSED THE MIDEAST WITH THE SOVIETS AND DON'T PLAN TO?

MR. KALB: WELL, LET ME PUT IT THIS WAY. NO AGREEMENT WAS REACHED IN GENEVA TO HOLD THE MIDDLE EAST EXPERTS TALK. 1. מרבית השיחה עסקה ב- Agenda של הממשל בקונגרס ה-99. במחמ"ד מתכוננים למאבקים קשים הצפויים בנושא MX וחקציב. נושאים אלה זוכים לעדיפות עליונה בעיני שולץ. דוגמא לכך מצוייה בכך ששולץ מיהר ללכת לשני בתי הקונגרס יומיים אחרי שובו מסיחות ג'נבה. שולץ הופיע בפני 21 סנטורים ו-45 מורשיט בשתי הופעות נפרדות, סגורות לקהל, במגמה להסביר עמדת הממשל ולבקט תמיכת הקונגרס בה. לראשונה מזה חדשים רבים התנהל דו"ח ענייני, נעדר צביון פוליטי בין נבחרים הציבור לבין מזכיר המדינה. עם זאת, מחמ"ד סבורה שעם שובו של הקונגרס לעבודה סדירה אחרי השבעת הנשיא יוצרו המחלוקות הפוליטיות השונות והממשל יצטרך להקדיש משאבים רבים כדי להבטיח השגת מטרותיו.

3. נושא התקציב טרם גמור. שולץ קיים סדרת פגישות עם סטוקמן בה ביקש העלאה בסה"ב סיוע החוץ. סטוקמן נכון לגידול מסויים, אולם אינו רוצה בגידול משמעותי. פוקס ראה מספרים שונים, אולם לפי טעה אין החלטה סופית ולכן מעריך כי מאריך הגשת התקציב לקונגרס יידחה השנה. פוקס ציין כי מצבה של ישראל בהקשר זה הינו שונה משאר המדינות המקבלות סיוע.

4. מכירות נשק לערבים. אגף הקשר לקונגרס לא נחבקש בשלב זה לבוא בהצעות כלשהן לגיבוש אסטרטגיה בנידון. פוקס טבור שטרם נפלה החלטה סופית בנידון אם כי קיימת נכונות למכור נשק למדינות ערב המתונות. מקבלי ההחלטות עסוקים בנושאים אחרים וטרם נטלו זמן כדי לדון בעניין. ייתכן וביקורים קרובים כגון זה של המלך פאהד יאלצו להקדיש זמן ומחשבה לנושא זה. כללית, אין הממשל שט למאבק נוסח אוואקס. פוקס בדעה שעל הממשל לקבוע קודם כל סולם עדיפויות מבחינת העיתוי ולטפל בנושא אחד כל פעם. חזר וציין כי MX ונושאי תקציב קודמים מבחינת טיפולם. עם זאת, ציין כי בחור מחמ"ד הושמעו גם קולות אחרים שדרשו להודיע לקונגרס מיד על עסקה סעודית בהנחה שהצפת הקונגרס בנושאים רבים לטיפול ישכיח נושא זה. פוקס הדגיש כי ההחלטה הסופית שמורה בידי שולץ ואין הוא פועל תמיד לפי עצת מומחים.

5. פוקס ניתח השינויים בצוות הבית הלבן וציין כי הליכתם של בייקר ודרמן לאוצר מחלישה יכולתו של האגף הפוליטי בבית הלבן לטפל בנושאי מדיניות חוץ ובטחון. ציין כי ייתכן שבמסגרת הגל הנוכחי יחולו גם שינויים בהרכב אגף הבית הלבן המופקד על הקשר לקונגרס.

הערה להערכתנו בנושא מכירות נשק יחזור הטיפול ויופקד בבית הלבן בידי ה- NSC (כפי שהיה הדבר עד כניסת בייקר לנושא זה בספטמבר 1981). כמו כן, גם תפקיד אגף הקשר לקונגרס של מחמ"ד יתחזק כתוצאה ממינוי דונלד ריגן כיו"ר צוות הבית הלבן.

5. נראה ממה שידוע, שלחוסייין אין הכנית בגדר של blueprint ומדובר בעקרונות הגורמים הנ"ל מעריכים שחוסייין מנסה לאחד אלמנטים מ-242 ויזומת ריגאן. הוא יודע, כך נאמר, שאי אפשר לנגוע בהחלטה או להחליפה במשהו נוסח ההצעה הפרנקו-מצרית, אחרת הוא "משתק שח עם עצמו".
- הוא שואף למשהו בסגנון "תוספת משקל ל-242", שאמנם לא תשובה אך תענה במידה מסויימת על דרישות אש"פ, במה שהזא מכנה "שלום תמורת שטחים". באשר ליזומת ריגאן, חוסייין מנסה לשאוב ממנה את הרעיון של הליכה ירדנית - פלשתינאית משותפת למכור אותה לאש"פ.

NYT-1/12-Kifner-An anonymous caller asserted that the kidnapping of an American priest was part of a campaign to force all Americans to leave Lebanon. He said he represented Islamic Holy War. He stated that all kidnapped Americans would be set free if all Americans left.

NYT-1/13-Kifner-The Lebanese Army began deploying its forces down the coastal road in a much heralded step in the Gov'ts attempt to extend authority beyond a few neighborhoods in the capital. Anarchy continues in West Beirut with 2 more car bombs killing 2 and wounding 25. The key question is whether or not this act is merely cosmetic. The issue will gain even more importance if Israel withdraws from the area around Sidon. Lebanon has rejected Israel's demands for a broader deployment of UN troops, saying such a move would violate Lebanese sovereignty. But this position has been undermined by Lebanon's inability to send its own Army down its own major highway.

Iran-Iraq

NYT-1/13- AP-The Kuwait airport control tower picked up a distress call in the Persian Gulf. But airport officials later said it may have been a hoax. An Israeli radio monitor in Tel Aviv said he had picked up signals indicating that a plane was in trouble and had crashed in the Persian Gulf with 197 people aboard. The plane was said to be a luftansa jet, but luftansa stated it had no knowledge of an accident.

NYT-1/12-Reuters-Iraq said its warplanes attacked two "naval targets" near Kharg Island.

4 Million Facing Starvation in Sudan

NYT-Miller-1/13-Sudanese officials and relief workers say that this chronically impoverished country could have a similar starvation problem as do the Ethiopians by midsummer. Workers say the already desperate situation has been made worse by the Government's delay in recognizing the severity of the drought affecting its own citizens.

Schools and clinics run by the U.N. Relief and Works Agency for two million refugees in Jordan, Lebanon, Syria and the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip are threatened with closure, officials say.



אבידן והח"מ נפגשנו היום. לשיחה עם סימס שחזר זה עתה מאירופה. סימס היה פרשן CBS בשיחות ג'נבה ומשם המשיך בשליחות הסברה של ממשלת ארה"ב לאנגליה. לטענתו השתתף בהתייעצויות מוקדמות לפני השיחות ושוחח עם מקפרלן, קנט דאם, וריצ'רד ברט. להלן ניתוחו אח שיחות שולץ-גרומיקו:

1. השיחות היו ענייניות ורציניות. אין לצפות לחוצאות דרמטיות או מהירות. עצם קיומן מסמן חזרה לנורמליות. לשיחות אלו שתי מטרות:

א. לכונן דיאלוג בנושא המרכזי של בקרת נשק. השיחות היו בעלות צביון פוליטי ולא טכני-צבאי.

ב. לזכות בנקודות בעיני דעת הקהל העולמית

המסלחת האמריקנית טבורה כי השיגה תוצאה טובה. ארה"ב לא עתה ויתורים לסובייטים בנושא SDI, או לוחמה בלוינים (ASAT), לא ויתרה על המטח פריטת פרשינג 2 באירופה ושמרה על הפרדה מסוימת בין ההיבטים השונים (נשק הגנתי, נשק התקפי, ופרוז החלל החיצון). גם הסובייטים זכו להישג שעה שארה"ב הסכימה להכליל נושא היוזמה האסטרטגית (SDI) ברשימת הנושאים שתידון.

2. נושא זכויות האדם, לרבות הגירת יהודים עלה בשיחות בצורה אחראית. שולץ העלה הנושא אולם נמנע מלהיות confrontational. ביתר הדגשה עלה הנושא בשיחות של דרגים נמוכים יותר (שיחות ברט-קורבינקו). המסלחת האמריקנית החליטה מראש שלא לתת לנושא זה לסכל סיכוי כינון אוירה טובה בשיחות שולץ - גרומיקו ולפיכך הוחלט שלא לאפשר פגישה אביסל שצ'רנסקי עם שולץ. בכדי שלא ליצור רושם מוטעה שבר"מ מקריבה נושא זה נפגש ברט בהבלטה רבה עם אביסל.

3. סימס ציין כי בניגוד לעבר נמנעו הפעם הסובייטים להגיב בחומרה על העלאת הנושא והסתפקו בשתיקה. סימס מעריך כי הממשל נשאר מחוייב לקידום נושא זכויות האדם בבריחה, אולם לא יפעל כדי לנקר עיני הסובייטים. הקו שהממשל ינקוט בנידון ידגיש

4. סימס בדעה כי חשוב להחזיק הנושא בתודעת דעת הקהל, העתובות והקונגרס, אולם על הממשל להיות פרקטי יותר בנידון ולהכנס למו"מ שקס עם הטוביטים במגמה להביא לשחרור רפיוזניקים בולטים. לדעתו, ניתן לפתור מקרה טרנסמיקי אם הטוביטים ישתכנעו כי לא תהיה מגמה המערב לנצל שחרורו למטרת ניהול מסע יחסי ציבור נכוון נגדם.

5. סימס שוחח בג'נבה עם ארבטוב על נושאי ההגירה היהודית ושמע כי אל למערב לחשוב שניתן לחזור לשנות הדטנט כאשר מספרים גדולים של יהודים יצאו את בריה"מ. ארבטוב ציין כי הגל הגדול של יציאות גרם לסובייטים הלם גדול מאחר ולא האמינו שכה הרבה אנשים, לרבות בעלי משרות טובות וחשובות, יבקשו להגר. סימס סבור שאם תיווצר טעם רצון טוב ניתן לחשוב על הקלה מטויימת ואפילו גדול במספר המורשים לצאת בצורה שתספק את ישראל אך לא תרגיז את הערבים. בתשובה לשאלתנו בנידון העריך סימס כי יציאת עד 5000 איש בשנה יכולה להיות אפשרות ריאלית בהקשר לשיפור משמעותי ביחסי שתי מעצמות העל. במקרה כזה יעדיפו הטוביטים שהיוצאים יבואו לישראל מאשר למערב.

6. באשר לאפשרות שיפור הנאי החיים של יהודי בריה"מ, לרבות זכותם לנהל חיים תרבותיים משמעותיים סימס בדעה שלא צפוי שיפור משמעותי. הטוביטים חותרים לטשטש לחלוטין הזיקה היהודית, לימוד השפה העברית מהווה איום משום שמחזק הזיקה לישראל, דבר שלא רצוי להם.

Resumption of Airlift Urged by Rep. Gray

From News Services

Rep. William H. Gray III (D-Pa.) called on the presidents of Ethiopia and Sudan yesterday to allow the resumption of Israel's airlift of Ethiopia's Jews from the famine-ravaged country.

Gray, the new chairman of the House Budget Committee, sent letters to the heads of both nations, which have protested and forced the halt of the secret airlift from Ethiopia.

"Among the millions of persons threatened by the famine are the small and isolated communities of Ethiopian Jews," said Gray, who recently returned from a visit to Ethiopia.

"Current conditions in Ethiopia are particularly difficult for these people, and their unique culture and heritage has forced them to seek lives in another land," he said.

There are an estimated 7,000 to 12,000 Jews still in Ethiopia.

Meanwhile, civil rights leader Jesse L. Jackson, in a letter to Jerusalem Mayor Teddy Kollek, said he is "considering the feasibility" of helping Ethiopian Jews emigrate to Israel. Kollek has asked for Jackson's help.

Israel Plans New Settlements

The few Yeminites who oppose khat's use says the real threat is economic. It consumes a hefty part of a family's budget and has replaced coffee crops in much of the country. Woman in Yemen are mostly illiterate so woman say there is nothing else to do. Social life is strictly segregated in the cities. Many woman get married at 13 or 14.

Anti-Nazi Film Prompts Threats by Neo-Nazi Groups

NYT-Markham-The film "The Inheritors" was made because Walter Barnett questions the popular belief that neo-Nazism scarcely exists or is essentially harmless. The film warns youths away from neo-Fascist movements. In West Germany, intimidation by West German neo-Nazi groups against theaters has prevented the film from reaching a wide audience. (see critique -NYT-Canby & DN-Carroll)

The famine has become a weapon in the Russian-backed governments war against proliferating rebellions. The Gov't hopes that starvation will do what its helicopted gunships can't. Yet, 90% of aid continues to flow through gov't control. The West needs to hear the real story. (see The New Republic-Allan Hoben 1/21)

The Army reports that it's soldiers opened fire only after they threw stones, refused to disperse and knocked one soldier unconscious with a stone.

Much is concluded in the agreement, what remains is the most controversial issues. For the US, one sticking point is the staging of tariff reductions to cushion the impact for textiles, footwear and other products sensitive to imports. For Israel, the major problem is the phasing out in a short time export and production subsidies that give products an edge in export markets. ISRAELI MAYOR ASKS JACKSON'S HELP/AID IN SECURING ETHIOPIAN JEWS' PASSAGE SOUGHT

Wash. Post, Dickenson: Mayor Teddy Kollek of Jerusalem has asked Jesse L. Jackson to try to persuade the governments of Ethiopia and Sudan to allow Ethiopian Jews in those countries to resume immigrating to Israel.

Kollek made the request in a telegram Tuesday and a telephone call to Jackson here yesterday. Jackson made preliminary calls to the Ethiopian and Sudanese embassies yesterday to schedule meetings with officials to determine if such an effort is feasible, a Jackson spokesman said.

"Reverend Jackson is trying to determine what Mayor Kollek wants him to do and to determine the feasibility of getting involved, to learn whether he can be helpful," spokesman Lamond Godwin said.

ISRAELI PLANES STRIKE IN EASTERN LEBANON

Wash. Post, Wires: Israeli warplanes attacked a Palestinian base in eastern Lebanon's Bekaa Valley yesterday, two days after Israel suspended troop withdrawal talks with Lebanon.

No casualties were reported in the airstrike and a Lebanese police spokesman said rockets fired by attacking Israeli warplanes missed their target, United Press International reported.

ISRAELI AID TO ETHIOPIA

Wash. Post, Wires: The Ethiopian government has approved a \$250,000 Israeli shipment to famine victims in the east African nation just days after the halt of a massive airlift of Ethiopian Jews to Israel, the Israeli Red Cross said.

We are writing to ask for your signature on a letter to Secretary of State George Schultz concerning the Israeli airlift of Ethiopian Jews or Falashas.


Because Sudan will no longer assist in the airlift, the Falashas who remain in Ethiopia or Sudanese refugee camps are in danger of perishing if help doesn't reach them soon. Unless an Arab nation will help to start the airlift again, families will remain separated, and the Falashas who are left behind will be doomed to malnutrition and harassment from the Ethiopian regime.

The nation who could play a crucial role in resuming the airlift is Egypt, and our letter to Secretary Schultz asks him to convey our hope Egypt will help in the evacuation. The letter is timely because President Mubarak will be coming to Washington in a few weeks, and the Department of State is preparing for the trip.

The text of the letter to Secretary Schultz follows:

Dear Mr. Secretary:

Every American has been touched by the tragic events in Ethiopia and heartened by the efforts of Israel to evacuate large numbers of Ethiopian Jews, or Falashas, to Israel. The recent revelation of Israel's airlift and Sudan's decision to end its assistance jeopardizes the lives of those people who remain in Ethiopia and Sudanese refugee camps.

Because Sudan will no longer assist Israel in the airlift, we believe the country ideally suited to provide the assistance, either covert or overt, is Egypt. Egypt's proximity to the Sudanese refugee camps and Israel provides it with a pivotal location to continue the airlift.

We are writing to ask that you communicate to President Mubarak our hope that Egypt will see fit to assist in the rescue of the remaining Falashas from Ethiopia and the Sudanese refugee camps. As you prepare for President Mubarak's trip to the United States, we are asking that you convey this idea to the appropriate Egyptian officials, so that no time is wasted.

SECOND DISTRICT

The 2d congressional district of Missouri is the heart of St. Louis County, a jurisdiction that is adjacent to, but includes no part of, the city of St. Louis. The county originally was set up so that its rural concerns would not be a drain on the treasury of booming St. Louis; now the city of St. Louis has about half the population and much less than half the wealth of the county. The 2d district runs the political gamut of suburbs. On its north side, north of Interstate 70, are blue collar communities such as Bellefontaine Neighbors, Jennings, Ferguson, Berkeley, and Hazelwood. Most of the people who live here grew up on the north side of St. Louis, which is now almost entirely black; many work in the giant McDonnell-Douglas aircraft plants located on the north side of the county. In the south end of the district are comfortable white collar, traditionally Republican suburbs such as Kirkwood and Webster Groves, now with some black population also, but nonetheless as Republican as ever. 

THIRD DISTRICT

Missouri's 3d congressional district consists of the south side of the city of St. Louis and an adjacent portion of suburban St. Louis County. The line drawn through the middle of St. Louis to separate the 3d from the 1st district also neatly separates the black part of the city from the white. In the 1970s, blacks for the most part had been moving out from the north side of St. Louis to the suburbs nearby, leaving the south side of the city to whites. Here on the south side there are still signs of the German immigrants who made St. Louis one of the nation's bustling and progressive cities in the late 19th century; today, symbolically, an Altonheim (old people's home) still sits on the banks of the Mississippi River. The most famous of the St. Louis Germans was Carl Schurz, a friend of Lincoln, a Union Army officer in the Civil War, secretary of the Interior, and U.S. senator from Missouri.

THIRD DISTRICT

Missouri's 3d congressional district consists of the south side of the city of St. Louis and an adjacent portion of suburban St. Louis County. The line drawn through the middle of St. Louis to separate the 3d from the 1st district also neatly separates the black part of the city from the white. In the 1970s, blacks for the most part had been moving out from the north side of St. Louis to the suburbs nearby, leaving the south side of the city to whites. Here on the south side there are still signs of the German immigrants who made St. Louis one of the nation's bustling and progressive cities in the late 19th century; today, symbolically, an Altemheim (old people's home) still sits on the banks of the Mississippi River. The most famous of the St. Louis Germans was Carl Schurz, a friend of Lincoln, a Union Army officer in the Civil War, secretary of the Interior, and U.S. senator from Missouri.

faithfully sustained a Democratic tradition is not the Little Dixie region, north of the Missouri River in Illinois. The land here was settled early in the 19th century in Kentucky and Tennessee. During the Civil War some went to the Confederate side, and at least one county declared itself seceded. Since then, not much urbanization has come to the area. Mark Twain would probably recognize his native land, were it not for the tourist traps that use Twain's name. It changed much. This part of the state continues to be a Democratic stronghold. It gave Jimmy Carter a majority in 1976 (although he never carried a county here). The 9th district is the northern reaches of the St. Louis metropolitan area, including St. Charles County and a northern chunk of St. Louis. It is predominantly blue collar and Democratic. It has had distinctive congressmen. For 40 years it was represented by a Republican, a Democrat, and a Republican. During his last year he and his Senate counterpart fought a monumental battle over which side of the Capitol building to put; this battle of octogenarians held up the whole House. His successor was William Hungate, a peppery and one of the wittier members of the House Judiciary Committee. In 1980 he got away from the hassles of Congress to the pleasure of years that the 9th district had a race without an incumbent. Leading the eleven-year incumbent, 5% of the vote was Hannibal state legislator Harold L. Volkmer. It has been the end of it: a long congressional career ended automatically. But Volkmer has had serious competition in 1980. Both times his opponents were based in the St. Louis area. The Democrat close to even there. But his big margins made the difference.

Volkmer could face more tough opposition in 1982, depending on the outcome of redistricting. What he would probably like is for the legislature to leave the boundaries of the 9th district alone—a possible outcome, since the district has gained population faster than the state average. But there will be a temptation to appropriate some of his Democratic precincts in St. Louis County to raise the population of the St. Louis-based districts that must expand. In that case, the best Volkmer could hope for would be the addition of Columbia to the district. A worse alternative, from his point of view, would be the addition of the St. Louis County suburbs now in the 8th district or the addition of the old German counties along the Missouri River—both areas heavily Republican.

SECOND DISTRICT

The 2d congressional district of Missouri is the heart of St. Louis County, a jurisdiction that is adjacent to, but includes no part of, the city of St. Louis. The county originally was set up so that its rural concerns would not be a drain on the treasury of booming St. Louis; now the city of St. Louis has about half the population and much less than half the wealth of the county. The 2d district runs the political gamut of suburbs. On its north side, north of Interstate 70, are blue collar communities such as Bellefontaine Neighbors, Jennings, Ferguson, Berkeley, and Hazelwood. Most of the people who live here grew up on the north side of St. Louis, which is now almost entirely black; many work in the giant McDonnell-Douglas aircraft plants located on the north side of the county. In the south end of the district are comfortable white collar, traditionally Republican suburbs such as Kirkwood and Webster Groves, now with some black population also, but nonetheless as Republican as ever. In the middle of the county, in University City and the towns to the west, Olivette and Creve Coeur, live most members of the Jewish community of metropolitan St. Louis. Just



faithfully sustained a Democratic tradition in the Little Dixie region, north of the Missouri River in Illinois. The land here was settled early in the 1700s by Kentucky and Tennessee. During the Civil War some counties went on the Confederate side, and at least one county declared itself for the Union. Since then, not much urbanization has occurred. Mark Twain would probably recognize his native Missouri, were it not for the tourist traps that use Twain's name. This part of the state continues to be rural. It gave Jimmy Carter a majority in 1976 (Carter even carried a county here). The 9th district unto itself. Now, because of the one-person, one-vote rule, a bare majority of the residents of Missouri's 9th district is the northern reaches of the St. Louis metropolitan area. It is the northern reaches of the St. Louis metropolitan area, a Republican St. Charles County and a northern chunk of St. Louis County, a blue collar and Democratic. It has had distinctive congressmen. For 40 years it was represented by a Republican parliamentarian of the House and chairman of the Rules Committee. During his last year he and his Senate counterpart fought a monumental battle over which side of the Capitol building this battle of octogenarians held up the whole House. His successor was William Hungate, a peppery attorney who got away from the hassles of Congress to the pleasures of the law. In 1978 that the 9th district had a race without an incumbent. The incumbent had a comfortable competition for the seat. Leading the eleven candidates was Hannibal state legislator Harold Volkmer. It may have been the end of it: a long congressional career ended naturally. But Volkmer has had serious competition in 1980. Both times his opponents were based in the St. Louis area. The Democrat close to even there. But his big margin was in the difference.

Volkmer could face more tough opposition in 1982, depending on the outcome of redistricting. What he would probably like is for the legislature to leave the boundaries of the 9th district alone—a possible outcome, since the district has gained population faster than the state average. But there will be a temptation to appropriate some of his Democratic precincts in St. Louis County to raise the population of the St. Louis-based districts that must expand. In that case, the best Volkmer could hope for would be the addition of Columbia to the district. A worse alternative, from his point of view, would be the addition of the St. Louis County suburbs now in the 8th district or the addition of the old German counties along the Missouri River—both areas heavily Republican.

THIRD DISTRICT

Missouri's 3d congressional district consists of the south side of the city of St. Louis and an adjacent portion of suburban St. Louis County. The line drawn through the middle of St. Louis to separate the 3d from the 1st district also neatly separates the black part of the city from the white. In the 1970s, blacks for the most part had been moving out from the north side of St. Louis to the suburbs nearby, leaving the south side of the city to whites. Here on the south side there are still signs of the German immigrants who made St. Louis one of the nation's bustling and progressive cities in the late 19th century; today, symbolically, an Altemheim (old people's home) still sits on the banks of the Mississippi River. The most famous of the St. Louis Germans was Carl Schurz, a friend of Lincoln, a Union Army officer in the Civil War, secretary of the Interior, and U.S. senator from Missouri.

way, is Ladue, the home of most members of the premier suburb in the metropolitan area. 

באותו היום נפגשו עם עולים מברה"מ במרכז קליטה ברעננה. קבלו הסברים מיעקב ינאי וכן שמעו עדויות חיות מפי 2 עולים חדשים שקרוביהם בברה"מ זמן רב ואינם מורשים לצאת לישראל. הפגישה היתה מרגשת מאוד, וובר הבטיח לעשות כל שביכולתם למען יציאת היהודים מברה"מ. קבלו סקירה על הפעילות למיקוד תשומת הלב על הנושא ברחבי העולם, פרופ' פרימן עולה חדש ספר להם תלאתיו עד שעלה לישראל, ובקש שענין היהודים יועלה בכל מ"מ מסחרי ואחר עם ברה"מ. בוב בייקר ציין ששינה קב' גדולה של אנשי קונגרס המעלים והלו והלוחצים על הממשל להעלות הנושא בכל מפגש עם ברה"מ.

ב-10 דגא נפגשה המשלחת עם פרג', ציין באוזניהם את בעית ההתנחלויות, את חוסר הקשר בין המתנחלים לשכניהם הערבים, את הפקעת האדמות ללא פיצוי. ציין שקבלו 8 מיליון דולר סיוע מארה"ב אך אושרו להם לשימוש רק 3 מליון. הביע תמיכתו בתוכנית רייגן, הביע בטחוננו שיהודה ושומרון יסופחו לישראל והערבים יהיו בבחינת אזרחים מדרגה ב'. דבר על אש"פ ננציגי העלעכי והלגיטימי של העם הפלסטיני, אך הדגיש שהערבים והיהודים נועדו לגור יחדיו בארץ המשותפת להם ולכן, יש צורך בפתרון הסכסוך אחרת ימשך מעגל הסכסוך. שיבח את סאדאת, קרטו והסכמי ק.ד., מקווה שיהיה הסכם שיאפשר כניסת ירדן למ"מ על בסיס הצעות ישראל וש"פ בין ירדן למצרים.

נשאל על המחווה שעשה רוח"מ בבקרו בערב חג המולד בבית לחם - אמר שמעריך המחווה אך לצערנו לא נעשה כלום בהמשך לה, ולא נאמרו לו דברים ממשים בפגישה. לא הכחיש שפל שיפור בתנאי החיים של הערבים באזור. הזכיר את ספרו של מירון בנבנישתי כעובדה לכך שישראל לא תחזיר השטח לעולם וקביעת עובדות על ידה. התרשמו מכך ובקשו עותק מהספר אך לא קבלו. יתכן שבוושינגטון ינסו להשיגו, בטה"כ התרשמו ממנו כאיש מתון, אך בעל עמדה חד צדדית בפגישה נכח גם נציג הקונסוליה האמריקאית בירושלים לורנס מאייר, שהשתתף גם בביקור בעופרה וניסה ל"אזן התמונה. במהלך הנסיעה לעופרה נשאל מאייר על ידי המורשה וובר על מערכת היחסים הרעועה בין השג' בת"א לבין הקונסוליה בירושלים. מאייר הכ-יש אך בקש לדעת מהיכן יודע וובר על כך (ובכך אשר למעשה את שידע וובר...), האשנו.

נפגשו גם עם עדי אמוראי ושוחחו בנושאי כלכלה. עם דן מרידון לא"צ בכנסת ושוחחו בנושאי בטחון והשלום, ולא"ב עם פרופ' ברונו שסקר בפניהם המערכת הכלכלית של ישראל ואת דעותיו ביחס לפתרון המשבר בכלכלה. ממנו בקשו שמות של פרופסורים אמריקאים בארה"ב המכירים את כלכלת ישראל. המלצתי שיפגשו עם דן הלפריין. דרוח על פגישתם עם וויצמן בנפרד.

SEVENTH DISTRICT

The 7th congressional district of Minnesota occupies the northwest quadrant of the state. This is the most sparsely populated part of Minnesota, with 32% of the state's land area but only 12% of its people. Along the Red River of the North, just next to North Dakota, are vast wheat fields; to the east are acres of lakes, forest, and occasional resort communities. This is the country of the legendary Paul Bunyan and his blue ox Babe, whose statues stand together in Bemidji, a small town on the shores of one of Minnesota's 10,000 lakes. Not far away is Lake Itasca, the headwater of the Mississippi River.

The district was first settled by hardy Swedish and Norwegian lumberjacks and farmers. The Republican stronghold is heavily Norwegian Otter Tail County, near the southern end of the district; the strongest DFL territory is at the edges of the district, in the counties nearest Minneapolis and St. Paul. The northern counties, which were Farmer-Labor Party strongholds in the 1930s, used to be heavily DFL but have been trending Republican in the late 1970s.

The 7th has had a rather colorful political history. It made national headlines in 1958 when Coya Knutson was the DFL congresswoman here; her husband Andy issued a plaintive statement urging her to come home and, among other things, make his breakfast again. Apparently many voters considered the request reasonable; Knutson was the only Democratic incumbent to lose in the heavily Democratic year of 1958. The man who beat her, an ultraconservative Republican, never demonstrated much popularity, and was finally beaten by DFL candidate Bob Bergland in 1970. Bergland became extremely popular, and made enough of a mark on the Agriculture Committee to be appointed secretary of Agriculture by President Carter.



הרקע הכללי

בריה"מ הבינה שהטקטיקה שלה בנושא פרוק הנשק עד לאחרונה היתה מוטעית - שלש הנחות בסיסיות שלהם הוכחו כמוטעות. הצבת הטילים ארוכי הטווח וה-SS-20. הנחתם שיוכלו בדרך המניפולציה של תנועות השלום באירופה לקומם את אירופה נגד ארה"ב ומחשבתם שיציאתם מהשיחות על פרוק הנשק תגרום לדרמטיזציה של המצב. כאשר הבינו שהעניין לא עובד הרגשנו אצלם התלבטויות. התלבטויות אלה הביאו אותם להציע את וינה והדיונים על הנשק בחלל. כוונתם - להגביל השיחות לנושא זה - לא היתה מקובלת כמובן. הסובייטים חשבו שרייגן ירצה כחלק ממערכת הבחירות שלו להפגין התקדמות ותנועה וגם כ"ן שגו.

חשובה זאת של ארה"ב שכנעה אותם סופית בכשלון הטקטיקה שלהם. לאחר הבחרו מחדש של רייגן ובגלל התנאי המוקדם שהציבו קודם לכן - הסרת הטילים מאירופה - באו הסובייטים עם טקטיקה חדשה של New Negotiations וזה מה שראינו עתה בג'ינבה - המחלה חדשה. במשולב ובמקביל החליטו הסובייטים החלטה טקטית לבחון כמה רחוק יוכלו ללכת ביחסים עם ארה"ב ולא רק בעניין פרוק הנשק. הנה בימים אלה מתקיימות שיחות כלכליות במוסקבה. שמענו מהסובייטים תגובות על הצעות שלנו בנושאים אזוריים כמו למשל אפריקה והמזה"ת בזמנו הצענו להם שהמזכיר ומרפי יפגשו עם עמיתיהם ועם דוברינין לדבר על המזה"ת, עד עתה לא הגיבו. ביום ו' האחרון (לפני ג'ינבה) באו לראותני והגיבו בחיוב אם כי באו עם תכנית משלהם - שמרפי ילך למוסקבה להפגש עם ה-Opposite Number שלו - פוליאקוב. ארה"ב לא תלך על האופציה הזאת.

בעניין אחר - מוכנים עתה הסובייטים לשבת עמנו לשוחח על אצמעי בטחון לתעופה באזור הפסיפי - ארה"ב דרשה זאת בעקבות אסון המטוס הקוריאני ורק עתה השיבו שהם מוכנים לשבת אתנו.

פלמר ציין גם את האוירה הטובה בשיחות ה-NPT החצי שנחיות.

יין פה ספק שהסובייטים החליטו לזוז לקראתנו בחזית רחבה ומקוים שתחול אצלם תזוזה גם בעניין הקונסוליה בקייב (האמריקאים קושרים עניין הקונסוליה בחדוש טיסות אירופלוט).

פאלמר שאל לדעת הממנכ"ל לגבי פתיחת הקונסוליה בקייב ושקיים הסכימו לחלוטין לגבי תפקידה ומשמעותה של קונסוליה כזאת.

התזוזה הזאת של הסובייטים צבעה מהבנתם שטקטיקת הברוד שלהם לא תעבוד יותר לאחר שראו את הבחרו מחדש של רייגן. גם כיום מעוניינים הסובייטים יותר במניפולציות ולא בתוצאות ממשיות. בנקודת זמן מסוימת בשיחות היה גרומיקו מוכן לעזוב השיחות בלי השג כלשהו.

הסובייטים עדיין מקוים שהקונגרס, החוגים הליברלים והמצב הכלכלי יכריחו את ארה"ב לעשות משהו בכוון שלהם ולכן לא שינו את האסטרטגיה הכוללת שלהם.

פאלמר העיר שהרוסים overestimate יכולתם להמשיך במניפולציה של דעת הקהל. כקוריוז הביא ספור על מסיבת עיתונאים עם הסובייטים שכאשר דוברם השיב בתגובה על שאלה שכל עניין ה-SS-20 אינו קיים כלל החלו העתונאים לעזוב האולם.

הסובייטים לא שנו דבר מהרגליהם. ממשיכים ב-deployment. מצב זכויות האדם לא נשתנה והם ממשיכים לבחוש בסכסוכים אזוריים. אין מקום בעולם שאפשר להצביע עליו כעל מאפיין שינוי בהתנהגותם.

עיקר השינוי עתה הוא שנוי של סגנון ושל טון אך בהחלט לא של תוכן. פלמר סיפר שבשיחה עם אחד מעמיתיו הסובייטים ניתן היה לעמוד על הבעיה הכלכלית הכספית המטרידה אותם מאד ועל סכומי הכסף האדירים שיצטרכו להוציא אם לא יגיעו להסכם כלשהו.

מהלך השיחות

בבוקר של יום הדיונים הראשון פתח מזכיר המדינה שולץ בהצגה ארוכה של ראייתו (הזהה לראות הנשיא) את העולם האסטרטגי בעשור השנים הקרוב: מטרתה של ארה"ב היא לראות הפחתה משמעותית (Radical reduction) של כל סוגי הנשק הגרעיני ביבשה בים ובחלל. העשור הקרוב צריך לשמש תקופת מעבר שתוביל, בסופו של ענין לחסול כל כלי הנשק הגרעיניים. המטרה הסופית של ארה"ב היא לחיות בעולם חופשי מנשק גרעיני. הגישה האמריקאית, המיועדת להשגת המטרה גורסת שככל שנעים לעבר מערכות הגנתיות ניתן לצמצם את המערכות ההתקפיות. (תפישה זו אינה מקובלת על הסובייטים הגורסים את הפיכה כנראה מחששם שהתקדמותה הטכנולוגית של ארה"ב מהירה משלהם).

שולץ דבר לאחר מכן על חוסר היציבות בעולם היום. מערכת הטילים הבליסטיים הביניבשתיים של ארה"ב הופכת אותה ל-Vulnerable למכת פתע (First Strike) מצד הסובייטים ואם יהיה משבר פוליטי רציני הרי שהתמריצים היום To go nuclear חזקים מאוד ואת זה בדיוק צריך למנוע.

מדיניותה של ארה"ב, אמר המזכיר היא שלום של הפחתה משמעותית בסוגי הנשק הגרעיני ההתקפי יחד עם פתוח יכולת ההגנה.

המזכיר אמר שהסובייטים אינם במצב שיכולים לטעון כלפי ארה"ב שתכניות ההגנה שלה הם גורם מערער יציבות באשר אצלם הם כבר עברו את שלב המחקר וגם מציבים מערכות כאלה. מערכות ההגנה האווירית של ברה"מ מדאיגות את ארה"ב באשר הם מקבים לסובייטים את היכולת לנצלם לצורך שמירה על השגים טריטוראליים.

המזכיר הציג את עמדת ארה"ב שיש צורך לקיים דיונים בשלשה פורומים שידונו בנשק האסטרטגי בטילים לטווח בינוני ובנושא כלי נשק הגנתיים ונושא החלל (DEFENSIVE ARMS&SPACE ISSUES) (עיקר הויכוח עם הסובייטים התנהל סביב לפורום האחרון, הם ניסו לעמוד על הורדת האלמנט של כלי נשק הגנתיים ולהסתפק בדיון בנושאי חלל).

לאחר הצגתו של שולץ, הציג גרומיקו את עמדתם. הצגתו היתה רצינית, שקולה ונעדרה סממנים של היסטריה ודיפיקות על השולחן. הצגתו תאמה את מה שציפתה ארה"ב (הנוסח היה דומה לזה שממכתבו של צ'רנוביקו לקבוצת אנשי כמורה בארה"ב)

המרכיבים בהצגתו היו:

- א. הצורך במניעת מליטריזציה של החלל.
- ב. הצורך לאסור לחלוטין כל כלי נשק בתקפיים מהחלל.
- ג. הצגת היכולת האופנסטיבית של ארה"ב כמקנה לה האפשרות להשיג את המכה הראשונה.
- ד. גרומיקו אמר כי ארצו מוכנה להפחתה משמעותית בפיתוח הנשק הגרעיני והזכיר את טילי השיוט, הטילים הבליסטיים: הבין-יבשתיים המפציצים האסטרטגיים ומערכות נשק חדשות.
- ה. פלמר העיר כי ההצעה המעשית שלהם היתה של הקפאה ולא של הפחתה בנוסח ההצעות הקודמות שלהם.
- ו. לפי העמדה המסורתית של ברה"מ אמר גרומיקו כי הדיון על הטילים לטווח בינוני צריך לכלול גם את ארסנל הנשק הבריטי והצרפתי.
- ז. אם ארה"ב תעצור את הצבת טיליה במערב אירופה תהיה מוכנה ברה"מ להפסקת את צעדי הנגד שלה (Counter Measures).

הרגשתו של פלמר שבמשתמע ניתן היה להבין שברה"מ תהיה מוכנה להשלים עם קיום מספר טילים באירופה ואם אכן כן הדבר מהווה הדברי שנוי של עמדתם.

בהמשך הצגתו קשר גרומיקו את הטפול בכל המרכיבים כחבילה אחת והתנה את הסכמתם לדיון בכך שתהיינה הגבלות על השמוש בנשק חלל. גרומיקו אמר כי כל הנושאים קשורים זה בזה.

המזכיר שולץ השיב שארה"ב מבינה היטב את הקשר ובאמת רוצה דיאלוג לגבי הקשר הזה בין מערכות הגנתיות והחקפיות אך יש לארה"ב בעיה להבין מדוע ההתקדמות בדיון בנושא אחד מותנית בנושא האחר.

כל יתר שלוש הפגישות לאחר מכן הוקדשו למעשה לנסוח ההודעה המשותפת. המוצר הסופי מסתיר זוכו הרבה מאוד הבדלים בגישה ובתפיסה.

פלמר אמר כי חוויתו האישית הגדולה ביותר היתה העבודה בתוך הצוות האמריקאי פנימה כאשר בפעם הראשונה מזה שנים הצליח צוות זה על אף חלוקי דעות והתפישות המנוגדות להציג בסופו של עניין עמדה אחידה ומתואמת וכי כולם יצאו בסופו של דבר מרוצים מן התרגיל.

האנליזה הכללית בשיחות היתה טובה מאוד, למרות ששולץ לא אוהב את גרומיקו ודוברינין שולץ בניגוד לקודמיו, אינו חש בנוח בחברתם.

נושאים אחרים לא עלו בגלל התנגדותם של הסובייטים. בנקודת זמן מסוימת הציגו האמריקאים קיום מפגש בארוחת צהרים שתוקדש לעניינים אחרים אך הסובייטים סרבו בעקביות. עד כאן.

פלמר סיפר כי לפני השיחות בג'נבה היו לו שתי פגישות עם שבצ'קנו (איש האו"ם שערק למערב) וזה אמר לו כי אם כי נכון שברמות הגבוהות בקרלמלין יש הרבה אנטישמיות הרי שגרומיקו שונה מהם ואם היה מצליח TO HAVE HIS WAY הרי שיכול להיות שהיו מחדשים את הקשרים עם ישראל. גרומיקו גם טורח בכל הזדמנות להזכיר את תרומתו החשובה להקמתה של מדינת ישראל.

סודי ביותר

פלמר סיפר כי עם תום השיחות בג'ינבה יצאו המשתתפים לתדרך את בנות הברית של ארה"ב ברחבי העולם - מקפרייין יצא ללונדון ופריס, פול ניצה - לבירות אירופאיות אחרות, מטלוק - לקנדה, גנרל צייך - לאוסטרליה וניו-זילנד ודיק ברט - לטוקיו דיק פרל חזר לווינגטון בגלל בעיות משפחתיות.

שיחת שה"ח-פלמר.

סגן עוזר מזכיר המדינה מרק פאלמר דווח הערב (9.1) לשה"ח על שיחות ג'נבה. נלווה אליו בנג'מין טואה מהשגרירות.

פלמר פתח בתיאור מחויבותו של שולץ לנושא יהדות ברה"מ ואמר כי המזכיר Feels strongly ומעלה את הנושא בכל הזדמנות עם גרומיקו.

בשיחות ג'נבה אמר שולץ ביום הראשון כי גם אם אין השיחות מוקדשות לנושא זכויות האדם הוא מעלה אותו, גרומיקו אמר שגעתו של המזכיר מוכרת לו וסרב להתייחס לנושא.

ביום השני בשיחה פרטית בין השניים העלה שולץ הנושא באריכות והביע את אכזבת ארה"ב מההתדרדרות המצב ומחוסר התגובה הסובייטי להצעה להקים ערוץ הידברות בין שגריר ארה"ב הרטמן וסגנו של גרומיקו (קרניינקו). הסובייטי לא הגיב.

שולץ העלה את המקרים של שצרנסקי, גיגון ואורלוב והרחיב בשאלת ההתנכלות להוראת השפה העברית ולמוריה באמרו שזאת התקפה על תרבות דבר שאינו מקובל על ארה"ב ועומד בסתירה להתחייבות בינלאומית. שולץ הביע זעמו על המשפטים הנערכים והביע דאגה לגורלו של קומינסקי העומד בפני משפטו.

שולץ, אליבא דפלמר, קשר נמרצות בין נושא זכויות האדם וההתקדמות ביחסים הביילטרליים ואמר כי אין לנתק בין השניים.

מזכיר המדינה הביע שמחתו על תגובתם החיובית של הסובייטים להצעה האמריקאית לקיום שיחות על נושא המזי"ת. עד לאחרונה לא רצו הסובייטים להתייחס ועתה אמרו שמוכנים לכך בדרג של מרפי ופליאקוב בשיחות במוסקבה. התגובה, שלא נמסרה עדיין, של ארה"ב תהיה שלא יסכימו לבוא למוסקבה. הם מוכנים לשיחות בדרג של מרפי אך עומדים על כך שיתקמו בווישינגטון. פלמר אמר כי הם מודעים לדאגתה של ישראל מפני מהלכים כאלה והבטיח לשמור אותנו בתמונה דרך שגרירותנו בווישינגטון. להערכתו הוא תהינה שיחות אלה Sterile exercise. ארה"ב תאמר לסובייטים שהם צריכים להיות מתונים יותר ושעליהם לעודד מדינות ערביות לאמת ולתת אתנו ישירות. מכל מקום הוא אינו צופה שום Coming together של שתי המעצמות בנושא.

לאחר שלא הצליחו באירופה הבינו בקיץ שיש להם צורך בטקטיקה חדשה והציעו לארה"ב את שיחות וינה לדיון בנשק החלל. הערכתם הייתה שהנשיא רייגן ירצה להפגין לפני הבחירות תנועה חיובית ביחסי שתי המעצמות אך ארה"ב סירבה לצמצם הדיון רק לנושאי חלל וביקשה לשוחח על כל הנושאים. ברה"מ סירבה.

בבואם של הסובייטים לג'נבה הם וויתרו על שני הנאים חשובים שלהם האחד - הסגת הטילים האמריקאים מאירופה לפני התחלת השיחות והאחר - דרישה לפירוז החלל מנשק.

הרגשתו של המזכיר היא שארה"ב יצאה מחוזקת מן השיחות היום ובמו"מ עליו הוסכם בג'נבה יועלו לדיון כל הנושאים בשלוש מסגרות: כלי נשק אסטרטגיים, הטילים לטווח בינוני ונושאי החלל. הישג חשוב אחר הוא הסכמתם של הסובייטים לנסוח מטרת השיחות כ-

המזכיר מודע היטב לעובדה שבשיחות בג'נבה לא קרה שום דבר סובסטנטיבי. ההבדלים בין המעצמות בכל התחומים קיימים עדיין והפערים לא הוצרו. ארה"ב מפוכחת ומבינה שישוד היחסים בין המעצמות לא ישתנה בגלל מה שקרה בג'נבה. יש אמנם נטיה בתקשורת לקפוץ לאופטימיות ולדבורים על דטנט אך יש חובה להוריד הצפיות ולהפנות תשומת הלב לכך שאם חל שינוי אצל הסובייטים זהו ענין של סגנון וטון דאך לא של תוכן ואסור להתפש לאופוריה.

שהי"ח שאל לתגובת גרומיקו בנושא יהדות ברה"מ ופלמר אמר שגרומיקו ישב כשהבעת פניו חתומה ואמר שאין לענין זה כל קשר ליחסים בין שתי המעצמות. מעבר לכך סרב להוסיף ולו מילה אחת. שהי"ח שאל אם המזכיר העלה שאלת חופש ההגירה פלמר השיב בחיוב וסיפר כי הוא ודיק ברט נפגשו עם אביטל שצרנסקי ודאגו שהענין יקבל פרסום (לאחר סיום פגישותיו במשרד הלך פלמר לבקר את אביטל).

פלמר סיפר לשר כי להערכתם נפלה החלטה טקטית אצל הסובייטים המוצאת בשויה לא רק בג'נבה כי אם בסדרה ארוכה של שנוי החלטות המראות רצון ונכונות להתקרב לרה"ב. פלמר הזכיר נכונותם לדון על אמצעי בטיחות אוירית (לבקשת ארה"ב בעקבות הפלת המטוס הקוריאני) שיחות אי ההפצה שהתקיימו ברוח טובה, השיחות על סחר המתנהלות במוסקבה כעת (ושגם במסגרתם הם מתכוונים להעלות שאלת זכויות האדם. הנציג האמריקאי סגן מזכיר המסחר מתכוון לראות טרובניקים בלנינגרד או מוסקבה ולבקר בתיאטרון האידישאי).

לשאלת השר לגבי השלב הבא של ג'נבה אמר פלמר כי ארה"ב הציעה לקיים השיחות ב-5 מרץ בג'נבה אך גרומיקו לא הסכים לכך. סוכם שתוך חודש יקבע, בצנורות הדיפלומטיים המקום והעיתוי לפתיחת השיחות.

השר ביקש פלמר למסור תודתו למזכיר על ששלח אותו לדווח לנו ועל העלתו את נושא יהדות ברה"מ. אנו יודעים כי הוא עושה זאת בכל הזדמנות אפשרית אך הפעם היה זה חשוב במיוחד.



The area currently covered by the 23d district has a long tradition of electing Republican congressmen, a tradition that goes back to the Civil War. But in the 1970s, it behaved like most other congressional districts in the nation—it was willing to go for one party or the other, depending on the circumstances. Republican Congressman Albert Johnson, despite diminishing margins, declined to retire and was beaten in 1976 by Democratic state Senator Joseph Ammerman. Ammerman's victory looked solid, and he seemed to have the political acumen to hold the district. But in August 1978 Ammerman sustained a broken hip in an automobile accident and was hospitalized for six weeks. He had a strong Republican opponent, William Clinger, who had held a middle-level appointment in the Ford Administration and then returned home to Warren, in the northern part of the district. Clinger attacked Ammerman for his support of a consumer protection agency and his high ADA record; the incumbent was unable to show the kind of vigor and willingness to meet constituents that is so important in so many congressional elections. The result was a 54% Clinger victory.

Clinger appears to be a vigorous, active incumbent, in tune with the philosophy of the Reagan Administration. He was not seriously challenged in 1980 and his district seems unlikely to suffer major dismemberment for 1982.

Mention the Ozarks and you evoke an image of rural poverty: people with quaint accents living in hillside shacks, cut off from the current of 20th-century America—a kind of Dogpatch. But for the Ozark Mountains of southwest Missouri, an area roughly coincident with the state's 7th congressional district, the Dogpatch image is far from accurate and is getting less accurate every year. Here you can find sizable and prosperous cities, such as Springfield, the third largest in the state, and Joplin. Outside the cities you can see how the landscape has been transformed in recent years, as people from St. Louis and Kansas City and even Chicago build vacation homes or even year-round residences in the pleasant green hills and along the large, often man-made, lakes. The climate here is relatively temperate, and the Ozarks are free of many of the stresses and strains of metropolitan life that so many Americans find unpleasant. The Ozarks, long a backwater, are now one of the fastest-growing parts of the country.

Many mountain areas—eastern Tennessee have developed a politics contrary to the century. Most people here in the 1860s are sympathies of most central Missouri Republicans—and have stayed that way strengthened by distaste for Democratic forces of many of the area's new arrival blacks and little evidence of the youth culture of the 7th usually goes Republican; not Eagleton in 1980. By long-standing tradition, Orange County has been Republican; and until 1974, the migrants here were strongly Republican also. But as throughout the New York metropolitan area, the Watergate affair and the crisis over aid to New York City seem to have brought ancestral Democrats back to their party and led them to forget their conservative leanings in the early 1970s. The one-time Republican stronghold of Orange County nearly went Democratic again, and Orange County delivered a hefty 57%-33% margin for Ronald Reagan.

The 26th district has been represented since 1972 by Benjamin Gilman, a Republican who seems to span the differences between the two portions of the district. Gilman is Jewish, like so many Rockland residents, but he is actually from Orange County himself and served in the area in the New York Assembly. He is a Republican, but his voting record has often been rated somewhat higher by Democratic- than Republican-oriented rating groups. He does not receive the Conservative Party endorsement, but in two of the last three elections, Conservatives have not run a candidate against him. Gilman serves on the Foreign Affairs Committee, where he is, among other things, a strong supporter of Israel and ranking minority member of the subcommittee on Latin America. He has been reelected easily and redistricting is unlikely to pose a problem for him. The 26th currently has the second highest population of any New York district and, unless Rockland is joined to one of the Westchester districts (which has never happened in New York history), Gilman's district will just be shorn of a few of its fringe areas on the north.

TWENTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT

New York's 27th congressional district stretches from the Catskills to the Southern Tier. The Catskills are home to the Grossinger's and the Concord, for Dutchess County's little town of Woodstock (about 50 miles away). The low-lying Catskills to the west the mountains subside into the counties along New York's boundary with Pennsylvania, an old manufacturing home of Cornell University.

With the exception of Sullivan County, the area is publican territory. It did not move as a metropolitan area during the Nixon years, so the state as a whole. Then in 1974 it did enough to vote Democratic to elect — for the middle-class parts of the New York area.

The new congressman is Matthew M. McHugh, who won Edward Koch's place on Approp City. McHugh won reelection with a strong enough that a young, self-financed challenger in 1980.



Since Ryan's death the district has had two different congressmen. In a special election to fill the seat in 1979, Republican Bill Royer, a member of the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors, managed to beat a former Ryan aide after the Democrats had a divisive primary. Royer benefited from a well-financed campaign and local disgust with high-spending Democrats less than a year after the passage of Proposition 13, and he was helped by the support of the 12th district's Pete McCloskey (who once represented all the territory within the 11th).

The result of the special election was reversed in 1980 by Democrat Tom Lantos. A successful professional economist with an imposing appearance, he united Democratic factions and avoided primary opposition. He spent liberally, ran an astute campaign, and at the same time managed to argue for a larger defense budget and to attack Royer's allegedly conservative voting record (it was not all that far removed from that of most House Republicans). Royer may indeed be the first victim of the solidarity of House Republicans, since conservative Republican positions have never been particularly popular in the Peninsula. Lantos was in any case one of only three Democrats to beat an incumbent Republican congressman in 1980.

Lantos's political talents are evident from his upset victory. He sits on the Foreign Affairs Committee and has a natural interest in foreign policy; he was born in Budapest and fought in the underground against the Nazis. His major political problem for 1982 will be redistricting. The northern part of the Peninsula is the most Democratic, but pressure exists to take some of that territory and add it to the population-shy districts of the Burton brothers in San Francisco. Phil Burton himself will probably work to see that Lantos ends up with a favorable district, but that will take some adroit district-drawing.

Lent is the beneficiary of a couple of redistrictings. The first, in 1970, helped him beat Allard Lowenstein, elected two years before with the help of student volunteers after he helped to put together the campaign that ousted Lyndon Johnson from the presidency. The second, in 1972, made the district safely Republican in most contests. Since then his opposition has gotten weaker and his percentages have grown much higher.

Redistricting for 1982 will change the boundaries of the district yet again, with major adjustments made necessary by population loss (some 32,000) over the last ten years. The chances are that the Nassau County delegation to the legislature will see that Lent has a safe district.

In the House Lent is a reliable member of the Republican Party but is not closely identified with any particular issue. He is a member of the Energy and Commerce Committee, one of the most critical committees in the House—and in 1979 and 1980 the most hardworking. He serves on the subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations, which technically has broad jurisdiction but which has no direct legislative responsibilities. He is ranking minority member of the relatively uncontroversial subcommittee on Commerce, Transportation, and Tourism. In addition, Lent is a member of the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, on which he is one of the few members who have opposed maritime subsidies. He does not attract great attention in the House but is considered competent and influential.

ELEVENTH DISTRICT

The 11th congressional district is deep in the heart of Texas. Made up of all or part of 19 counties, the district sits slightly off the geographical center of the state, but at just about its center of population. The 11th includes two good-sized cities, Waco and Temple, and a huge Army base, Fort Hood. The rest of the district is classic Texas agricultural country, given over to cotton, livestock, and occasional small towns. People here are descended from settlers who came from the Deep South in the 19th century; they brought Democratic Party identification with them, and maintained it for many years. The 11th district gave even a Yankee liberal, Hubert Humphrey, an absolute majority of its votes in the three-way race of 1968, and it was solidly for Jimmy Carter in 1976. As late as 1978 it voted against Republicans John Tower and William Clements. But in 1980 the 11th switched: it gave Ronald Reagan an absolute majority of its votes and Jimmy Carter only 44%. This may be only a temporary shift, like the one that carried the district for Richard Nixon in 1972; but it may

SEVENTH DISTRICT

The 7th congressional district of Pennsylvania covers a unit that until the 1980 census has contained mostly just to the south. This is, indeed since the turn of the century, the west of Philadelphia, but for the most part not an inner city, not on the main line of the old Pennsylvania and radial roads. There are leafy, WASPy suburbs, including a distinguished college of that name. But the most notable is Darby, where the grandchildren of immigrants have moved out from the crowded row-house neighborhoods to the middle-class streets of Delaware County.

The dominant political institution here for years has been a Republican machine that rivals in age the old Republican machine that ruled Philadelphia. The War Board's initial strength was among Protestants, but it adapted well to new tides of support from the Irish — and Italian — and Polish — Americans over five decades. But the War Board's power seems to have been purged the incumbent in the 1974 congressional election. It was then unable to elect its candidate in the 1978 election.

The winner of that election was 31-year-old Melvin Edgar. Despite the district's Republican background he is still the beneficiary of initiatives to build up his local popularity. In the committee, he blocked the Rivers and Harbors bill of 1974. In the nessee-Tombigbee Waterway. He has pushed for a bill still served by commuter rail and public transit. In the caucus of representatives from northeastern and southern states, Edgar has conducted some of the most useful work. He has documented its charges that these older areas are being shortchanged. Edgar also broke with political tradition in the Pennsylvania Democrats Daniel Flood caucus of upper-income precincts. He has been an innovator in which he now heads the Education, Training, and Research Caucus. He has supported such measures as counseling centers and job training and elimination of the contribution service. He has been one of the leaders of the inner city caucus.

Yet Edgar has always been poised at the edge of the upper-income voters' congressman but as a maverick, which he himself sprang; and he has almost impacted on issues as well as cultural issues. He has been vulnerable


